

FROM THE DESK OF FR. RICH

Today our Church celebrates the Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ – Corpus Christi Sunday.

Today's first reading from the book of Genesis tells us all we know about an obscure king named Melchizedek. Abraham had just won a military victory, and Melchizedek honors him with a meal of bread and wine. Over the course of time, this meal was seen as a distant foreshadowing of the Eucharist, which is why this passage was chosen for today's feast.

Our second reading from the first letter to the Corinthians was written about 25 years after Christ's death and resurrection. Today's passage contains our earliest written account of what Jesus did at the Last Supper. It predates even the Gospels.

Deep within people of faith there is a hunger for the Eucharist. Nothing else will do. Our deepest longings and needs will be filled only in union with the Lord. As we receive the Eucharist with our "Amen" we acknowledge our belief that we are truly receiving the Body of Christ; as we meditate on His Presence, we nourish our spirits; as we become what we receive, we grow in holiness. When our hearts are set on the Eucharist, nothing else will do. Jesus Christ does indeed feed us with the gift of finest wheat.

A few years ago, I came across an article that appeared in a neighboring parish bulletin that had to do with good and practical guidelines for receiving Our Lord in the Eucharist. Because I thought many of us could all use a refresher

course in this area, and because today's celebration focuses on the Eucharist, here are a few reminders in respecting these important guidelines:

- If you receive Holy Communion on the tongue or in your hand, answer with a definitive "Amen" before you extend your tongue or your hand.
- Extend your tongue far enough for the priest or minister to carefully place the Sacred Host on it. The priest or minister is to place the host on your tongue without touching it; if your tongue is touched it could create health problems for those receiving later in line.
- Make a bow of the head as a sign of reverence before receiving the Eucharist. This is best done when the priest or minister elevates the Eucharist. Genuflecting and kneeling are not necessary and can cause someone behind you to trip or fall.
- If you are going to receive the host in the hand, please DO NOT GRAB AT THE SACRED HOST. You are to make a throne for the Lord by placing one hand over the other. Then say Amen, take the host with your free hand and consume the host.

IT IS NOT PERMITTED TO CARRY THE SACRED HOST TO THE PRECIOUS BLOOD AND DIP IT IN THE PRECIOUS BLOOD. This process is called intinction. It requires a different set of sacred vessels that we currently do not use. To do so with our cups most certainly would create a health risk, as no hands or fingers should be placed in the cups used to distribute Christ's Sacred Blood. Please have clean hands! There should be nothing in your hands as you prepare to receive the Eucharist. Don't carry a rosary, a crucifix or anything else in your hands when you receive the Lord or have anything written


on your hands.

- After receiving Holy Communion, whether on the tongue or in the hand, it is not proper to genuflect to the tabernacle. In most parishes, the tabernacle is empty while Communion is being distributed. Most importantly, after you receive the Eucharist, you are the tabernacle!
- The proper response to: "The Body of Christ" is "Amen". Amen means "so be it." It is very important that you make that profession of faith before receiving the Lord. Amen says it all! Anything else is superfluous.

Many thanks to all who took the time to fill out your Generation to Generation pledge form last weekend. Whether you made a one-time gift or a pledge for the five-year campaign duration, I want to express my sincerest gratitude on behalf of our parish community that we are all a part of. Last weekend's contributions amounted \$164,165.00 which brings us to a total of \$1,215,584.00 toward our \$1,440.000.00 goal. We are now only \$224,416.00 short of attaining our goal. If everyone participated in any way that you could, we would not only reach our goal but would surpass it! We still have another week or two before the formal campaign solicitation process comes to its conclusion. We're counting on everyone helping us to reach our goal.

Gospel Meditation Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture

A Catholic friend of mine occasionally says, "The Eucharist is not a noun. It's a verb." In so saying, he is making the point that the Eucharist isn't simply Jesus' bodily presence given to us in holy Communion. It also manifests the dynamic pattern by which Christ actively loves and saves us. He teaches us to cooperate with that pattern. This Eucharist actually embodies four verbs: Jesus takes, blesses, breaks, and gives. Let's consider each one.

He **takes:** Do we acknowledge that we are totally in God's hands? Do we receive everything in our lives as a gift, and act responsibly with it?

He **blesses:** Do we actively reflect that Jesus makes us holy in our baptism? Do we embrace our bodies and souls as temples of God, worthy of love, peace, and joy?

He **breaks:** Do we run from failure and disappointment, from getting old or being ignored? Are we too worried about getting hurt or sick? Do we embrace our sufferings with confidence?

He **gives**: Are we willing to make our lives a gift for others? Are we confident that we will always have enough love to give to others, that God will always provide enough for us? Do we rejoice in giving away what we have to others, expecting nothing in return? This is the dynamic life the Eucharist empowers us to live.


