# Memorial Service for George Floyd, Elijah McClain, and Other Victims of Racism

In recognizing our calling as Catholics to defend the dignity of every human life and to stand against racism, Immaculate Conception and Catholic Charities are inviting all Catholics to a vigil on Friday, August 21, at 6 p.m. in front of Immaculate Conception Church (corner of Geneva and Seneca Streets in downtown Ithaca). All people who want to stand up for the sacredness of Black lives are warmly welcomed.

Join us for a pubic witness in support of racial justice and the dignity of the human person. This is a peaceful, family-friendly event. Masks and social distancing are required, and you are welcome to bring a lawn chair. We will use this time to pray, reflect, repent, and stand in vigil as we resolve to dismantle racism in our hearts and in our society.



This date was chosen because it is on the eve of the three-month anniversary of the murder of George Floyd, whose death at the hands of police brought the world's attention to the issue of racism in the United States. This is also the one-year anniversary of the murder of Elijah McClain, the young man who died at the hands of the police in Aurora, Colorado, after he was stopped while returning from the market because of his "suspicious" ski mask.

In preparation for the vigil, we encourage everyone to make a sign (or two) that speaks to your own commitment to end racism and/or support for Black lives. You can certainly use the internet to find inspiration for your sign(s) but you are encouraged you use your own creativity, especially if you have children who will be joining in the vigil.

"When [racism] is acknowledged, it is only with bland sentiments of concern that are calculated to not disturb white Catholics. Church leaders rarely have the courage to address how central white racial resentment and fragility are in shaping our public life. They are more concerned with the comfort of white people than the terror that racism forces people of color to live with."

#### **CROSS-MAKING ACTIVITY**

We are inviting each household to join us in decorating a white cross that will be placed on the front lawn of our church to remember the thousands

of victims of this pandemic. Each cross will represent 1,000 of the dead in our country. We will have hour-long shifts in our parking lot where those in your household can come to decorate your cross, adding a Scripture quotation, the names of those you



know who have died from COVID-19, your own artwork, prayers, and images. At the end of each hour, we will place your crosses on the front lawn of St. Catherine's, creating a memorial, a sign of hope that death is followed by resurrection.

We are offering two days for decorating the crosses, at a variety of times throughout these days. We will decorate on Tuesday, August 18 (rain date August 20) and Sunday, August 23 (rain date August 30). There are only a certain number of spots for each time, so sign up quickly to get the time and date you want.

We will be decorating in the Parish Center parking lot, with each household assigned a table at a socially appropriate distance from other households. You can bring lawn chairs if you wish. Crosses and paint pens will be provided, as well as information about how to decorate the crosses and Bibles to assist with selecting a verse. We ask all to wear masks and to park on the east side (small parking lot) of the church.

We hope that you will each participate in this opportunity to remember the lives that have been and continue to be lost during this pandemic. We believe that this is a very safe, family-friendly, outdoor way for our community to gather and work together (yet separately) to bring attention and hope to this pandemic.

#### **PARISH GARDEN PROJECT**

Our parish garden is having a fabulous year! We planted 19 raised beds with a selection of vegetables

which were planted largely at the request of Loaves & Fishes. So far we have delivered 511 pounds of vegetables to Loaves & Fishes: 60 pounds of spinach, kale,



and red lettuce in June, and 451 pounds of beets, buttercrunch lettuce, broccoli, cucumbers, spinach, tomatoes, yellow squash, and zucchini in July. We continue to harvest basil, beets, broccoli, Brussels sprouts, cabbage, carrots, cauliflower, cucumbers, eggplant, lettuces (3 types), kale, oregano, peppers, spinach, tomatoes, yellow squash, and zucchini, and will soon begin planting a fall crop as well. A huge thank you to our volunteer *Robin Tobin-Field*, who has been in charge of this splendid crop that continues to supply our neighbors in need.

#### HELP FOR SANCTUARY SEEKERS

First Congregational Church in Ithaca became a Sanctuary Church this past fall. They have agreed to

house, feed, and help people who are in need of sanctuary. St. Catherine's Pastoral Council made the decision to be a partner with First Congregational Church, helping in this effort. We were informed last week that First Congregational Church has accepted a mother and toddler into sanctuary. St. Catherine's is responsible for one week every five weeks, with our first week being August 23-29. Parish volunteers will help with grocery shopping and the cost of food, but we are also looking for volunteers who speak Spanish who can practice English with the mom, and families with small children who are willing to

#### FROM THE BOOK OF ANN MARIE

Dear Parish Family,

Presidential election time, this every-four-year cycle we are in the midst of, is usually balanced by the thrill (for me!) of the Summer Olympics. I love the Olympics! I love watching sports that no one around here plays, the amazing feats of physical skill, the team sports and the individual ones, and just about everything that happens during those two weeks of international competition. Unfortunately for me (and many), without the Olympics we are

only left with the political cycle — and what a cycle it is. There is almost no one I know who doesn't have a strong opinion these days about all things political.

Recently, a few parishioners have asked for guidance on voting as a Catholic. This is not an easy thing, since both major political parties are strong with some things Catholics believe, and against other things that Catholics believe. There is no party that is a clear fit for us, so we are left with hard choices.

In *Evangelii Gaudium*, Pope Francis points powerfully to the importance of politics and our role within them:

"An authentic faith ... always involves a deep desire to change the world, to transmit values, to leave this earth somehow better than we found it. We love this magnificent planet on which God has put us, and we love the human family which dwells here, with all of its tragedies and struggles, its hopes and aspirations, its strengths and weaknesses. The earth is our common home and all of us are brothers and sisters. If indeed 'the just ordering of society and of the state is a central responsibility of politics,' the Church 'cannot and must not remain on the sidelines in the fight for justice.'"

So what are we to do? First, let's please remember that each of us is Catholic before we are Republican or Democrat. If we are not Catholic first, then we have no way to make either party a clearer reflection of our Catholic values. It is our duty, as people of faith, to challenge the things that either party does that go against Gospel values. Blindly following the platform of a political party is not what faithful citizenship calls us to. Faithful citizenship tells us we must be voters, but who we vote for has to flow from our own conscience and the Gospel values of our faith.

Faithful citizenship also calls us to look not just at political positions, but also at the character of the person and their capacity to do what they say they will do. Recently Bishop McElroy from San Diego gave a talk where he outlined 10 "current" priorities that are key elements of social teaching and moral theology. The list will make both political parties uncomfortable, which is why I really like it. He then goes on to highlight three specific ones in really clear terms—abortion, climate change, and what he calls "the culture of exclusion," by which he means racism, anti-immigration, and religious bigotry. His is a hard-hitting analysis of why each of these issues is worthy of preeminence in voting, yet all make a moral claim upon us. He names it this way:

"Seen against this background of abortion, climate change and the culture of exclusion, it is clear that the faith-filled voter who seeks to be guided by Catholic social teaching is confronted by compelling moral claims that cut across the partisan and cultural divides of our nation. The pathway from these cross-cutting moral claims to decisions on particular candidates is not a direct and singular one in Catholic teaching, rooted in one issue. For this reason, the drive to label a single issue preeminent distorts the call to authentic discipleship in voting rather than advancing it."

Obviously, there are no easy answers when it comes to our work as faithful citizens, and it is up to each of us to follow our consciences while making our decisions.

Here is one more thing for us to think about when it comes to this political cycle we are in. I will quote from Bishop McElroy:

"Pope Francis ... proposes that we can only fulfill our vocation as faithful citizens if we come to see in the very toxicity of our political culture at the current moment a call for deeper conversion to Jesus Christ. It is not enough for us to ignore the corrosive elements of political life in the United States, nor even to navigate our role as citizens and voters without succumbing to the tribalism that bisects our society. We are called in our lives as citizens and believers to be missionaries of dialogue and civility in a moment that values neither. And this requires deep spiritual reflection, courage and judgment. It demands a Christlike dedication to seeking the truth no matter where it may lie, and defining our politics and voting in the light of the Gospel."

There is much work for us to do within all of this. Let's commit to being "missionaries of dialogue and civility" in the weeks and months ahead.

Answering the census is important: around \$1.5 trillion in federal spending is distributed each year using formulas that incorporate census data, including payments for Medicare and Medicaid, programs funded through block grants, Head Start, and the National School Lunch Program.
