## 14th Sunday in Ordinary Time

I am always amused when I read the scriptures and I come upon what I might call "unsavory" language. Today in Isaiah he speaks of Jerusalem as a woman. "O that you may suck fully of the milk of her comfort, delight at her abundant breasts." Let me tell you about the time I was spat at for being a Catholic priest. Nothing lovely about that. I do remember however, when I lived in Europe, I had to walk along the street during the time when the whole priests pedophile thing was happening. At that time I was actually working in London. I was home for Christmas and I was out visiting my cousins, dressed as a priest. I remember standing at the bus stop. People were looking at me. A gang of college students were coming down the street and I remember thinking, they are going to say something to me. I felt a little bit vulnerable. A man approached me. I thought, here it comes. The man said that he so admired the fact that I was on the street dressed as a priest, acknowledging the public debate right then. He told me that he realized that priests can be given a hard time.
