

Parish Reminders

LENTEN PRACTICES

Just a reminder that all Fridays of Lent are days of abstinence, which means that those 14 years of age and older are obliged not to eat meat. Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are days of fasting and abstinence. The Church defines fasting this way: Those between the ages of 18 and 59 are obliged to eat only one full meal, with two lesser meals and only liquids between meals. If, due to medical reasons, you cannot fast, the regulation does not apply to you.

As a reminder, if the Ithaca City Schools close, the Parish Office will be closed and Mass or any other prayer experiences will also be cancelled. FROM THE BOOK OF ANN MARIE


Dear Parish Family,

In pre-pandemic times, I would use a little time during our Ash Wednesday and Lenten Soup Suppers to talk to the community gathered about Catholic Relief Services and the CRS Rice Bowl. Catholic Relief Services is very near and dear to my heart because I was able to be a part of two different CRS "Called to Witness" programs that brought youth ministry leaders

to countries served through CRS. I went to the

Holy Land in 2000 and to India in 2001. Both were life-changing experiences for me. If you have picked up a Lent Kit from St. Catherine's, you will find a CRS Rice Bowl in it. Our parish has been a big supporter of CRS through the years, so I trust that it will continue!

When I was a kid, I remember getting a Rice Bowl at my elementary school—but it came with little information other than it would be used to help poor kids in other lands. I can't say that it really captivated me or enticed me to share my allowance! The videos and stories they have on the Rice Bowl website now are really powerful and do a great job of helping children (and adults) understand how the money we give



makes such a difference in the lives of others. You can find this year's videos and reflections here: https://www.crsricebowl.org/.

I wanted to share a story with you about my trip to India. The very first place that we went after we had our in -country orientation (and went to the Taj Mahal!) was in a very rural village. We were greeted by this sign as we entered the school area: "School is for Children; Work is for Elders." There is a small school here that is specifically designed to help children who have been released from labor to catch up in their education before they go to the government-run school. The school is run through the support of Catholic Relief Services. It is an outdoor school, and when we asked what they liked about school, one of the girls answered "the shade." She had previously been in the fields with cattle all day.

This was such a rural area, it seemed like an odd place to have child labor be such an issue. We learned that it was a part of the local culture. The parents had never received an education, so they didn't realize that their children should be in school. Most of the children who are "released" from child labor in this area of the country were working in their homes, helping their mothers care for the house, cook, and garden. Some children were also working for local farmers, caring for cattle or otherwise working on farms. Older children might be working for stores or small industries.

The work CRS was doing in this village wasn't just to help with the school, but they were a part of helping to change the culture in this region of India so that everyone understood that "school is for children, work is for elders." Until everyone understood this, it was hard to make progress. One of the ways this cultural shift was made was through youth activists. There were young adults, ages 17–23, who were first generation schooleducated. There were about 1,000 who were employed, but over 20,000 who volunteered. Their job was to visit families whose children were not in school, or whose children had left school. They would talk to the family about the importance of having their children in school—but it wasn't a one-time visit. They would return over and over again. The parents who had received these visits said the fact that they got multiple visits made them realize that this was a very serious issue, and they took it as a sign of concern for their family that these young people visited over and over again. The organizers of these efforts talked about the change they saw once this cultural change started to take place. One said this: "When children become children, the parents

become parents. They take pride in their children's schooling, and they treat their children with more love and pride." Children "become children" when they are allowed to go to school, make friends, play, and have a social circle outside the family unit. Interestingly, because most of the children were working in their own homes, there was also education for the parents to help them understand how both men and women can share household chores. The children continue to help with chores after school, in great part because of the bond they have with their mothers.

This is the type of work that CRS does throughout the world. They do start and support schools, although this is a relatively easy part of their work. More of their work is in supporting local communities to do the much

more difficult work of changing a culture so that children get an education, parents value their children differently, and a community comes to a new understanding of how it should be ordered. They don't do this by coming in from the outside, but by supporting local people and local efforts to transform their own communities. Besides the youth activists, there were parent groups that worked with other parents to help bring them around to the importance of school. There were other groups of employers who helped change the culture in the area from the use of child labor to the importance of giving those same jobs to the "elders," parents who should be working to support their children.




This is just one of the many stories I brought home with me. As

St. Catherine's is focused on social justice right now in our faith formation programs, it is good to recognize that our charity (donations of money) are what make the advocacy and justice initiatives possible elsewhere. Justice and charity are the two feet of love in action (as Pope Benedict XVI reminded us). We can't always be involved physically in changing a culture for the better in India, but our donations through the CRS Rice Bowl allows us to be a part of this type of effort in many places throughout the world. I hope this one story will help you understand why the CRS Rice Bowl is so important.

What You Give Up For Lent Changes Lives

Each Lent, Catholic families across the country unite to put their faith into action through prayer, fasting and almsgiving. Through CRS Rice Bowl, families learn about how our sisters and brothers across the globe overcome hardships like hunger and malnutrition, and how through Lenten alms, we have the power to make the world a better place for all.

This Lent, we are asking our St. Catherine's community to unite in our Lenten fast and almsgiving, focusing our attention on the 159 million people they serve in over 100 countries by Catholic Relief Services.

How to participate:

- 1. Go to CRSRiceBowl.org.
 - Watch the Stories of Hope Video for each week with your family and read the additional information on the website. Make this a Sunday (or other say of the week) event throughout Lent.
 - Use the meatless recipes to try new tastes from around the world.
 - Read the Reflection about almsgiving
- 2. Make a plan for yourself or as a family, choosing a specific way that you will contribute to the Rice Bowl (or any container,

if you don't receive a Rice Bowl). It is really powerful when you can connect it to your Lenten Fast.

- Take the money that you usually spend on something you are giving up and contribute it.
- Intentionally eat more simply for 1-2 meals a week and contribute the savings.
- If the thing you are giving us has no monetary value (gossip, for instance), you might make a contribution each time you are tempted by gossip, or a larger contribution if you break your fast.
- 3. If you have children in the house, be sure to include them in sacrificial giving to the Rice Bowl. Writing a check from your family account, regardless of how generous, does not teach children that sacrificial giving is powerful and important in living out our faith.
- 4. When Easter arrives, count the money in your Rice Bowl, decide if you want to give more, and then return your Rice Bowl to St. Catherine's. (Twenty-five percent of all contributions to the Rice Bowl stay local and support Loaves and Fishes in Ithaca.)



Because singing creates the most risk when people are gathered, we ask the community to refrain from public singing. Our music ministers record music for our liturgies.


