FIRST SUNDAY OF LENT


My ancestors were known for being great thinkers (the Greeks), yet here I struggle to compose a brief personal reflection on what the first week of Lent means to me. Apologies in advance, Aristotle. — Alejandro Bernard-Papachryssanthou

Simply put, the first Sunday of Lent is a time to "come clean" and prepare yourself to receive the transformative power of Christ. Mark says, "The kingdom of God is at hand. Repent, and believe in the gospel." If it only it were that easy! Whenever I have tried to negotiate with God in the past, I have often failed to uphold my side of the bargain even when he upholds his. This has led me to believe that repentance does not come in the form of a transaction. Rather, I believe that repentance is much broader, a form of personal humility or vulnerability to God that will pave the way for me to become closer to him, so that I may love and help others as Christ did. I hope that I can be brave enough to be open to God's promise this year.

Please join me in a communal prayer as we experience the first week of Lent together:

O God of covenant, I hold St. Catherine of Siena Parish in prayer during this first week of Lent. Help us to reflect on your promise of eternal life, which was accomplished through the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. And may the renewal of our baptismal commitments to avoid sin, generously love all as brothers and sisters, and serve the Church bring us the promise of salvation.

WHAT DOES THE CHURCH SAY ABOUT THE CLIMATE CRISIS?

Come learn about the Church's teachings on the climate crisis as Karl Pillemer leads a discussion on Pope Francis's *Laudate Deum*. HOPE FOR THE JOURNEY AHEAD

Throughout Lent, there will be a visual representation of the Scripture readings on the table in front of the ambo. This week, the tablescape focuses on the "Journey of Lent" through water and our continued baptismal journey.

Water symbolizes life and is used to cleanse, heal, restore, replenish, bless, and purify. Water reminds us of the covenant that God makes with us through baptism, providing us a new life as a child of God.

Cairns are rock formations used as landmarks to guide travelers along a path or to mark a sacred place. Cairns have evolved as symbols of friendship, stability, safety, and direction. They can offer guidance for those wandering in life and have been spotted all over the world.

We encourage you this week to uncover the spiritual meaning in water and cairns as they can provide a quiet sense of direction, peace, and strength.

LENTEN PRAYER CARDS

In Colossians 4:2, God tells us to pray and be there for one another, devoting ourselves to prayer, being watchful and thankful. Who among us needs our prayers? We often learn of prayer requests at church or in our Book of Intentions. This year, on Ash Wednesday and throughout the weeks of Lent, we made prayer cards and bowls to help us with a deeper commitment to one another and to "ready" our hearts, minds, and community for the upcoming Easter celebration.

There is a table in the lobby with wooden bowls, pens, and cards. The cards are provided for you to fill out for yourself, family, friends, or loved ones. Throughout Lent, feel free to fill out a card with the first name of an individual and leave it in the bowl and then take a card from the bowl to pray daily for someone else. God hears every word from your mouth, thought in your mind, and whisper of your heart.

We encourage you to "write one and take one" - you may or may not know the person or their specific need/s; however, we believe in the power of love and community. For intentions that are more private in nature, we will provide a sealed box, and the Liturgy Committee will pray confidentially for these requests.

On the table will be other Lenten materials focusing on the three primary pillars of Lent: prayer, fasting, and almsgiving. Stop by often as you enter and exit Masses.

FR. JOHN'S HOMILY FOR THE FIRST SUNDAY OF LENT

The first Sunday of Lent always presents the temptation of the Lord. This is because the Lord fasted for 40 days, rebuffed the temptations of the devil, and then began his public ministry. The number 40 is used many times in the Bible – 146 times to be exact – and represents a period of testing, trial, probation, and preparation. At the time of Noah, it rained for 40 days and 40 nights as Noah was prepared to begin humanity anew. Moses lived 40 years in Egypt being prepared to experience God in the burning bush. He spent 40 nights on Mt. Sinai before receiving the

covenant of the Commandments, and then led the people for 40 years through the desert until they were ready to receive the promised land. Elijah spent 40 days traveling to Mt. Horeb, Sinai actually, prepared to receive a message from God for a new world order. Jesus fasted for 40 days and then began his public ministry. After his death, resurrection, and ascension, the apostles spent 40 days in prayer before they received the Holy Spirit.

And so, we have the 40 days of Lent. We spend 40 days fasting, in self-denial, 40 days doing everything we can to come closer to God so we can make our baptisms, our sharing in the Easter life of the Lord, a reality in the world.

Usually on this Sunday we hear about three different temptations the Lord endured: turn rocks into bread; demand that your Father work a miracle to save you; and trade His love for all the power of the world. We do not come upon these this year, because they are in the Gospels of Mathew and Luke. Today's reading is from the Gospel of Mark. Mark just states that Jesus went into the desert for 40 days, was confronted with temptations, beat away the devil, and then began his mission.

To prepare for Easter we spend 40 days confronting temptation. I would like to share about temptations today. Sometimes people think that they must be very sinful because they have all sorts of temptations. People who are tempted are not sinful. They are alive. If any of us stops having temptations in our lives, we should check our pulse—we are probably gone from this world.

Temptations are difficult to overcome. If they were easy to fight off, then there would be no sin in the world, and we would be living on another planet. No, temptations are difficult. Every temptation contains elements of attractiveness and has deep within it an aspect of goodness. Here is what I mean by that. All God's creation contains beauty. However, we can prevent that beauty and turn something that is good into something bad. For example, the human body is beautiful; pornography is a perversion of this beauty. Another example: there are wonderful medications to help people who suffer from anxiety attacks and depression. The same medications can be used by some for the pleasure they bring, the euphoria for some, resulting in them destroying their lives as well as the lives of those around them. Pain medication is good. But seeking euphoria is bad. It has resulted into the opioid epidemic.

In the 17th chapter of the Book of Revelation, the visionary John is shown a woman who was wearing purple and scarlet and adorned with gold, precious stones, and pearls. She was amazing to behold. But as the visionary looked he learned that she was drunk with the blood of the saints and the martyrs of Jesus. She was seated on a huge beast that straddled seven hills. Rome was built on seven hills. The woman was pagan Rome with all its splendor and glory. It was marvelous. It had architecture, sculptures, and paintings. People were astounded at the glory that was Rome. But Rome was evil. Its beauty had been corrupted by evil. By the time of the Lord, Rome was a moral cesspool, the center of all that was wrong in the world. All sin is attractive. If it were not attractive, we would not be tempted by it.

Some people live by saying, "If it feels good, do it." What are they really saying? What they are saying is that anything is acceptable if they are getting pleasure from it. That is the way of the world. It is the way of selfishness, not the way of love. That is not the way of Jesus, nor can it be our way.

FR. JOHN'S HOMILY FOR THE FIRST SUNDAY OF LENT (CONTINUED)

Jesus is the conqueror of sin. But his battle was not a simple task. Jesus was tempted to save his own life, give up, and not go along with the Father's plan. This plan would lead to his suffering and death. Why shouldn't he instead reject this and choose a life of riches? But Jesus's love for the Father and his love for us were more powerful than anything the devil or the world could bring up.

He beat away temptation and then told us: "Entrust your pain, your temptation, and even your sin to me. I have conquered evil and will continue to conquer evil." We are told to fight temptation with the Lord. When we choose Christ, the devil really does not stand a chance. In the battle for the Kingdom, Jesus fights with us, finding a way for us to win. Our weakness becomes a source of our strength because it leads us to depend on the Lord. St. Paul recognized this and gave us a prayer that was the prayer of life. This is Phil: 4:3: "I can do all things in Him who strengthens me."

God refuses to give up on us, even when evil makes inroads into our lives: "See I have set my bow in the skies as a sign that I will never destroy my people." That was the promise made to seal the covenant with Noah after the flood. The bow by the way is the rainbow. For people of faith, the rainbow is not just a beautiful natural occurrence. It is a sign of our hope in God. Think of the bow as being God's bow with his arrows ready to shoot devastation upon the world. But God has hung up his bow. He has fastened it to the sky. He is not going to destroy us for our sins if we are willing to let him help us overcome sin. When we are overwhelmed with our own human weakness, our own continual sinfulness, the rainbow reminds us: God refuses to give up on us. We cannot give up on ourselves. Look at the rainbow. God is the compassionate, the merciful one.

The 40 days of Lent are about loving Jesus. We spend time looking for ways to grow in our love for our Savior. We fight off temptation with him. We give him our sins in confession. We unite ourselves to him through the Eucharist and many other methods of praying. We do everything possible to allow his grace into our lives. In 2 Cor: 12:9, Paul is told, and we are told, "My grace is sufficient for you." With Jesus as the center of our lives, nothing that the world throws at us will defeat us. He is the conqueror of temptation. He is the victor over sin. We are his, and he is ours.

Lessons for this Lenten season:

Let us make Lent a time of renewal of life by penance and prayer.

Let us convert Lent into a time for spiritual growth and Christian maturity.

Let us use Lent as a time to fight daily against the evil within us and around us.

Beloved: Christ suffered for sins once, the righteous for the sake of the unrighteous, that he might lead you to God. Put to death in the flesh, he was brought to life in the Spirit. 
