A WORD FROM YOUR PASTOR


Like generations before us we try to understand how God works, what God does and does not do. The first reading tells us that God came and made His presence known to Moses in a burning bush. A voice spoke and identified itself as "I am who am." The One who has always been and who created all things was making Himself known to Moses and to man desiring to be known through all generations. Paul reminds the Corinthians that those who believed found life and those who did not were struck down. Jesus then tells the people that there is no correlation between what happens to people and God's favor. God is merciful and is always ready to forgive but when He calls He wants a response. Like the parable of the fig tree God is patient but not does not want to be ignored. Many acknowledge God as a presence to be reckoned with but too often live with the attitude that they will get to that, God can wait like so many things on our to do list. God does not want to be put aside on a list and does eventually have His limits. Is it time to check in, to go deeper?

Tomorrow, Monday, March 21 is the Feast of St. Benedict's death. Because of our roots, we will honor and celebrate him. St. Benedict, an Italian Monk, is revered in our Church in a statue to honor the faith of our German immigrant parishioners. To understand that connection you need a little history. St. Benedict established monasteries all over Europe. When Sacred heart Church opened in Wilmington it was German Benedictine priests and sisters who staffed the parish serving a German immigrant community. When the next generation moved up the hill to St Elizabeth they brought their connection to Benedict given to them by their priests and sisters with them. We share that history because the same German Benedictine community of Sisters opened out school.

SACRAMENTS SACRAMENTS

The **Sacrament of Reconciliation** will be offered on Saturday morning after the 8:30am mass and not at 4:00pm.

The **Anointing of the Sick** may be requested after mass if you are preparing for surgery. "Last Rites" can always be requested at home or at the hospital. It is best to do so when the person is still able to participate in the prayer.

Funerals - Funeral directors will contact the church and make arrangements for you. Visitations in church are at the pastor's discretion and parish membership. Eulogies in church are discouraged by Diocesan Policy.

Weddings - Call for scheduling and PreCana. Couples should contact the parish at least 1 year in advance.

Baptisms - Baptisms will be celebrated on the 2nd and 4th Sundays at 12:30. We will limit these celebrations to two families. Families must be registered in the parish. Discuss dates with Lisa in the parish office when you are ready. Participation in one preparation session is required. This can be done before the birth of your child.



This Sunday's Readings

Family Connection

We may be unfamiliar with fig trees, but we might know about the growth of spring flowers. Perhaps we have looked at a dry, brown flower bulb and wondered how this produces the colorful tulip or daffodil blossom that we expect to bloom in the spring. Perhaps we've even thought about the patience and hope that are required to plant flower bulbs in October. We don't have to be gardeners, however, to know about patience and hopefulness. As parents, we practice these virtues each day with our children. We may become frustrated and even angered by their willfulness and lack of cooperation. Yet we continue to offer our attention and guidance in hope that one day our efforts will bear fruit. Today's parable suggests that God is like that with us, working with us in patience and in hope that one day we will show evidence that such work is not in vain. As parents, we know God's kindness when we find evidence for our hope for our children. Does God find such glimmers of hope as he works with us?


Gather your family and show a spring flower in bloom. Recall that in the fall this flower was a dry bulb (if a flower bulb is available, show this as well). Talk about the hopefulness and patience shown by those who plant flower bulbs in the fall in the hope that they will bloom in the spring. Read aloud today's Gospel, Luke 13:1-9. Compare the parable of the barren fig tree to your discussion about spring flowers. Consider the patience and hopefulness that God has with us as he works with us, calling us to return to him when we sin. Offer prayers of thanks and praise to God for his patience and hopefulness towards us. Conclude by praying together today's Psalm, Psalm 103.


