FEBRUARY IS BLACK HISTORY MONTH: MORE REFLECTIONS FROM THE ANTI-RACIST BOOK GROUP

Did you know that six million Black people moved from the American South to Northern, Western, and Midwestern states between 1915 and 1970? This mass movement is known as the Great Migration.

The Warmth of Other Suns: The Epic Story of America's Great Migration by Isabel Wilkerson, a book that sat on my "to read someday" list, finally got off the shelf. We opted for an audiobook version, which brought the book to life. The book is a walk through the lives of three African Americans who chose to leave the South in pursuit of a better life in the North.

The book is written like a novel, but these people are far from fictional. The author integrates how unwritten laws, immigration, and migration impacted their families, their life choices, and American history.

I was fortunate to chat with people who lived in Detroit during the Great Migration. It has given me a perspective I never had from my U.S. history classes, or at least I can't remember.

Please don't be intimidated by the length of the book. You too may say, "I didn't realize, I didn't understand why" while you read this book.

Isabel Wilkerson was the first Black woman in the history of American journalism to win a Pulitzer Prize, which she won in 1994 for her feature reporting as Chicago bureau chief for the New York Times. The Warmth of Other Suns (Random House, 2010), which won the National Book Critics Circle Award and the Heartland Prize for Nonfiction, among other awards, is her first book.

FROM THE BOOK OF JOE

Dear Parish Family,

Lent is finally almost here – hooray!

As the Liturgy Committee and I were reading the lectionary for Lent, we quickly agreed that the readings were calling us to continue the “journey” theme that we began in Advent. We noticed some interesting differences between the Lenten journey and the Advent journey. In Advent, we were confronted with biblical characters who were *seeking* the Christ. In these Lenten readings, we encounter people who are confronted with Christ and have to choose. The Lenten readings call us to enter more deeply into our faith journey, while acknowledging the obstacles. In the Scripture, these obstacles are called temptations.

Throughout the entire season, we will encounter people who struggle to follow the way. One of the similarities between our Advent journey and our Lenten journey is that the Holy Spirit is with us on the journey. Life is a journey of faith, and along the way we are strengthened by the Holy Spirit. In the end, we will find ourselves, along with all these other biblical characters, at the foot of the cross, where the only thing that will help us endure this pain and the pain in our own lives is faith! We will find that we need the community to assist us on our journey along with the Holy Spirit. We cannot walk this journey alone; we need each other to get through our everyday struggles. This isn’t about crises of faith – it is about our day-to-day struggles of being disciples in a world that disdains faith and that calls people of faith weak or dumb.

With that in mind, we are going to introduce more communal time and less individual prayer time in our liturgy (although we encourage you to do individual prayer on your own). We will recite the Confiteor together. After the homily, we will invite the community to enter into a moment of silence to reflect on your own personal struggles and be mindful of your neighbors’ struggles, and together we will offer them to the Holy Spirit to help us be more faithful. This time will begin and end with the ringing of a chime. Now don’t panic – it will not be a long silence, only about 60 seconds – but hopefully it will be enough time for us to gather our thoughts.

Because we are still on this journey, we thought it might be powerful to unite with a charity organization called SOLES4SOULS. They repurpose gently used shoes – the operative word being *gently* used. So we will be providing bins for gently used shoes from **February 22 (Ash Wednesday) until March 31**. To see the amazing things that are being done through this organization, please go to soles4souls.org.

Finally, yes, we all still have to fast, pray, and give alms. These disciplines help us to be more faithful followers, less consumed by our own needs and more conscious of the needs of others. The rule is: On Ash Wednesday, Good Friday, and all Fridays of Lent, **everyone age 14 and up must abstain from consuming meat**. On Ash Wednesday and Good Friday, **everyone age 18 to 59 must fast** unless exempt, usually due to a medical reason.

Jesus said to his disciples: "Do not think that I have come to abolish the law or the prophets. I have come

not to abolish but to fulfill. Amen, I say to you, until heaven and earth pass away, not the smallest letter or the smallest part of a letter will pass from the law, until all things have taken place. Therefore, whoever breaks one of the least of these commandments and teaches others to do so will be called least in the kingdom of heaven. But whoever obeys and teaches these commandments will be called greatest in the kingdom of heaven. I tell you, unless your righteousness surpasses that of the scribes and Pharisees, you will not enter the kingdom of heaven. You have heard that it was said to your ancestors, *You shall not kill; and whoever kills will be liable to judgment*. But I say to you, whoever is angry with his brother will be liable to judgment; and whoever says to his brother, 'Raca,' will be answerable to the Sanhedrin; and whoever says, 'You fool,' will be liable to fiery Gehenna. Therefore, if you bring your gift to the altar, and there recall that your brother has anything against you, leave your gift there at the altar, go first and be reconciled with your brother, and then come and offer your gift. Settle with your opponent quickly while on the way to court. Otherwise your opponent will hand you over to the judge, and the judge will hand you over to the guard, and you will be thrown into prison. Amen, I say to you, you will not be released until you have paid the last penny. You have heard that it was said, *You shall not commit adultery*. But I say to you, everyone who looks at a woman with lust has already committed adultery with her in his heart. If your right eye causes you to sin, tear it out and throw it away. It is better for you to lose one of your members than to have your whole body thrown into Gehenna. And if your right hand causes you to sin, cut it off and throw it away. It is better for you to lose one of your members than to have your whole body go into Gehenna. It was also said, *Whoever divorces his wife must give her a bill of divorce*. But I say to you, whoever divorces his wife—unless the marriage is unlawful—causes her to commit adultery, and whoever marries a divorced woman commits adultery. Again you have heard that it was said to your ancestors, *Do not take a false oath, but make good to the Lord all that you vow*. But I say to you, do not swear at all; not by heaven, for it is God's throne; nor by the earth, for it is his footstool; nor by Jerusalem, for it is the city of the great King. Do not swear by your head, for you cannot make a single hair white or black. Let your 'Yes' mean 'Yes,' and your 'No' mean 'No.' Anything more is from the evil one."




