What's in Your Heart?

n the past fifty years, there seems to have been a quiet but noticeable shift in the lived faith of Catholics in the pews. None of it has been officially or formally decreed, though it might very well be the natural unfolding of what the Second Vatican Council was about. It seems to have simply happened, perhaps by the workings of the Holy Spirit. I would highlight four common shifts.

People's faith seems to have moved from a primary concern with doctrine or what we believe, to spirituality or how we live out what we believe as people of faith and where God is in our lives.

What's in our hearts has been a focus. It suggests that while actions are important, where the actions originate and what they say about who we are is also important in trying to understand why we do what we do.

People pray differently. While the rosary and devotional prayer is nurturing to the faith of many, there has also been a discovery of other forms of meditation, quiet reflection, and praying with sacred scripture.

Confession no longer seems to be about only reporting kinds and numbers of sins but also about what is in one's heart and how people find themselves relating to others. People confess both attitudes and actions that are destructive rather than moral lists.

It would seem that all of this echoes this week's Gospel, which focuses on divisive anger, lustful lifestyles, and faking the truth, that is, what is in our hearts.

In those days, in their thirst for water, the people grumbled against Moses, saying, "Why did you ever make us leave Egypt? The LORD answered Moses, "Go over there in front of the people, along with some of the elders of Israel, holding in your hand, as you go, the staff with which you struck the river. I will be standing there in front of you on the rock in Horeb. Strike the rock, and the water will flow from it for the people to drink." This Moses did, in the presence of the elders of Israel. The place was called Massah and Meribah, because the Israelites quarreled there and tested the LORD, saying, "Is the LORD in our midst or not?"

Reading II

Rom 5:1-2, 5-8

Brothers and sisters:
Since we have been justified by faith,
we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ,

to this grace in which we stand,
and we boast in hope of the glory of God.

And hope does not disappoint, because the love of God has been poured out into our hearts through the Holy Spirit who has been given to us. For Christ, while we were still helpless, died at the appointed time for the ungodly. Indeed, only with difficulty does one die for a just person, though perhaps for a good person one might even find courage to die. But God proves his love for us in that while we were still sinners Christ died for us.

Lord, you are truly the Savior of the world; give me living water, that I may never thirst again.

It was about noon.

Gospel

Jn 4:5-42

Jesus came to a town of Samaria called Sychar, near the plot of land that Jacob had given to his son Joseph. Jacob's well was there. Jesus, tired from his journey, sat down there at the well.

A woman of Samaria came to draw water. Jesus said to her, "Give me a drink." His disciples had gone into the town to buy food. The Samaritan woman said to him, "How can you, a Jew, ask me, a Samaritan woman, for a drink?" —For Jews use nothing in common with Samaritans.— Jesus answered and said to her, "If you knew the gift of God and who is saying to you, 'Give me a drink,' you would have asked him and he would have given you living water." The woman said to him, "Sir. vou do not even have a bucket and the cistern is deep; where then can you get this living water? Are you greater than our father Jacob. who gave us this cistern and drank from it himself with his children and his flocks?" Jesus answered and said to her, "Everyone who drinks this water will be thirsty again; but whoever drinks the water I shall give will never thirst; the water I shall give will become in him a spring of water welling up to eternal life." The woman said to him, "Sir, give me this water, so that I may not be thirsty or have to keep coming here to draw water."

Jesus said to her,

"Go call your husband and come back."

The woman answered and said to him,

"I do not have a husband."

Jesus answered her,

"You are right in saying, 'I do not have a husband."

For you have had five husbands,

and the one you have now is not your husband.

What you have said is true."

The woman said to him,

"Sir, I can see that you are a prophet.

Our ancestors worshiped on this mountain;

but you people say that the place to worship is in Jerusalem."

Jesus said to her,

"Believe me, woman, the hour is coming

when you will worship the Father

neither on this mountain nor in Jerusalem.

You people worship what you do not understand;

we worship what we understand,

because salvation is from the Jews.

But the hour is coming, and is now here,

when true worshipers will worship the Father in Spirit and truth;

and indeed the Father seeks such people to worship him.

God is Spirit, and those who worship him

must worship in Spirit and truth."

The woman said to him,

"I know that the Messiah is coming, the one called the Christ;

when he comes, he will tell us everything."

Jesus said to her,

"I am he, the one speaking with you."

At that moment his disciples returned,

and were amazed that he was talking with a woman,

but still no one said, "What are you looking for?"

or "Why are you talking with her?"

The woman left her water jar

and went into the town and said to the people,

"Come see a man who told me everything I have done.

Could he possibly be the Christ?" They went out of the town and came to him. Meanwhile, the disciples urged him, "Rabbi, eat." But he said to them, "I have food to eat of which you do not know." So the disciples said to one another, "Could someone have brought him something to eat?" Jesus said to them, "My food is to do the will of the one who sent me and to finish his work. Do you not say, 'In four months the harvest will be here'? I tell you, look up and see the fields ripe for the harvest. The reaper is already receiving payment and gathering crops for eternal life, so that the sower and reaper can rejoice together. For here the saying is verified that 'One sows and another reaps.' I sent you to reap what you have not worked for; others have done the work, and you are sharing the fruits of their work."

Many of the Samaritans of that town began to believe in him because of the word of the woman who testified, "He told me everything I have done."

When the Samaritans came to him,

they invited him to stay with them; and he stayed there two days.

Many more began to believe in him because of his word, and they said to the woman,

"We no longer believe because of your word; for we have heard for ourselves, and we know that this is truly the savior of the world."

REFLECTION

People of Israel were in the desert sine there was no water they complain to God or cry to God for water. Samaritan woman was thirsty, so she comes to the well. At the well she meets the savior and escaped the hell. Today, let us

reflect about divine encounters. In the Bible, there are many examples of encounters. But let us base this particular reflection on the Samaritan Woman's encounter with Jesus. five truths about encounters we can learn from this passage.

An Encounter is a Heavenly Appointment (Read John 4:1-6)

The opening verses of this chapter have the impression that the entire incident was circumstantial. But it wasn't so. Jesus' life was always in sync with the Spirit. He traveled across Samaria because he was led by the Spirit into that village. Just because encounters take place when we least expect them, doesn't mean they are coincidental or circumstantial. They are heavenly appointments.

Encounters aren't Seasonal or Geological (Read John 4:7-8)

The Samaritan woman didn't meet Jesus on a Shabbat or in a building dedicated to carrying out religious activities. It was just another ordinary and busy day in which she carried out her routine household duties. Encounters aren't seasonal or geological. We can experience an encounter regardless of the season or place if we seek the experience earnestly.

An Encounter can Convict us of Sin (Read John 4:9-26)

Confronting her issues with the opposite sex was the turning point of the encounter. This was essential. Understandably she felt very uncomfortable at this point; and so shifted the direction of the conversation from her personal problems to worship. The fact that encounters can get very uncomfortable sometimes because they convict us of our own sinfulness and our need for a savior.

An Encounter can Reignite the Fire in Us (Read John 4:27-38)

Her genuine interest in the topic of worship indicates she was very religious. Her lifestyle, however, indicates that she was spiritually dead. Jesus' words ignited in her a fire more powerful than any religion. She rushed back to tell others about the man she just met. Mere religion can't empower us for service. Only the fire of the Holy Ghost could. Only an encounter with God can reignite the fire within us.

An Encounter can bring Transformation (Read John 4:39-42)

We are introduced to two types of transformation. The first type is individual

transformation. (The transformation of the Samaritan woman.) The second type is the transformation of the community. (The transformation of the village.) An authentic encounter will always be followed by individual transformation as well as a transformation of one's community.


