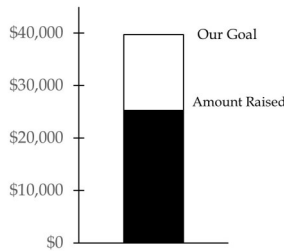

Children's/Youth Ministry

"IN THE LOOP" WITH THE HIGH SCHOOL YOUTH MINISTRY

High School Youth Ministry will *not* meet this Easter Sunday, April 5. Our sessions will resume on **Sunday, April 12**, with a session titled "Pursuing Happiness: A Worthy Adventure?" Using clips from the movie *The Pursuit of Happyness*, this session encourages participants to look within their own experiences of family and friends to determine if happiness is something you pursue or simply experience as gift. Is happiness a journey or a destination? How one defines happiness and what a person decides is required to find it can sometimes make all the difference in the world.

MIDDLE SCHOOL YOUTH MINISTRY

From the Book of Ann Marie

Dear Parish Family,

“For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son,
so that everyone who believes in him might not perish but might have eternal life.”

John 3:16

This passage, so often seen on a sign behind home plate or in the end zone of a football stadium, is really a summary of all that we celebrate today, on Easter. We celebrate a God who loves us so much that he would do almost anything to help us understand that love and what it means for our lives. We celebrate a Son who did everything he could to help us understand how we should live our lives in relationship to God and others. We celebrate that life does not end with death (Jesus’ life or our own), and that the gift of eternal life makes it possible for us to live with courage and hope.

Throughout Lent, we have been hearing about the covenantal relationship between God and his people – his promises to Noah, and Abraham, and Moses – and how God sent prophets and messengers to Israel, trying to help the people understand how they could live in harmony with God and each other. But the people just couldn’t get what God was trying to help them understand. It is amazing that God didn’t just throw his hands up and walk away from us.

But God didn’t. In fact, he did the opposite. He moved toward us. One of the most beautiful images of reconciliation is the idea that two people who are separated from each other come back together. And in any reconciliation, one party has to be the first to move toward the other. That is what God did. He so loved the world that he was willing to send his Son to us. The whole idea of the incarnation (God becoming human) is pretty incredible. It is only out of love that God would do that for us.

“For God so loved the world...” God *loves* the world. God loves us. God loves you, in a very specific way. And me. And the people who put Jesus to death. And the pilot who just crashed the plane in the French Alps. It seems to me that God should be more discerning about whom he loves, but I am so very thankful that God isn’t. This love is so big, so forgiving, so all-encompassing that it is impossible for me to really understand, and yet it is my life’s work, as a Christian, to try to live within it. It seems to me that that is what Jesus did, and what I am supposed to do as well – to live God’s love in the world.

But how? I think that one of the hardest first steps is to allow ourselves to experience the love of God for us personally. It took a long time for me to be able to see myself as God created me – not at all perfect, but unique, with my own set of strengths and weaknesses – and to trust that God loves me now, in this moment. God is not waiting for us to become our best selves before God loves us, in the same way a parent loves their child in each stage of development, in each moment of their lives.

And trusting in that love, in God, gives me strength and wisdom to try to live as Jesus did – with compassion, open to all, reaching out to the least, and with a message: “You shall love the Lord, your God, with all your heart, with all your being, with all your strength, and with all your mind, and your neighbor as yourself” (Luke 10:27).

This Easter celebration is a reminder to me (and I hope to you) that this love that God has for us, and the Good News that Jesus brought to this Earth, could not be silenced on the cross. It didn’t end in a tomb. Because of Jesus’ life and death and resurrection I know that there is more, that we have come from God and are returning to God, and that loving God and neighbor in this life is the best response I can give to the love God pours out on me and the whole world.

Three themes from Catholic social teaching shape the Church's concern about global climate change. First, concern for the environment calls us to respect human life and dignity. Pope Francis always emphasizes that respect for human life and dignity cannot be separated from care and defense of all God's creation. Second, as the world becomes increasingly interdependent, we are called to promote the common good and deepen the virtue of solidarity globally. Third, in caring for the environment, we have a special responsibility to the poor and vulnerable, who will suffer most as earth's climate changes. It is good to be reminded in the Easter season that Jesus has great confidence in us and sends us—as the Father sent him—into the world to witness to his great love by loving others greatly. 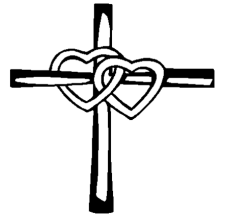

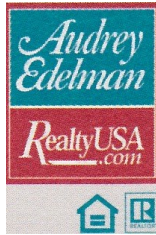
