



The Great O's December 17, 2023

One of the most beautiful hymns for Advent is "O come, O come Emmanuel", first published in 1851. Its verses are paraphrases of seven invocations of the Messiah under titles found in the Biblical book of Isaiah They are appointed as accompaniments for the Song of the Virgin Mary used in evening prayers on the last seven days of the season, beginning today, December 17. Tradition traces them back to the sixth century. Since each verse begins with the invocation "O", they have been known for centuries as the "great O's". In the form we know best from the hymn, they are:

O Sapientia, appointed for December 17

The first Great O is "O come, thou Wisdom [in Latin, 'sapientia'] from on high, who orderest all things mightily; to us the path of wisdom show, and teach us in her ways to go." In this Great O, Christ is the "Wisdom from on high" in whom alone everything makes sense, and we ask him to show us the path we are to follow.

O Adonai, appointed for December 18

The second Great O is "O come, O come, thou Lord of might [in Latin, transliterated from the Hebrew, 'Adonai'], who to thy tribes on Sinai's height in ancient times didst give the Law, in majesty, and cloud, and awe." God first revealed that the way to joy begins in the giving of the Law on Mount Sinai. Submission to God does not mean loss of self, but its finding.

O Radix Jesse appointed for December 19

The third Great O is "O come thou Rod of Jesse's stem [in Latin, 'radix Jesse'], from every foe deliver them that trust thy mighty power to save, and give them victory over the grave." When the Messiah is described as the "Rod of Jesse's stem," we are given the confidence that the longed-for deliverance has been God's plan from the beginning. The power of evil, then, is always on the outside trying to get in, and will ultimately fail.

O Clavis David appointed for December 20

The fourth Great O is "O come, thou Key of David [in Latin, 'clavis David'], come, and open wide our heavenly home; make safe the way that leads on high, and close the path to misery." The title "Key of David" speaks of a sure and certain deliverance from a world of unreserved wickedness from which, otherwise, there is no appeal. Ultimately the path that is opened is the one that, opened widely, leads to the heavenly home which is promised to the faithful.

O Oriens appointed for December 21

The fifth Great O is "O come, thou Day-spring [in Latin, 'oriens'] from on high, and cheer us by thy drawing nigh; disperse the gloomy clouds of night, and death's dark shadow put to flight." The word "Day-spring" suggests the dawn coming to shed light all over a world that had been engulfed in darkness. This light is not a limited illumination like a torch or campfire; the light of Oriens covers the entire world. The plea of this Great O is that Jesus, the Light of the world, will rescue us forever from the threat and enticements of the seductions and deceptions that clutch at us.

O Rex gentium appointed for December 22

The sixth Great O is "O come, Desire of nations [in Latin, 'rex gentium', or 'King of the nations'], bind in one the hearts of all mankind; bid thou our sad divisions cease, and be thyself our King of Peace." Jesus is the One for whom all the world longs. Even though many either cannot articulate that desire as being truly for Jesus, or would reject him as being the One they think they truly desire, do not all people and nations really long for justice, for peace, for safety and security, for beauty, and for all that is good? These are the qualities whose only source is Jesus; apart from him, they cannot endure or even exist.

O Emmanuel appointed for December 23

The seventh and final Great O is "O come, O come, Emmanuel [Hebrew for "God with us"], and ransom captive Israel that mourns in lonely exile here until the Son of God appear." The title "Emmanuel" tells us that we are asking for what we already have. It is a fitting conclusion to the list of the Great Os, for "God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but have eternal life... Light has come into the world... Those who do what is true come to the light" (John 3:16, 19, 21). Emmanuel: one who is both longed for and already here, the Answer to our deepest and every need.
