



What Are We Waiting For?

December 10, 2023

There was a time, a couple of generations ago maybe, when it was customary for stores to hold off until after Thanksgiving Day to put up their Christmas decorations. Now Hobby Lobby and Walmart and no doubt plenty of other stores have wreaths and decorations and colored lights and artificial trees and so forth on display as early as September. Maybe even earlier! Some shoppers may grimace at seeing Christmas angels on display about the time the public swimming pools shut down for the summer. Maybe other shoppers will think it is kind of fun. When children see it all, they become uncontainably excited—even in September! There is a kind of genuine and good excitement to it all, but it is a surface kind of excitement. It's about externals, and it's about stores making money.


Well, okay, that can be part of Advent, but if that's all there is, it's kind of like saying that a wedding is an event for which people get to dress up in really cool clothes. That is very true! But it's only the beginning. When we understand Advent thoroughly, we know that it is a multi-layered season of waiting with great excitement for something that soaks one's whole life every day. So what is it that we are waiting for?

Each of the four Sundays of Advent gives us a distinct theme. The first Sunday has the theme of Jesus' Second Coming; in a parable, Jesus teaches his hearers, "You do not know when the master of the house will come... Stay awake." The second Sunday presents John the Baptist calling for repentance; the coming of the kingdom of God is imminent and his hearers are on the tiptoe of expectation about being properly prepared. On the third Sunday John the Baptist ratchets up the anticipation by pronouncing, "among you stands one whom you do not know"; the long-awaited and eagerly-anticipated Messiah is already HERE but has not yet revealed himself; but he will soon! And the fourth Sunday gives us the Annunciation in which the archangel Gabriel visits a young virgin with the amazing call to become the mother of the Messiah.

Here are the layers of Advent, different yet interconnected like the layers in a parfait. From the cosmic consummation of all creation, to the immediacy of God's nearness to change everything in one's daily life, to the intimate and unique vocation of a teenage peasant girl. In it all, we discern the presence and action of God coming near to transform every living thing. Like a parfait. When the parfait you order is delivered to your table, you can see the layers clearly. At the bottom is a scoop of ice cream; next is a layer of chopped nuts; on top of that is a dollop of caramel; then maybe some granola; then another layer of ice cream; then a layer of chopped strawberries; and finally a crown of whipped cream. But as soon as you put your spoon into it, the ingredients get mixed up and blend their flavors. So it happens in the themes of Advent: the Second Coming is a cosmic event that changes the life of every individual who has ever lived; and the Annunciation, made privately to a young girl, transforms the entire universe. All of it is cosmic; all of it is applicable to every individual life. And all of it is about the coming of God in power and in love, to rescue and set right.

And even seeing artificial Christmas trees on display on September points in the right direction. There is a unique power in that display, a lot more power than seeing new gardening tools on display in February or the latest swimsuits in May. Even as a season that comes every year, Advent is life-changing. It is about God being present now, it is about God coming, it is about God changing and redeeming everything. It is ever-predictable, ever-new, and ever-surprising.



MESSAGE FROM OUR BISHOP Most Reverend Michael McGovern

Dear Friends in Christ,

Advent is a rich season of preparation for the celebration of the Lord's birth as well as a period of anticipation of the Second Coming of Christ at the end of history. Both the daily Eucharist and the Liturgy of the Hours (Morning Prayer & Evening Prayer) contain prayers, readings and antiphons that give us much to reflect upon.

When I was a seminarian preparing for the priesthood, I enjoyed Advent because I had more time for prayer and could absorb the themes of hope, expectation and promise that are key elements of the season. As a priest and now as a bishop, I find I have to try harder to dedicate time for quiet prayer lest Advent end up as a blur before Christmas.

If you also struggle with entering into Advent, permit me to suggest praying the Rosary frequently or even daily during the Advent Season.

Reflecting on the Joyful Mysteries of the Rosary (The Annunciation, Visitation, Nativity, Presentation and Finding in the Temple) can deepen our union with Jesus and Mary. As we meditate on these mysteries, we are impressed by the fidelity of God who made a promise to the people of Israel and fulfilled that promise so magnificently that the whole human race receives hope for salvation.

As this column goes to print, I anticipate creating a podcast that listeners can join with me in praying the Rosary frequently during Advent. Look for more information about the podcast on our diocesan website (www.diobelle.org) or the Bishop McGovern Facebook page.

If you own a rosary, I encourage you to keep your beads close at hand to facilitate prayer. Place a rosary on your nightstand, in the car, at the kitchen table, in your purse or pocket. Even if you can pray a decade or two on any given day, it will help Advent to take shape in your spiritual life. If you have an Advent wreath in your home, and can safely light a candle, you might pray the rosary at home in the glow of the Advent wreath.

May the weeks of Advent 2023 be rich in prayer for all of our readers. May the Virgin Mary place each of you close to Jesus, her Son.
