

From the desk of Father Rich Yanos

Next Weekend we will be having the Annual Propagation of the Faith Summer Missionary Appeal. Our mission speaker will be Fr. Joyanto Sylvester Gomes.. So, I encourage all in our parish to offer Fr. Joyanto Gomes a warm Queen of Peace welcome.

Fr. Joyanto Sylvester Gomes was born on 23 September 1960 and finished his Degree level studies from Notre Dame College, Dhaka. He was ordained a Priest on 27 December 1988. Later he received his Master's in Mass Communication from the University of Ateneo De Manila. He has been serving as a Parish Priest in a very large Parish in Dhaka. He has worked in different capacities such as in Formation in the Minor Seminary, headed the Christian Social Communication Centre and was the Coordinator of Radio Veritas. He is a very responsible, hardworking and a dedicated Priest in the Archdiocese.


Introduction: Bangladesh is predominantly a Muslim country, about 90% are Muslims, total population is 168 million people, the rest are Hindu and Buddhists, less than one percent people are Christians. There are eight Dioceses in Bangladesh. Dhaka is a mega city, more than 20 million people live in this city, one of the most densely populated and most polluted city in the world. There are many poor who live in the slums who lack proper food, housing and are deprived of a healthy sanitary system. This Diocese was mostly built by the American Holy Cross missionaries about 175 years ago. At present there are 85,000 Catholics in 26 Parishes and 24 Sub-Centers. There are about 35 Religious Congregations.

Situation: It is an underdeveloped country whose 70% of its inhabitants live in rural areas and depend on their agricultural products. The unpredictable weather becomes a big problem, like drought, heavy monsoon rain, natural calamities like cyclone, floods etc. It is one of the poorest countries in the world, 60% are poor. The government health service is very poor and inadequate, it provides for only 40% of the people. Many people go to the village doctors where they are treated by traditional medicines. The treatment in private hospitals is very expensive. One physician is allocated for 10,000 people. In the government health sector, there is high degree of corruption and mismanagement. There is no health insurance. Many hospitals and doctors are very much business oriented.

Purpose for Mission Appeal: Firstly, we have a small hospital in Dhaka city with 20 beds, it is meant for the low-income generating families and the poor. The last two years we ran the hospital in deficit. Now we can manage the running expenses. We hope to extend more services to the poor and needy. Therefore, we need to create more facilities to do so. Secondly, out of four regions of Dhaka in one region there is a possibility of evangelization especially among the indigenous people. We would like to spend money from the Mission Appeals for these two intentions.

The 2nd Collection next weekend will be taken up, then, for the Annual Summer Mission Appeal that will support the dedicated work and ministry of Fr. Joyanto Gomes.



OUR LADY OF MOUNT CARMEL

The origins of this feast reach all the way back to the Old Testament. In the book of Kings, we read the story of the prophet Elijah. Much of his prayer, fasting, and public ministry occurred from Carmel, a mountain in Israel. Christian hermits -- seeking solitude -- made their homes on the mountain during the first millennium. Over time, the hermits assembled into a community and were given a Rule of Life. They named their church after Mary -- Our Lady of Mount Carmel. Political upheaval forced the Carmelite order out of the Holy Land and into Europe, where they established monasteries for both men and women across the continent. Many great saints and doctors of the Church have come from the Carmelite order, including St. Teresa of Avila, St. John of the Cross, St. Therese of Lisieux, and St. Edith Stein. Our Lady of Mount Carmel. Pray for us!


Gospel Reading





Divine Savior's Marian Shrine, Now known as the Queen of Peace Statue, Will be coming to a new location!

The Unification Committee has approved the relocation of the beautiful Marian Shrine, from the campus of Divine Savior, to Saint Eugene's Church. The shrine was erected by the parishioners in 1987, and was ironically named the Queen of Peace, the name of our new parish. It is fitting that she is moved to the new location.

The Queen of Peace is an 8' stainless steel sculpture weighing 1,200 pounds. The brick base that she sits on cannot be moved and will need to be reconstructed. 3G Construction has been hired to move the statue and replicate the base. The owners of 3G Construction are long-time active parishioners. The statue will be placed in a prominent place along Foster Ave.

We are asking for your financial support for the success of this project. Our goal is to raise \$30,000 which will cover the relocation cost, build a new base, beautify the landscape around the statue, and include lighting and benches.

Soil Conditions

I am a hopeless gardener. I never met a plant I couldn't swiftly kill with good intentions and poor understanding of soil conditions.

Because really, it's all about the soil conditions—at least, that's what Google tells me when I helplessly search phrases like "Why aren't any of my seeds sprouting? Please, I tried so hard." I can never seem to match the right type of soil offering the right type of drainage and texture with the right plant. I can't understand why it's not enough to bury the seed in whatever ground is available, sprinkle some water and ask it, very nicely, to grow.

This is also a quality that makes me a poor evangelist to people who do not share my beliefs. How many times have I encountered a friend or loved one who left the faith, and I tried to coax them back by hurling Catechism passages in their direction, offering advice they never asked for and are ill-equipped to understand? I sow these seeds of witness and bang my fists in frustration that they rot where I plant them, never realizing that it's all about the soil.

It is Christ, and Christ alone, who works within the heart. It is Christ who is the sower of the seed, not me. When I leave him out of the equation, when I fail to offer the Person and instead only offer the teaching, I can anticipate that any witness I have to offer will rot where it is planted just as sure as a tulip bulb in a bed of clay.

Why do we do that? Catholic Life Explained

Question:

Why do we use incense at Mass?

Answer:

The use of incense in religious ceremonies and worship is a practice that predates Christianity, and which is also found in many other religious traditions today.

Incense, which is made from resin infused with aromatic spices and oils, is one of those fundamentally human symbols that incorporates more than one of our senses, helping us to reflect on realities that transcend the everyday details of our lives.

The use of incense in the Church's liturgy — in the Mass, as well as in devotions to the Eucharist and the Liturgy of the Hours — is inspired by the use of incense in the Jewish tradition. In the writings of the Old Testament, we hear about incense being used in the worship of the temple, and Psalm 141 asks, "Let my prayer be incense before you; my uplifted hands an evening offering" (vs. 2). The image here is that, as the incense gently rises to heaven, our prayers also rise to God as something sweet and pleasant.

Another ancient use of incense that has also become part of our Catholic tradition is the idea that when we incense something, it's because it is something special or sacred. This is why the Book of the Gospel is incensed during the Liturgy of the Word and the bread, wine, priest celebrant, and congregation are incensed at the presentation of the gifts. To this, we can also add the incensing of the Blessed Sacrament during eucharistic adoration and benediction, and the body of the deceased at the end of the Mass of the Resurrection (the Funeral Mass).

Gospel Meditation Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture

It's not uncommon to hear people complain that we Catholics often fail in communicating our faith. Fair enough. We can and should improve there. But it's interesting to notice that Jesus himself was implicitly accused by his disciples of a similar failure. This week in Matthew's gospel they are perplexed that he speaks to the crowds in ambiguous parables. The Lord's riddles leave many people more confused than before. He responds by pointing out that his parables have an intentional dual purpose: to hide (for some) and to reveal (for others) his Gospel: "Because knowledge of the mysteries of the kingdom of heaven has been granted to you, but to them it has not been granted" (Matthew 13:11). Is Jesus being unnecessarily difficult, obscurantist, or, worse, elitist?

No. We have to remember that all the treasures of wisdom and knowledge lie hidden in him (c.f., Col. 2:3). He is the word of God from heaven to be planted in the earth of our humanity to bear great fruit. However, like a lover delicately pursuing his beloved, we're dealing with a relationship, not new data. When we aren't willing to personally accept Jesus into our lives, the "info" of the Gospel will simply not make sense to us. It'll seem bizarre, esoteric, or like incoherent religious-speak. But when we are willing to accept Jesus into our lives, everything else starts to make sense. When others don't understand the Church or the Lord, let's be patient. Love is patient. Sometimes it has to hide before it is revealed.
