5th Sunday of Lent

The story of the raising of Lazarus from the dead is the great knockout punch. As we ascend to Calvary we have passed through various milestones along the way. We have visited with people like the Blind Man, and the Woman at the Well. All of their encounters with Jesus were life-changing events in their lives. Today is the knockout punch. The story is told in a very dramatic way. Jesus holds back. He is in no hurry to get to Lazarus. For the miracle to have the great effect everyone must know for certain that Lazarus is dead.
