From the Desk of Fr. Lakmin Silva

Understanding the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception of the Virgin Mary

The "Immaculate Conception"

means that Mary,

whose conception was

brought about

the normal way,

was conceived without sin

or its stain.

As we celebrate this solemnity, it's important for us to understand what the doctrine of the Immaculate Conception is and what it is not. Some people think the term refers to Christ's conception in Mary's womb without the intervention of a human father, but that is the "Virgin Birth." Others think the

Immaculate Conception means Mary was conceived "by the power of the Holy Spirit," in the way Jesus was, but that, too, is incorrect.

The Immaculate Conception means that Mary, whose conception was brought about the normal way, was conceived without original sin or its stain. She was preserved from the stain of original sin and its consequences and, therefore,

was redeemed by the grace of Christ but in a special way by anticipation.

The implicit reference of this teaching may be found in the angel's greeting to Mary. Gabriel said, "Hail, full of grace, the Lord is with you." (Luke 1:28)

There are some who suggest that the dogma of the Immaculate Conception sounds deterministic. In other words, Mary was not free to cooperate with the plan of God, as she was preserved by God's grace from the beginning of her existence. Yet we know at the Annunciation she was told her vocation and her consent--with her free will--comes from her words, "Behold, the Lord's handmaid. May it happen to me

according to your word. And the angel departed from her." (Luke 1:38)

God may call someone to be a part of His divine plan, but God does not take away the ability of that person to say "no" to His call. Because of that freedom, God's people have the option to also say "yes." A call from God becomes a treasure when that per-

son says "yes"; he or she becomes a powerful instrument in the hand of God. That's how Mary's "yes" becomes a landmark in salvation history and Mother Mary secures a special place in our hearts.

Therefore, on December 8, 1854 when Pope Pius IX defined as Catholic doctrine the teaching of the Immaculate Conception of Mary, the Pope had those reasons to substantiate that proclamation.

And don't forget what hap-

pened four years after the dogma was defined: In one of the apparitions of Mother Mary to Bernadette at Lourdes, she said, "I am the Immaculate Conception," which Bernadette, as a 14-year-old, wasn't sure what those words meant, but every adult did. We all are privileged to profess and celebrate the Immaculate Conception of Mary.

St. Louis de Montfort says, "God the Father gathered all the waters together and called them the seas... He gathered all His graces and called them Mary." And St. Francis De Sales tells us to "run to Holy Mary as her little children, and cast ourselves into her arms with perfect confidence."





Veneration of the Relics of St. Pio Thank You to Our Volunteers



219. "What is the 'parousia' and how is it connected to Advent?"

The one word that is often used during Advent is the Greek word "parousia" because the first half of the season is typically dedicated to Jesus' "parousia," or "second coming." The word refers to an "arrival" or "presence," and signals the day when Jesus will return in glory.

Advent has always been associated with this Christian belief as the first coming of Jesus on Christmas naturally reminds us of his second coming, for which we are to prepare ourselves. When preparing yourself for Christmas, keep in mind this oft-forgotten aspect of Advent. Look forward to the end of time when Jesus will come again, wipe away all tears and put a definitive end to all suffering on earth.

Last week's Gospel invokes this need to prepare ourselves for the second coming of Jesus: Stay awake! For you do not know on which day your Lord will come. (Mt 24:42)

Additionally, the Catechism of the Catholic Church confirms this spiritual theme of Advent, "When the Church celebrates the liturgy of Advent each year, she makes present this ancient expectancy of the Messiah, for by sharing in the long preparation for the Savior's first coming, the faithful renew their ardent desire for his second coming." (CCC 524)





219. ¿Que es la "parousia" y cómo está conectada al Adviento?

Una palabra que es utilizada en Adviento es la palabra griega "paurosia," por que la primera parte de este tiempo es típicamente dedicada a la "parosia" de Jesús o "segunda venida." La palabra se refiere al "arribo" o a la "presencia" y los signos del día cuando Jesús regresará rn su gloria. Esta palabra es utilizada a través del Nuevo Testamento griego.

El tiempo de Adviento ha sido siempre asociado con la creencia Cristiana de la primera venida de Jesús en las Navidades y naturalmente nos recuerda a la segunda venida, para la cual nosotros nos estamos preparando. Cuando se encuentre usted preparándose para la Navidad mantenga en mente este aspecto, de Adviento, que es generalmente olvidado y prepárese para el fin de los tiempos cuando Jesús regrese nuevamente para borrar las lágrimas y poner fin a todo sufrimiento terrenal.

El evangelio de la semana pasada, del primer domingo de Adviento invoca la necesidad de prepararnos para la segunda venida de Jesús: Manténganse despiertos! Por que no saben en que día el Señor vendrá de nuevo. (Lucas 24:42)

En adición el Catecismo de la Iglesia Católica, confirma este tema espiritual de Adviento. "Cuando la Iglesia celebra la Liturgia de Adviento, ella hace presente cada año esta antiquísima expectativa del Mesias, compartiendo la larga preparación para la primera venida del Salvador, y la renovación fidelísima del ardiente deseo de la segunda venida." (CCC 524)
