THE EUCHARIST: WHAT WE BELIEVE

One of the three sacraments of Initiation, "the Eucharist is the source and summit of the Christian life" (CCC1324). This is why as Catholics, one of the most important things we do is come together to celebrate Mass. Every Mass is a memorial of the sacrifice Jesus offered God the Father at the Last Supper. During that meal, Jesus instituted the Eucharist and told his followers, "Do this in memory of Me." Mass is the heart and soul of our worship of God. It is the celebration that gives us the strength we need to live a Christian life. Because of its importance, the Church places a serious obligation on all its members to take part in the Mass each Sunday and on holy days.

Eucharist is Jesus' true presence here on earth. Although a mystery, we as Catholics accept on faith the fact that bread and wine become the body and blood of Jesus because Jesus told us this is so. "The whole Christ is truly present, body, blood, soul, and divinity, under the appearances of bread and wine.; it is Jesus himself." (CCC 1374)

THE MASS: IN THE LITURGICAL YEAR

Like the natural seasons, the Church has seasons too. They are called liturgical seasons. One of the clearest signs of these seasons is the changing liturgical colors. With each change of seasons, the Church changes the color of vestments (clothing worn by the priest, or celebrant, and cloths adorning the altar).

The following colors are used:

Green is a symbol of hope and life. This is the color worn during ordinary time.

White is a sign of joy and celebration. This is the color worn during the seasons of Christmas and Easter, and for some designated Holy Days. This is also the color worn for sacramental celebrations, such as baptism, First Eucharist, holy orders and marriage. It is also worn for funerals, in honor, memorial and celebration of a person's life in Christ.


Violet (Purple) represents penance and reflection. This color is used during the seasons of Lent and Advent. It is also seen during the Sacrament of Reconciliation.

Rose is the color of joy and the promise of light. We see this color only two times during the year, on the third Sunday of Advent (Gaudete Sunday) and the fourth Sunday of Lent (Laetare Sunday).

Red symbolizes the blood of Christ and martyrs of the Church, it also represents the Holy Spirit. The priest will wear red on Palm Sunday, Good Friday and Pentecost. It is also worn for the feast days of martyrs, and for the Sacrament of Confirmation.

THE MASS: IN THE CHURCH BUILDING



The Catholic Church is the gift that Jesus Himself has given to the world. Like a great ship that carries God's people through the world, the Church is not just a single building or many - it's also the people who gather together to worship the Lord, receive Him and love Him, and through Him, love others, and the world He gave us. It's where we learn to be His FAMILY. When you enter Saint Luke, always take a look around. Jesus is everywhere! In the good people who worship with you, in the priest and in the deacon, in the Holy Scripture, and most of all, in the Blessed Eucharist - the greatest Sacrament! You are being invited to receive Jesus: but not just once, ALWAYS. As you get ready for your First Communion, it's okay to be excited! Your whole parish family is looking forward to joining us in the Holy Eucharist!



The Nave is the main space within the church where the congregation sits. The other rooms in the church are the **Community Room**, or the "lobby" area; the **Vesting Room** where the vestments (clothing worn by the priests, deacons, or altar servers) are hung. This is within the **Sacristy** where the items used for Communion and the celebration of the Mass are kept.



The Sanctuary is the elevated space within the church where the Main Altar resides. The Altar is the large, high table where the Eucharist is celebrated. It is "dressed" with a white Altar Cloth, and may be adorned with the colors of the Liturgical season. Behind the Altar is the Tabernacle, the beautiful golden box where the Blessed Sacrament is kept. We know that the Blessed Eucharist is in the Tabernacle when the red candle near it is aglow. Above the Altar is the Crucifix which reminds us what Jesus did lovingly for us in order to make our salvation possible. When you receive the Eucharist never forget that the same Lord who made the whole world, who died on the Cross, and rose again is the same Lord in the Eucharist you are receiving. He is JESUS with US! And He loves you so much that He wanted to give you the Eucharist in order to be close to you forever.



The **Ambo** is the place where Sacred Scripture is proclaimed, especially the Holy Gospel, and where the priest gives the **Homily**. It is located to the left of the Altar. The **Paschal Candle** is the large white, decorated candle by the Baptismal Font. It is set ablaze at Easter vigil, carried inside our church by the deacon, and it lights our own candles as a reminder that Jesus wants us to be His light of love to the world. It is kept glowing bright at the Holy Mass, at Baptisms, Marriages, and at Funerals to give us encouragement and hope.



The Cantor is the person who leads us in singing to the Lord at the Holy Mass. He or she is often surrounded by musicians and a choir made up of people in our parish family just like you

Preparing for the Celebration of the Mass

Just as you would prepare to host guests at a celebration with a meal in your home, preparations are made before each celebration of the Mass.

The Deacon or Sacristan prepares the items needed for the celebration of the Mass. This includes:

- Lighting the altar candles;
- Preparing the table which holds the gifts (ciborium with unconsecrated hosts and a cruet of wine) to be brought forward;
- Preparing the **Credence Table** to the side of the altar which holds **ciborium with unconsecrated hosts and wine** which will be brought to the altar for consecration at Communion time.
- Setting out the vessels that the priest uses for the Eucharist:
 - The **Chalice** to hold the wine that will become the Precious Blood,
 - The **Paten** which holds the bread that will become the Body of Christ,
 - A Corporal to collect any crumbs or spills, and
 - A **Purificator**, a linen cloth which is used to wipe clean the Chalice and the Paten

The Priest prepares by wearing special **vestments**. The wearing of vestments arose at the same time the celebration of the Mass was moved into church buildings as a way for people to tell who the various ministers were. The vestments we see the most are:

- An **Alb** is the first garment placed on by the priest, and is long and white. This is also what is seen being worn by **Altar Servers**.
- The **Cinture** is the cord tied around the waist of an alb.
- The **Stole** is a narrow cloth, similar to a scarf, draped around the neck of the priest. It symbolizes the authority given by the church and sacredness of his role.
- The **Chasuble** is the outer garment, similar to a poncho, and will match the color of the liturgical seasons.

Preparing for Mass: The Sacrament of Reconciliation

As Catholics, we fully participate in the celebration of the Eucharist. We are encouraged to receive Communion frequently and devoutly. In order to be properly prepared to receive, one should not be conscious of a grave sin, and should have fasted for one hour prior. The best practice is to receive the Sacrament of Reconciliation with enough frequency to have a clear heart and conscious when coming to receive our Lord in the Eucharist.

Preparing for Mass: Entering the Church

Each person coming to Mass should prepare and respect the holy place they are entering. Here are some ways you and your child can prepare:



- When first entering the Church, stop and dip the fingers of your right hand in the Holy Water Font placed by each of the entrances, and then make the Sign of the Cross.
- As you choose a place sit during Mass, be aware of your child's perspective. The more they can see, the more engaged they will be.
- Before entering your pew, turn towards the Tabernacle and genuflect. This is
 a sign of reverence towards Christ, and is done by kneeling on one knee and
 making the Sign of the Cross.
- Once in your pew, take a moment to kneel and talk quietly with God. This also
 gives your mind and body a moment to transition from the noise of the world to
 the peace of the Mass.



THE ORDER OF MASS: INTRODUCTORY RITES

- **Procession.** We stand as the presiding priest and other ministers enter the assembly. We sing a gathering song. The priest kisses the altar. He then goes to the chair where he presides over the celebration.
- **Greeting.** The priest leads us in praying the Sign of the Cross together. The priest greets us and we say, "**And with your spirit**."
- **Penitential Rite.** "I confess to Almighty God..." We admit our wrongdoings. We thank God for his mercy and ask for prayers.
- **Gloria.** "Glory to God in the Highest" We praise God for all the good he has done for us (this is omitted during Advent and Lent).
- **Opening Prayer.** The priest leads us in praying the Opening Prayer. We respond, "Amen."

THE ORDER OF MASS: LITURGY OF THE WORD

- **First Reading.** Proclaimed by a lector usually from the Old Testament or from the Acts of the Apostles. God invites us into a prayerful conversation.
- **Responsorial Psalm.** The cantor leads us in singing a psalm. This helps us think about what we heard in the first reading, and respond to the Lord.
- **Second Reading.** A lector then proclaims the New Testament reading. This tells us about how Jesus fulfills the life God is calling us to live, so that we can imitate Him. Daily Mass usually omits this reading.
- **Gospel Acclamation.** This is the "Alleluia!" The cantor sings it first and the congregation repeats. We stand to honor Jesus present with us in the Gospel that the Deacon or the Priest will proclaim. (During Lent the word *alleluia* is omitted).
- **Gospel.** The Gospel includes the words and actions of Jesus. It is read by a Priest or Deacon, never by a layperson.
- **Homily.** Then the Priest or Deacon explains the Scriptures we heard, and how we should practice what Jesus teaches us. Sometimes, he will also use this moment to tell us an important lesson or service that we should do.
- **Profession of Faith.** "I believe in one God..." All join in this declaration of what we believe. We pray the Nicene Creed which states the Truth about God and the Church.
- **Prayer of the Faithful.** "Lord, hear our prayer." Also known as General Intercessions or the Universal Prayer. We are lead in praying for those in need and for ourselves.

Order of Mass: Liturgy of the Eucharist

- **Preparation of the Altar Gifts.** This is also called the **Offertory**. We sit as the Altar is prepared, the collection is taken up, and the gifts of bread & wine are brought forward by members of our parish family.
- **Eucharistic Prayer.** The priest invites us to join in praying the Church's great prayer of praise and thanksgiving to God the Father. We stand, then kneel for this prayer. During this prayer the ordinary bread and ordinary wine, become the extraordinary body and blood of our Lord.
- **Communion Rite.** This part begins with the *Our Father*, followed by the Sign of Peace. After praying the Lamb of God, we receive the sacred body of Christ in the consecrated host.

ORDER OF MASS: CONCLUDING RITE

- Greeting and Blessing. "In the name of the Father..."
- **Dismissal.** "Thanks be to God!" We are sent forth to do good works, praising and blessing the Lord.
- **Recessional.** We stand as the altar servers, Deacon, and the Priest leave the altar. Out of respect, we do not leave our pews until the Priest has fully exited the Church.

RECEIVING COMMUNION

THIS IS HOW WE ARE TO RECEIVE THE BODY AND BLOOD OF CHRIST:

- Prepare your heart to welcome Jesus with folded hands.
- When you come up to receive the Eucharist, bow in reverence to our Lord who is in the Eucharist.
- You can choose to receive the Lord on your tongue or reverently in your clean hands.
 - ♦ **If you receive the Eucharist on the tongue,** please make sure to open your mouth wide, with your head tilted back.
 - ♦ If you receive the Eucharist in the hand, extend your hands with palms facing up, with your dominant hand under your other hand like a little throne. Make sure to allow the Eucharist to arrive in your hands before taking the Eucharist. After the Lord is placed in your cupped hand reverently pick up the Host with the hand on the bottom (dominant hand) and place it in your mouth.
 - ♦ When you hear the words, "The Body of Christ," please answer, "Amen."
 - ♦ When you come the Blood of Christ, bow in reverence to our Lord.
 - ♦ Wait until the Chalice is offered to you, and then hold it well with both hands, being careful to not let any of the Precious Blood drop or spill.
 - ♦ When you hear the words, "The Blood of Christ," please answer, "Amen."
 - ♦ Consume the Eucharist, prepare to receive the Blood of Christ, or return to your seat quietly with your hands folded in prayer.

Busted Halo—Holy Eucharist: How to Receive

AFTER RECEIVING COMMUNION

Jesus is within you now. Kneel and quietly share whatever is on your heart with Him in prayer. Give thanks, ask for help, or just quietly rejoice in His presence within you. This is a special time for you with Jesus. Let His Love fill you with peace.

Remain kneeling, and sing the Communion song with your parish family. Watch as the Altar table is cleaned. When the **Priest or Deacon** takes the Body of Christ back to the **Tabernacle, and everyone at the Altar bows**. Once this has occurred, you may be seated until the final blessing. Some people choose to continue to kneel until the clergy at the Altar all sit. That's fine, too.

RECEPTION OF COMMUNION BY FELLOW CHRISTIANS AND NON-CHRISTIANS

As Catholics, we welcome our fellow Christians to this celebration of the Eucharist, and pray that our common Baptism and the Holy Spirit will draw us closer and dispel the divisions which separate us. Because we believe that Christ is fully present in the Eucharist, reception of this sacrament is discouraged among those who do not share in our faith in Jesus Christ, or those whom are members of churches not fully united in the Christian, catholic faith. We do ask, during this time of the Mass, that they offer their own prayers for peace and the unity of the human family. (Code of Canon Law, canon 916 & 844)

- + FOR OCIC First Communion:

You'll receive your Sacraments at the Easter Vigil Mass on April 4, 2025, at 8pm

+ FOR FIRE First Communion: You will receive your First Holy Communion on May 3, 2025, at the 11 am Mass. This will be followed by the May Crowning.

(OCIC families are also invited to participate in the May Crowning on May 3! Don't forget to wear your special First Communion outfits.)



Frequently Asked Questions

Is there a dress code?

The liturgical color for the celebration of Holy Eucharist is white.

For girls: Suggested dress code for girls is a white dress, shoulders should be covered (Please no spaghetti straps unless a sweater or wrap covers the shoulders.) Veils are optional. Please do not have your daughter wear gloves. (If your daughter receives on the palm of the hand, the Precious Body may only come in contact with skin.)

For boys: Suggested dress code for boys is dress pants, white dress shirt, and tie or bow tie. Sport coats/blazers or suits may also be worn but are not required. Boys are welcome to wear the traditional white suit.

Can I take pictures at the Holy Mass?

No, because it is a distraction from the reverence we owe Christ at the Holy Mass. A photographer will be at all First Eucharist Masses taking pictures of that are just stunning! We post these images on our Saint Luke Facebook page for you to download. Pictures will be taken of each child with clergy and family following the Mass.

How many guests can attend my child's First Communion?

The only maximum is the Mass itself. If you will bring a large family or several friends, arrive early for your Mass so that you can get seats.

requirement to attend. But missing out also means that your child will have to attend at another time, on his or her own without friends and formators to provide encouragement and support.
