

From the desk of Father Rich Yanos

On the first weekend in October our Church traditionally celebrates Respect Life Sunday.

Respect Life Sunday is an opportunity for each of us to re-examine the ways in which we respond to the precious gift of human life, in all its forms from conception until natural death. There are so many complexities that surround the many "life issues" that we are faced with each day. The decisions we make both personally and collectively about these "life issues" all have ramifications. That is why the Church in her infinite wisdom will always look to protect the dignity and sanctity of human life... whether it be coming to the protection and defense of the defenseless fetus, caring for the increasingly aging senior population, taking a definitive stance on birth control, encouraging natural family planning, or helping us to understand all the ramifications of stem cell research, etc....

I want to encourage everyone in our parish to use this upcoming Respect Life Sunday as an opportunity to learn more about what we as Catholics believe about respecting life in all its forms, and more importantly, why we teach and believe and hold firm to our convictions about the protection and preservation of human life.

You may have noticed a couple of changes/additions in your monthly stewardship envelopes. With the merging of our three parishes attempts were made to unify our 2nd collections. Before the unifying of our three parishes, each parish had their own unique 2nd collection needs and causes and separate envelopes to correspond to those causes. With the bringing of our parishes together we were able to keep those that were common to all three of our parishes, combine worthy causes such as Social Concerns and the Quinn Center Food Pantry, add an important one such as Parish Repairs and Maintenance, and change some 2nd collections from every month to every other month such as School Support, Sharing Parish, Social Concerns/ Food Pantry. This also had to be done because of all the additional collections that were taken up at all three parishes that could not happen any longer with our being one parish, as there were not enough weeks in a month to provide them all. We also tried to provide one week each month that would not have a 2nd Collection to give everyone a break.

I'd also like to speak of the importance of the Parish Repairs and Maintenance 2nd collection envelope as our buildings and equipment are aging and are now breaking down more often. To give you an idea of the magnitude of this reality...the school and parish have had to pay so far in these past 9 months of 2023 alone, over \$97,000 to repair or replace components of our heating, air-conditioning, and plumbing systems. These were all non-budgeted and non-planned. We have also been told that there are many more issues on the horizon that are going to be needed to be addressed. This Repairs and Maintenance 2nd collection is so crucial at this time, and I ask all to be as generous as you can be as you drop this envelope in the collection basket.

As you know, October is also the month of the Feast of St. Francis of Assisi. This year his feast day falls on Wednesday, October 4th. It is also the day we traditionally bless our pets. To make it easier for more people to participate in this event, we will be having our annual pet blessing, on Sunday, October 1st at 2:30 p.m. on the area in front of the main entrance to the church at the St. Eugene Campus. This blessing of our beloved pets has been a tradition for many, many years in parishes throughout the world. For this reason, all in our parish are encouraged to bring their pets (small, medium, or large, fish, animal or fowl, walking, crawling, or hopping) to the area in front of the entrance of church on Sunday, October 1st. All pets are welcome. Please join your parish family in keeping this beautiful tradition as we celebrate the Feast of St. Francis of Assisi here at Queen of Peace Parish.

Why Pray the Rosary?

The Rosary is a powerful prayer that has the power to transform lives. It can be thought of as a spiritual weapon made by God which is easily memorized and can be prayed anywhere, anytime, and in almost all circumstances.

It encapsulates the life-giving wonders of the Sacraments and the teachings of the Church and brings them into your home and into every aspect of your life. The rosary is mobile, portable and greatly feared by the evil one.

Many miracles and military victories are attributed to the Rosary. Satan does not have a sword of equal power and because he is jealous of the Rosary, he ceaselessly tries to strip it from the hands of God's children.

To pray the Rosary is to pray the Word of God. The Rosary brings the light of Christ into all situations. It has the power to bring about world peace because the mysteries focus on the Truth, that is, on Jesus Christ.

The Rosary teaches virtue. Perseverance in praying the Rosary has proven to be a tremendous means of helping a person avoid sin and remain in a state of grace. The Rosary is our expression of our love for Jesus and Mary because meditation on the life of Jesus brings us closer to Him and helps us grow in love. Mary is the person who is closest to Jesus, so when we ask her to pray for us, she helps us to grow in love for Him.

Our Lady presented the following fifteen promises to St. Dominic for all those who pray the Rosary.

- Whoever shall faithfully serve me by the recitation of the rosary shall receive signal graces.
- ♦ I promise my special protection and the greatest graces to all those who shall recite the Rosary.
- ♦ The Rosary shall be a powerful armor against hell, it will destroy vice, and decrease sin and defeat heresies.
- It will cause good works to flourish; it will obtain for souls the abundant mercy of God; it will withdraw the hearts of men from the love of the world and its vanities, and will lift them to the desire for Eternal things. Oh, that souls would sanctify themselves by this means!
- ◆ The soul which recommends itself to me by the recitation of the Rosary shall not perish.
- Whosoever shall recite the Rosary devoutly, applying himself to the consideration of its Sacred Mysteries, shall never be conquered by misfortune. God will not chastise him in His justice, he shall not perish by an unprovided death; if he be just he shall remain in the grace of God, and become worthy of Eternal Life.
- Whoever shall have a true devotion for the Rosary shall not die without Sacraments of the Church.
- ◆ Those who are faithful to recite the Rosary shall have during their life and at their death the Light of God and the plentitude of his Graces; at the moment of death they shall participate in the Merits of the Saints in Paradise.
- I shall deliver from purgatory those who have been devoted to the Rosary.
- The faithful children of the Rosary shall merit a high degree of Glory in Heaven.
- You shall obtain all you ask of me by recitation of the Rosary.
- All those who propagate the Holy Rosary shall be aided by me in their necessities.
- ♦ I have obtained from my Divine Son that all the advocates of the Rosary shall have for intercessors the entire Celestial Court during their life and at the hour of death.
- All who recite the Rosary are my Sons, and brothers of my Only Son Jesus Christ.
- Devotion to my Rosary is a great sign of predestination.

I hope that all will take advantage of dropping in to see what the group is about.



Reflections on World Youth Day

My name is Daniela. I'm a board member of the St. Eugene's Young Adult group. I had the opportunity to attend World Youth Day "WYD" for the first time this summer. It was an experience that allowed me to receive many graces. At the Welcome Mass, the cardinal of Lisbon said that, like Mary, who had traveled to visit Elizabeth despite difficulties, we had also set out on a difficult path due to distance and cost, but that it was worthwhile. I felt this was true in my case. Aside from long distances and cost, I had also lost my job recently and was struggling to leave my anxieties behind. I had considered canceling my trip, but everyone I spoke to encouraged me to go. I decided it was God's providence and to focus on making the trip worthwhile. As the cardinal stated, Mary went with haste, not anxiously.

Every morning catechism sessions were available in different languages. We missed the first session because the bus dropped us off at the wrong location. I felt disappointed, but then someone found out that the Pope was about to drive by the street we were on. We were able to see him up close and he waved at us. It was a good reminder that God's blessings can be found even when things do not go as planned.



The second day of Catechism in English was given by Archbishop Anthony Fisher. He gave a wonderful talk on God's love for us, but what I remember most about that session came during the Q&A. A girl stepped up and said she was a transgender Catholic and wanted to know what her place at God's table was. The archbishop said that the Church is the most inclusive place and there is room for everyone. However, once we are part of the Church, we need to ask ourselves uncomfortable questions and recognize that love requires commitment to struggle against our disorders, and that she wouldn't be alone in that struggle because in one way or another, we all struggle with sexuality. I thought he gave a good example of how to be tolerant without remaining silent on morality.

The last Catechism was given by Bishop Robert Barron. He spoke of the importance of prayer and how our culture does a great job at searching for what's good, but once we have it, we don't enjoy it. It was a good lesson for me as sometimes during prayer I tell God what I am going to do next. I made the resolution to try to pray by just enjoying God's presence.

When visiting Fatima, my favorite part was getting to go into the houses of the 3 shepherds. Each room had information on what had taken place there, such as Francisco's death or Jacintha's birth. We also participated in the candlelight vigil. I heard later that a girl recovered her vision while visiting Fatima during WYD. I didn't experience anything as extraordinary, but I did pray for a new job, and I received an offer the following day.

The events with the Pope usually took place in the afternoon. One I particularly enjoyed was the Way of the Cross because some stations were accompanied by testimonies of people who had converted through another's example. Some of them talked about how they had struggled with drug addictions or had abortions. It's nice to see the transformation that comes along when someone practices their faith. In his sermons, the Pope always emphasized that we should not be afraid because God loves us, that sometimes we feel that we are not up to the challenge, but the church and the world need us to share the joy we have obtained. There is a tradition where pilgrims exchange



their flags with one another. I like these because I use them as a reminder to pray for the people I met. I saw 1.5 million youths excited about their faith, but I pray that we may take that happiness to others, and that we may persevere in the long run. I hope you will also continue to pray for us.

What Can You Do for the Lord? Feed the Hungry.

In his September 3 "Chicago Catholic" article on the Scriptures for the 23rd Sunday in Ordinary Time, Fr. Leslie Hoppe, OFM said:

"If love is the measure of our generosity and commitment, our response to God cannot be limited by the Ten Commandments and the church's precepts. ... We should not ask, 'What are my obligations? What am I required to do?' Instead, we ought to ask, 'What more can I do for the Lord for all that the Lord has done for me?'"

A key word here is DO. What can you - and I- do? Recall the Corporal Works of Mercy, and you will find a number of suggestions, including "Feed the hungry."

In an earlier Bulletin article, we said that once school was back in session, it was anticipated that the number of people relying on the Food Pantry at St. Eulalia's Quinn Center would increase. In August, 89 families received groceries; on Tuesday, September 12, the number jumped to 109, representing 448 people. We've never figured out exactly what drives the increase at this time. Frankly, we're just concerned with providing the additional groceries.

So what can you do? You've heard about giving your Time and Treasure before. Come help us prepare or distribute the bags of groceries. Support the Food Pantry financially. Do one or do both.

Not everyone has the time or flexibility to physically lend a hand with the groceries. But in order to deliver groceries, we first have to *buy* the groceries. That's now easier because Give Central now has an option to donate for the food pantry, or you can drop off an envelope in the Sunday collection or at the Rectory. (Please make sure envelopes are <u>clearly marked for the Food Pantry</u>. Checks should be made out to St. Eugene Church.)

Our **next grocery bagging** session will be on **Sunday, October 1** at 1:45 pm at the Quinn Center. (We're packing a little early due to some scheduling challenges!) Grocery **distribution** will be on Tuesday afternoon, **October 10**.

Queen of Peace Parish 2023-2024 Religious Education Program Provided at St. Eugene School

Dear Parents and Guardians,

On behalf of Queen of Peace Parish, we would like to invite you to register for the 2023-2024 Religious Education Program. Both of our programs rely not only on our Religious Education teachers, who are certified teachers and catechists but also on the parents assuming an active role in the faith formation of their children.

Regular Program Classes - Grades 1-7: Classes take place in a classroom setting with the overall work covered in class with the exception of the seventh grade students who complete additional papers and service hours in preparation of receiving the Sacrament of Confirmation in the fall of their eighth grade year.

Classes are held on Tuesdays beginning October 3rd and are held from 3:45-4:45 p.m.

Independent Study Program - Grades 1 – 7: This class is for parents who want their children to complete their grade-level chapter work at home and want to use their church attendance as their participation in religious education.

This program requires your child to attend at least fifteen of their weekly masses at Queen of Peace Parish at either St. Eugene Church or Our Lady Mother of the Church from September to April. These bulletins must be signed by the presiding priest of the mass. The set of all 15 bulletins is to be dropped off as a bundle at the school office by April 21.

In addition to getting their fifteen bulletins signed, students will complete 18 textbook chapters - including all questions on every page throughout each chapter, including the Chapter Reviews and Faith In Action pages. The Chapter Work can be scanned and emailed, or dropped off weekly at the school office at 7930 W. Foster Ave.

Seventh graders will complete a different textbook, additional papers, and service hours in preparation of receiving the Sacrament of Confirmation in the fall of their eighth grade year.

Book pick-up will be held on Wednesday, October 4th, from 3:00-4:00 p.m. in the school gym.
