

FROM THE BOOK OF JOE

Dear Parish Family,

So, even though June and Fr. Joe do their due diligence in finding substitutes for when Fr. Joe is away doing army training, still, errors happen. Two weeks ago on Saturday the priest scheduled to cover for me forgot. Consequently, there was no Sacrament of Reconciliation or Saturday 5

p.m. Mass.

Substitute priests have forgotten to show up twice during my thirteen years as serving as your pastor. While this is not a regular occurrence, it's still not great.

While missing a Mass here is inconvenient, we fortunately live in a county with an abundance of Masses. We have included the Mass schedule for Tompkins County on our website; it is also posted at every entrance of our church. We also implemented a new process whereby the substitute priest's phone number will be in the sacristy, and he will be called and reminded.

Someone asked why we could not just have a Communion Service, now known as the Sunday Celebration in Anticipation of the Eucharist. That's a great question. While Communion Services were more common in our diocese in the past, our present bishop is very clear that he does not like that as an option. The preference is to cancel a Mass and encourage the faithful to enter into full participation in the Eucharist at a different church rather than have a Communion Service (which is not the fullest expression of the Eucharist).

Let's face the facts: we do not have an abundance of young men seeking ordination in the United States. Correspondingly, we do not have a lot of practicing Catholics either. Today there are 66 million Catholics in the United States; 12 million of them are actually practicing their faith. There are 35,000 ordained priests. That means there is one priest for every 339 practicing Roman Catholics in the United States. In comparison, there are 145 million Catholics in Brazil with 17,000 ordained priests. Even if a third of the Catholic population is practicing, that makes almost 3,000 people per priest in Brazil.

Now, I am not saying that there isn't a shortage of ordained ministers. However, we may be seeing a paradigmatic shift in *how* we live out our Catholic experience. This is a wakeup call. The diocesan priesthood is aging. There are fewer and fewer substitutes available. The days of Masses of convenience are ending. We simply do not have the person power that we had in the past to maintain what we did in the past. Even though St. Catherine's has produced several priests, none of them serves in our diocese.

We have been changing how we do things here at St. Catherine's, and we will continue to change. The way I see it, we can wallow in self-pity that things are changing, or we can be the resilient community that I know we are and start being more forward thinking. Instead of fearing change as loss, we can reframe change as opportunity.




