

From the desk of Father Rich Yanos

As a practicing Catholic, priest and pastor I find myself often disheartened by the lack of attention so many who identify themselves as "Catholics" are giving to the living out and practicing of our Catholic faith. Today we sadly find ourselves amid a society and culture that continues to deemphasize the religious practice of our faith but rather emphasizes a more secularist approach to life in general. I am reminded of the old adage that said, "We reap what we sow in life". I don't think I have ever felt this to be truer in our world and in our church today. Let me share a few examples of what I see on a daily/weekly basis... Growing up in the not-too-distant past, we were always taught that going to Mass on Sunday, gathering around the Lord's table with the fellow believers/members of our parish community was something we did because it was God's desire for his people to "Keep Holy the Sabbath Day". It was also a clear interpretation of this "Commandment" that down through the centuries Protestant, Jewish and Catholic communities gathered with each other on their respective Sabbath Days to give praise and worship to God. What has happened, then, that so many who profess to be Christian no longer feel it is important or necessary to gather once a week in their churches with their fellow believers?

On a regular basis we meet with couples who have chosen to celebrate their marriage here in our churches when, in fact, attending Mass is not at all a part of their lived experience. As the pastor of our community of faith I am regularly requested to fill out paperwork testifying to the active membership of parishioners who have been asked to be godparents for baptism and/or sponsors for the confirmation of their relatives and friends when in fact they hardly ever, if ever, go to church, let alone offer their financial support as good stewards to the parish that they hope and trust (and sometimes even demand) will be there for them when they need us. In good conscience I find it very difficult to sign my name attesting to something as important as living and practicing our Catholic faith for those who are not. This is especially true when it comes to the important role of sponsors and godparents. I suppose I would even question why anyone who is not living the life of faith Jesus Christ and our Church calls us to would even accept such a significant spiritual role in the life of a child, teenager, or adult. I am even more amazed when parents who do not go to church, or pray with their family, or practice our Catholic faith would even embrace baptism for their children when the promise they will be making on the day of their child's baptism is to be the best of teachers to their child(ren) in the ways of our Catholic faith. However, I am always hopeful that after attending baptismal preparation and celebrating the Sacrament itself our parents will be touched by God's grace to see the awesome responsibility that is theirs in growing together as a Christian family.

It seems we live in a time and a place in our history and culture where giving God an hour of our week seems to be an inconvenience and obviously not on the priority list of so many. What concerns me even more is what is being taught to our children (the next generation of our church – the future of our church) who are being taught that it is OK to not go to church, it is OK to leave Mass as the Body and Blood of Christ is being distributed, it is OK to walk out of the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass before the Presider and Ministers exit the church. I think we all know that children learn primarily not from what they are told but rather from the example they are given and shown by their teachers, who in these very important formative years are their parents. I often wonder how it makes God feel to see this lack of respect toward the gift of the Eucharist he gave us. I suppose it would be like how we might feel if we provided a lavish dinner for our family, friends, or neighbors and when we cleared the dishes to go and prepare dessert, we came back to an empty dining room table because everyone had left without a thank you or even a good-bye. Imagine that? How would you feel if you were the host? I know how I would feel!

I beg all in our community to not look at attending Mass or going to church as an obligation, or something we are forced into doing, or even as a commandment given to us by God Himself (although this, in and of itself, should be all we need to want to celebrate the Lord's Day) but rather as an opportunity to give thanks to God (for just one hour a week) for all that we are blessed with – our freedom, our families, our friendships, our jobs, our homes, our country, our fiance's, our gifts and talents, our very lives! When going to Mass is seen this way – as an opportunity to give THANKS to God for all he has blessed us with, it changes everything and provides a very powerful motivation to get ourselves and our kids out of bed on a Sunday morning. It really does! Try to instill this way of thinking into your children's hearts. But before that can happen, we'll need to believe it ourselves.


Please pass these thoughts on to anyone you may know that might need to be reminded of the great gift of faith and relationship with our Lord that we have been given and invited into as well as the importance of praying with each other and sharing in the Eucharist weekly.

A pastor, like good parents, is often required to address issues that some in the family do not necessarily want to hear but are necessary for the good of the whole family. That's how I feel about what I needed to say today. When these issues are reflected upon and addressed, we will become stronger as a family of faith here at Queen of Peace.







Queen of Peace Service Day Event


Join the Queen of Peace Young Adults Group on Saturday, August 12, for a summer service event.



Why do we do that? Catholic Life Explained

Question:

Why do Parishes Offer Special Masses like Thanksgiving and Memorial Day, even though they're not Holy Days of Obligation? Am I obligated to attend?

Answer:

Out of respect for the various civil celebrations that take place during the year, many dioceses and parishes will host special Masses. However, while it always worthwhile to come together to worship as a community, Catholics are not obligated to attend these celebrations. As the Catechism of the Catholic Church notes, the only times that we are obligated to participate in celebrations of the Eucharist are on Sundays and holy days of obligation:

The first precept ("You shall attend Mass on Sundays and holy days of obligation and rest from servile labor") requires the faithful to sanctify the day commemorating the Resurrection of the Lord as well as the principal liturgical feasts honoring the mysteries of the Lord, the Blessed Virgin Mary, and the saints; in the first place, by participating in the Eucharistic celebration, in which the Christian community is gathered, and by resting from those works and activities which could impede such a sanctification of these days.
