My Dear People of God!

I enjoy writing these weekly messages to you. I hope that they are of some benefit to you. For time to time, people will come to me and ask what I will write about next after we considered the year of the saints. I have thought about it for a while, and I thought that what would be timely would be considering the Nicene-Constantinopolitan which is the full name of the Creed that we profess each Sunday at Mass. The reason I have thought this would be appropriate is that this year, we celebrate the 1700th Anniversary of the Council of Nicaea at which the Church composed the Creed that would then be finished at the Council of Constantinople in 381. Thus, the year 325 becomes important for us. In fact, to mark this occasion, Pope Leo XIV has expressed a desire for him to travel to Turkey (where ancient Nicaea lies) to pray there and meet with the Ecumenical Patriarch Bartholomew and there to profess the Creed that binds all Christians together.

The Creed simply expresses the truths of the Church. We profess each week to renew the Faith of our Baptism. In the earlier days of the Church, the part of the Mass that began with the Creed was called the "Mass of the Faithful." The Creed was introduced into the Mass around the year 1000 to show what it meant to be faithful. If I am ready for the next part of Mass, I must first be able to profess the Creed. In other words, we show our belonging to the believers in Christ by our ability to profess the Creed.

Rather than merely being able to recite the words, we are called to profess it with our mouths for it should come from a deeper place in our hearts and minds. It is good therefore to be able to pause and think about what we are saying.

To end this reflection today as an Introduction to the Creed, I would like to ask that we read Judges 12: 1-7. This curious story helps to explain the importance of the Creed. It becomes our "password" or why that we know that others are truly Christian. Pope Leo and Patriarch Bartholomew as separate leaders of the Churches believe the same truth because they profess the same Faith. We likewise can tell who is a true believer when we hear them profess the same timeless Creed that we profess each Sunday.

This week, as we begin to reflect on the Creed, let us look at once and see what it says. Do we ever stop and think about the words? Are there phrases that seem strange? Has it become our "shibboleth" or password that shows that we truly believe what other Christians of other lands and times profess?
