

From the Pastor's Office

29th Sunday in Ordinary Time

The story of the battle between Amalek and his army brings to mind the story of Constantine's battle against opposing Roman forces from the Western part of the Roman Empire. Constantine won this battle, and it paved the way for the rise of Christianity in the Roman world. The famous story tells us that the night before the battle Constantine doubted if he would win this battle. In desperation he prayed to the Christian God. In a dream he was told to daub the Christian symbol of the cross on all the shields and banners of his army. I guess the troops grew in confidence, so much so that they won the battle convincingly. I am talking about the power of symbols and what they represent. The Nazi world was dripping in

Nazi insignia to denote power and control. We all rally to the flag. The lovely story of the American national anthem comes to mind. After the pounding by the British forces at Fort McHenry, people wondered what they might see when daylight came again. They were astounded to see that the flag was still flying. This gave them great confidence and courage to continue the fight. The same scenario happened when Moses and his people fought against Amalek. Moses was not a military general leading his troops to battle. These were ordinary people who fought for their cause. Moses stood up on a height so that his people could see him. As they entered the battle, they saw Moses raising his hands, to signify that the God Yahweh was with His people in the midst of the fight. This gave them courage. God is with us. That's all we want to know. I want to know that God is with me. Knowing that, I can

cope with anything. We must never underestimate the power of symbols and what they mean. They give us heart. They



rally the people to arms when necessary. Knowing that God is with us, we march to the fight with courage and conviction. I remember reading about the soldiers who went into ancient battle. Their job was to march across a battlefield. The odds were high that they would all be killed. Naturally they were afraid. Naturally they prayed to all the Gods they knew to protect them. It turns out that many "Christian" soldiers emblazoned on the back of their shields a pray to God for protection. Whatever works...

Today, we celebrate World Mission Sunday, a powerful reminder of our shared responsibility to proclaim the Gospel to all nations. It is a day when Catholics around the world unite in prayer and solidarity to support the missionary work of the Church. This year's theme, "Missionaries of Hope Among the Peoples," is particularly moving because, even though it was chosen by Pope Francis, it reflects both the heart of our faith and the vision of our new Holy Father, Pope Leo XIV.

Pope Leo XIV, who spent most of his priestly ministry as a missionary in the remote regions of Peru, reminds us that The Pontifical Mission Societies are "the primary means for awakening missionary responsibility among all the



baptized [and for] supporting ecclesial communities in areas where the Church is young." His personal witness deepens the meaning of this year's celebration, inviting us all to renew our commitment to the Church's mission in the world.

The second collection this weekend will support mission dioceses in Africa, Asia, the Pacific Islands, and parts of Latin America and Europe, where priests, religious and lay leaders serve the world's most vulnerable communities. Please keep the Pope's missions in your prayers and be generous in our collection for the Society for the Propagation of the Faith.



This week we will resume Confession at 6 p.m. and Mass at 7 p.m. on Tuesdays, and daily noon Mass on Wednesdays.




All Saints Day, November 1

All Saints' Day, November 1, is <u>not</u> a Holy Day of Obligation this year because it falls on a Saturday. We will celebrate our usual 5 p.m. Mass on Saturday, November 1, as a Vigil Mass for All Souls' Day.

November is the month in which we remember our beloved dead. During this time, we intercede for those who have gone before us in faith, that they are received and embraced by God. Here are some special ways to remember your departed loved ones in prayer at St. Catherine's during this month of remembrance:

- All Souls Day: Our Special Mass of Remembrance will be celebrated during the 5 p.m. Vigil Mass on Saturday, November 1. There will be a candle ceremony for those who are mourning the loss of a loved one.
- Sign their names in our Book of the Names of the Dead which will be placed in front of the Baptismal Font during the month of November.
- Bring a photo or memento of your loved one and place it in the narthex on the Day of the Dead (Dia de los Muertos) Parish Altar. The altar will be set up in the narthex from Saturday, November 1 until Saturday, November 22. Please label your photo or memento with your name.





Texas Bishops Call for the Abolition of the Death Penalty

The Texas Conference of Catholic Bishops has released a statement calling for the abolition of the death penalty, denouncing its effects not only on victims and others immediately affected, but also on society.

"Capital punishment vitiates our hearts' capacity for mercy and love," the bishops write, noting that "the death penalty not only does not correspond to the common good, it actually does great harm to it." In their statement, the bishops cite several ways that harm is inflicted: 1) Capital punishment is used disproportionately on the poor, minorities, and people with mental disabilities; 2) Costs for capital punishment cases are three times that of a prisoner with life imprisonment; 3) The finality of death does not allow for rehabilitation or for consolation for victims' families and 4) Studies have shown that innocent people have been executed by the state and that crime rates are not affected by a state's use of the death penalty. Pope Leo XIV has urged the media to serve as peacemakers and to embrace communication that brings us out of the confusion of loveless, ideological, or partisan languages. Yet the proliferation of new and heavily ideological media outlets prevents dialogue among people with differing views, continues to deepen existing polarization, and erodes possibilities for a politics of solidarity. A growing share of Americans hold increasingly hostile views toward those with different beliefs, and today's highly fractured media landscape only seems to reinforce those divides. The online seminar by Georgetown University, entitled "Broken Links: How Do Media Silos Undermine Social Solidarity?" will address many of these issues. The seminar is scheduled for Tuesday, October 21, from 6-7 p.m. Central Standard Time. Click here to register online.

The Roof Over Your Head

On a recent St. Vincent de Paul call we visited one of our neighbor's homes at around 4:00 p.m. She had already been through the eviction process through the Austin court system, and the eviction was scheduled to take place that afternoon at 5:00 p.m. We informed the neighbor that we would do our best to help her. The neighbor called the court to inquire what time their office closed. The court employee told the neighbor that the money had to be paid by 4:45 p.m. The county judge would not accept a check that day but gave her an extension until 8:00 a.m. the next day. After the judge's approval, payment was accepted, thus preventing the neighbor and her family from being evicted.

In the last fiscal year, **\$69,253** of the funds collected from our parish went to provide rent relief and prevent evictions. The St. Vincent de Paul conference is grateful for the generous support of our parishioners, without whom we would not be able to assist our neighbors with their needs, be it rent, utility bills or food. The next collection for the Society of St. Vincent de Paul will be on the weekend of November 8-9.

From October 31 through November 4, the Basilica of

St. Thérèse, known as the "Little Flower of Jesus," lived a short but impactful life. Entering the Carmelite convent at 15 and dying at 24, she revealed a spirituality rooted not in grand gestures but in small, loving acts done with trust in God. Her words still resonate: "What matters in life is not great deeds, but great love." Her Little Way transcends denominations and generations. It calls each of us—Catholic or not—to live with compassion, patience, and intentional love. In a world filled with division and noise, Thérèse's life reminds us that holiness can bloom in the ordinary: in a flower, a smile, a kind word, or a moment of patience with a stranger.

The last visit left a lasting imprint on San Antonio, uniting people across backgrounds in hope and prayer. This October, we are invited again to pause, reflect, and rediscover the power of simplicity and love. San Antonio has the privilege of welcoming the Little Flower once more. Let us open our hearts as we open the Basilica's doors, ready to be reminded that even the smallest acts of love can change the world.
