Weekly Flow Outline

1. Before You Meet With the Children

Read the Scripture readings, especially the Gospel. Readings can be found at: <https://bible.usccb.org/readings/calendar>

2. Invite the Holy Spirit

Ask the Holy Spirit to guide your words and actions.

3. Welcome the Children

Begin with a warm welcome and the *Sign of the Cross*.

4. Proclaim the Gospel - Read out loud directly from Scripture.

5. Reflection Questions (sample questions provided but follow the Spirit!)

Encourage children to participate but never require a child to speak.

6. Send Forth

Close with prayer and return to Mass reverently.

Reminder

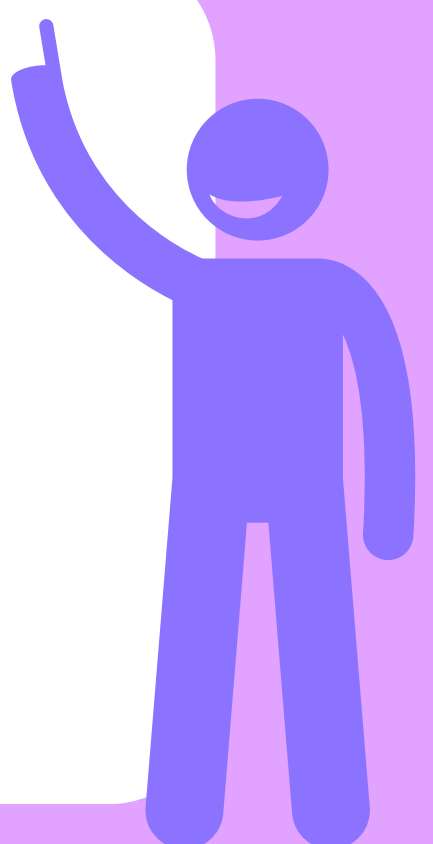
God works through your kindness, patience, and presence.

Trust that the Holy Spirit is at work—even in moments of silence.

Thank You

Your presence helps our parish children encounter Jesus in a way that is prayerful, welcoming, and suited to their age. You are not expected to have all the answers. Your role is simply to help the children listen to the Gospel and reflect on how it connects to their lives. *Children's Liturgy of the Word* is an invitation—an opportunity for children to feel safe, seen, and loved by God and by the Church.

2nd Sunday of Advent – Prepare the Way

Scripture

- First Reading:
Isaiah 11:1–10
- Gospel:
Matthew 3:1–12

We prepare for Jesus by choosing good and loving actions.

Reflection Questions

Personal: Is there something Jesus is asking you to change?

Relational: How do your words affect others?

Mission: Who can you encourage or treat kindly this week?

Catechist Note

Keep the children's focus on hope and change, not guilt.

Sending Forth Prayer

Jesus, help us prepare our hearts for You. Amen.

GOSPEL

A reading from the holy gospel according to Matthew

Matthew 3:1–3, 9, 11

John the Baptist started preaching in the desert of Judea.

John was the one the prophet Isaiah was talking about
when he said,

“In the desert someone is shouting,
‘Get the road ready for the Lord!
Make a straight path for him.’ ”

From Jerusalem and all Judea
and from the Jordan River Valley
