Weekly Flow Outline

1. Before You Meet With the Children

Read the Scripture readings, especially the Gospel. Readings can be found at: <https://bible.usccb.org/readings/calendar>

2. Invite the Holy Spirit

Ask the Holy Spirit to guide your words and actions.

3. Welcome the Children

Begin with a warm welcome and the *Sign of the Cross*.

4. Proclaim the Gospel - Read out loud directly from Scripture.

5. Reflection Questions (sample questions provided but follow the Spirit!)

Encourage children to participate but never require a child to speak.

6. Send Forth

Close with prayer and return to Mass reverently.

Reminder

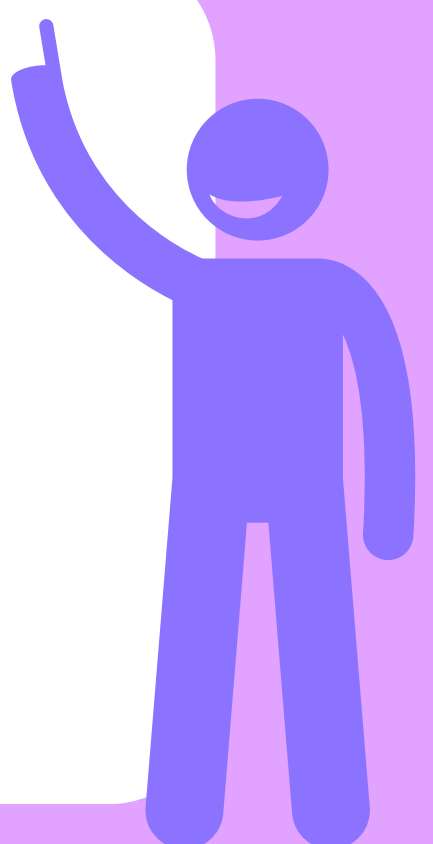
God works through your kindness, patience, and presence.

Trust that the Holy Spirit is at work—even in moments of silence.

Thank You

Your presence helps our parish children encounter Jesus in a way that is prayerful, welcoming, and suited to their age. You are not expected to have all the answers. Your role is simply to help the children listen to the Gospel and reflect on how it connects to their lives. *Children's Liturgy of the Word* is an invitation—an opportunity for children to feel safe, seen, and loved by God and by the Church.

GOSPEL

A reading from the holy gospel according to Matthew

Matthew 1:18–24

This is how Jesus Christ was born.
A young woman named Mary was engaged to Joseph
from King David's family.
But before they were married,
she learned that she was going to have a baby
by God's Holy Spirit.

Joseph was a good man and did not want to embarrass Mary
in front of everyone.
So he decided to quietly call off the wedding.

While Joseph was thinking about this,
an angel from the Lord came to him in a dream.
The angel said, "Joseph, the baby that Mary will have
is from the Holy Spirit.
Go ahead and marry her.
Then after her baby is born, name him Jesus,
because he will save his people from their sins."

So God's promise came true, just as the prophet had said,

"A virgin will have a baby boy,
and he will be called Immanuel,"
which means "God is with us."

After Joseph woke up, he and Mary were soon married,
just as the Lord's angel had told him to do.
