3. Participates in parish activities/ministries when possible.

4. Uses the parish envelope system for donations. These are the main factors that will be considered in making the determination that someone is an "active Other criteria are also taken into consideration when requesting a sponsor certificate.

5. Must have received the Sacraments of Baptism, Confirmation and Holy Eucharist

6. If single, should not be co-habitating with significant other.

7. If married, must have been married by either a Catholic priest or deacon.

Do not be afraid...

When Jesus Climbs Into Your Boat

Have you ever thought how Jesus Christ comes to be Lord of all areas of your life? It isn't all at once, is it? First, we give him our heart and tell him we want to live for him, and yes there is that wonderful peace and joy and we know we are loved. But then we go back to work on Monday and the real world hits and we wonder "How can my faith make any difference in this place?" We know his teachings and we know we are going to Heaven, but how does he transform our marriage or our family or our workplace into the arena for his love works?

Well, often, he does exactly what he did with Peter in this morning's Gospel: He asks us if he can use our "boat", our boat being whatever we use everyday to get us by, to gain security for ourselves. He doesn't start preaching to us, he just enters kind of simple-like and then starts asking us to try his path in the particular area he has entered. He may ask some very simple task of obedience and if we say "Yes," as Peter did, we will be amazed at the results. Peter was.

Our Everyday Movements

Our everyday movements can also speak to us on a deeper level if we open ourselves up to them. Sharing a meal with a friend as a love-bond with someone who nourishes us in our emptiness. Emptying a seed pod and realizing that we, too, have to let go before new growth can come. Lighting a candle to dispel our inner darkness.

Emptying and cleaning closets or boxes while we are ridding ourselves of some inner clutter. Looking at photo albums when we need to remember the love and joy that past journeys have offered to us.

Writing a letter in a lonely time as a reminder of connections of love that we still have.

Dear Padre,

Who was St. Valentine? Do our Valentine's Day traditions of love and romance have anything to do with the actual St. Valentine?

There were actually three St. Valentines. One was a priest who was beheaded in Rome on February 14 in the year 269. Another was a bishop, who was also martyred in the third century. Both are buried on the Appian Way in Rome. The third St. Valentine is a lesser-known saint who died in Africa with a number of companions during the early

centuries of the Church. The tomb of this St. Valentine became a center of popular devotion in the early Middle Ages. In 496, Pope Gelasius set aside February 14 to honor this particular St. Valentine.

The popular romantic customs that surround our present Valentine's Day trace their origins back to the Middle Ages. The English writer Geoffrey Chaucer noted that halfway through the second month of the year, February 14, the birds begin to choose their mates. For this reason, the day was looked upon as specially consecrated to lovers and as a proper occasion for writing love letters and sending lovers' tokens. People who gave or received these tokens or letters were referred to as "valentines." In the Middle Ages, a legend also developed that St. Valentine the priest left a farewell note for his jailer's daughter, who had become his friend, and that he signed that note "From Your Valentine."



Unsolicited Calls

ometimes life calls us to a place that feels just right, as if it's where we're meant to be. I know a person who has always wanted to be a dad, and so he is—a stay-at-home dad of three, and he loves it. On the other hand, sometimes life's calls unfold in directions beyond our plans and seem to flow from a wisdom greater than our own. Author John Grisham studied to be a lawyer, something that unfolded into his becoming a writer of mysteries and thrillers instead. Calls seem to be written upon our spirits. How else would God call us?

Isaiah, Paul, and Peter found themselves called by God into lives they never wanted, baffled by God's whys and wherefores. Their calls pushed them into lives they initially resisted.

Such calls can happen to us as well. A man finds himself caring for his aged mother after his father's death. His siblings seem unwilling or unable to help, so there is no one else. Grandparents find themselves raising their grandchildren because their son's or daughter's life is frayed beyond repair, and there is no one else to nurture and love the children. The calls of God at times are calls into lives not of our own choosing. They arise from

greater needs when there seems to be no one else but us to say "yes." Our reluctance and anxiety may attest that these calls come from God. They then become paths to ever-deepening faith and trust in God. •
