# 2024 Lenten Almsgiving

During the Lenten season we focus on prayer, fasting and almsgiving. This year St. Thomas a' Becket will be donating to the SJ5K, Super Jesse 5 Kilometer, and our St. Vincent de Paul Conference.

The SJ5K is a benefit run hosted by high school students at the Plymouth-Canton Educational Park to home and support local families in crisis. Each year, the event's purpose is to bring the community together to provide hope, support, and financial relief for families facing illness, medical emergencies, or other life-altering situations. One of our parish families is being helped this year.

Over the past thirteen years, the SJ5K has been able to support over 60 local families. One of the six families being helped this year is from our own Becket community. To learn more about the event and the history of the event visit www.SJ5K.org

# From the Pastor's De **5** k:

You will notice in this weekend's bulletin an envelope for the 'Catholic Services' (CRS) Annual Relief Collection. This organization sponsored by the American Bishops and provides emergency assistance around the world. One of the areas CRS is trying to provide relief to is Gaza. Unfortunately, it is still very difficult to get aid into Gaza. Please see the article below from the President & CEO of CRS, Sean Callahan, as he shares insights from his recent visit (January 2024) to Gaza and other areas of the Middle East.

"CRS has 45 Gazan staff members currently inside Gaza. Almost all my colleagues are now displaced from their homes, with many having been displaced multiple times. They are living in overcrowded shelters, in other people's homes, and even outside under a tarp or tent with winter weather upon them. Still, despite all the losses they have experienced, and the uncertainty they navigate daily, they have been assisting people in even greater need. As one of my Gazan colleagues told me, 'We cried for the first two weeks and then we went back to work. Doing things offers a sense of purpose.'

People saying that assistance can't take place in Gaza that it's too chaotic - but as you'll see here, the provision of lifesaving aid is taking place thanks to dedicated, brave Gazans. We also toured our new warehouse, adjacent to the office, that used to be a supermarket. CRS has distributed food, tarps and tents, bedding, hygiene supplies, and assistance to more cash 100,000 people. The team has ensured all is organized and controlled, so people are safe and understand the process.

We visited communities where help is greatly needed, where families were forced to come from areas in the north..... This might be the fourth or fifth time they have been displaced since the war began, and they don't know where to go. We'd see families being dropped off just sitting there saying, 'What do we do now?'

After years of tension between Ukraine and the Russian Federation, Russian forces began a devastating war in February 2022 by invading Ukraine. In addition to killing and wounding many, the conflict has forced millions of Ukrainians to flee the country. Many refugees went to neighboring countries in Europe, but many other came to the United States. For decades the Migration and Refugee Services (MRS) department of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB) has assisted refugees fleeing wars and persecution, and in 2022 it responded to the Ukrainian refugee crisis with two initiatives to help local communities welcome refugees.

The first initiative, Welcome Circles, is a community-led program that helps local groups work together to provide financial support and connect refugees to services such as health care and education. Although Welcome Circles are locally led, they are certified vetted, and given ongoing guidance by MRS staff or local affiliate experts. MRS's support and guidance help each Welcome Circle accompany refugees effectively during the resettlement process. As of early 2023, the Welcome Circles program already had 25 circles engaging more than 200 volunteers and had expanded to welcome refugees from Haiti, Cuba, Nicaragua, and Venezuela addition to Ukraine.

Funds received through The Catholic Relief Services Collection allow MRS to help victims of war and oppression begin new lives in welcoming, supportive communities through innovative initiatives like Welcome Circles and POWIR. In addition to MRS, the collection supports other Catholic organizations that aid victims of persecution and natural disasters, provide legal services to poor immigrants, and advocate for the powerless.

# Pray for a Cease Fire

The October 7, 2023, Hamas attack on Israel was brutal, killing over 1200 people and more than 240 people were taken hostage. It was the worst loss of life in a single day since Israel's founding in 1948. It was horrific and inhumane.

Israel declared war on Hamas shortly after the attack, and in the months that have followed over 28,000 Palestinians have been killed. Humanitarian relief efforts are extremely limited. Many of the places the people of Gaza have taken shelter (including the Catholic Church in Gaza,), have been attacked. Medical facilities have been targeted, utilities have been cut off, access to clean water is limited and food is scarce. The situation deteriorates every day.

The Peace and Justice Committee is centered on Catholic Social Teachings which call for Dignity of the Human Person, Solidarity, Care for the Poor and Vulnerable, and Care for God's Environment. Pope Francis has called for an end to the Israel Palestine violence.

It is a long, complicated history between Israel and Palestine. The solution is not easy; however, war is not the answer. As you continue your Lenten journey we ask you to pray for a cease fire in the Israel/ Hamas war, pray for Ukraine, and pray for peace throughout the world.

A humanitarian crisis across the Holy Land continues to escalate since the October 7th attack on Israel and subsequent air strikes that have since devastated Gaza. Since the start of the conflict, 25,490 Palestinians and 1,200 Israelis have been killed -70% of whom are women and children. The people of Gaza continue to experience deprivation and deadly violence, with no way to protect themselves or provide for their families. As access to food, shelter, and water has deteriorated, hunger has become of heightened concern. According to recent estimates, 25% of the population in Gaza is at imminent risk of famine if the situation does not dramatically improve.

An estimated 1.7 million people - 75% of the population in Gaza - are displaced, with many living on the street without protection from the elements. These conditions are especially dangerous for children and pregnant women, people living with disabilities, and those suffering from illness or recovering from injury. Infections and waterborne illnesses are spreading rapidly, especially among children under age 5. Current humanitarian aid efforts are unable to meet the scale of need."

Please continue to pray for the civilians in Gaza and please be as generous as possible to the annual collection to CRS.

# Lenten Regulations on Fast And Abstinence During Lent

The Law of Abstinence obliges those 14 years of age and older not to eat meat.

The Law of Fast obliges all those from ages 18 through 59 to refrain their eating to one full meal and two lighter meals for the day. The other two meals, sufficient to maintain strength, may be taken according to each person's needs, but together they should not equal another full meal. Liquids are permitted between meals. When health or ability to work would be seriously affected, the law does not oblige. If in doubt concerning fast and abstinence, a parish priest or confessor should be consulted.

<u>Ash Wednesday</u> and <u>Good</u> <u>Friday</u> are days of both <u>Fast and</u> <u>Abstinence</u>. In the United States, <u>all</u> Fridays of Lent are days of abstinence (no meat).



# **Disposal of Palms**

Because they have been blessed by a priest and therefore are holy

objects, the palm branches used for Catholic Church services (especially those used on Palm Sunday), should not be disposed of in the regular fashion. Once an object is blessed, it is considered to be in the service of God and should be treated with respect. Therefore, it is considered sacrilegious to throw a holy item in the garbage where it might end up in a sewer or a landfill.

Holy palms should be returned to nature. Should you wish to dispose of it, you may bury it or burn it and spread the ashes outside.
