FIFTH SUNDAY OF LENT

In reflecting on today's readings, I am reminded of the unlimited nature of God's love in the gift of his son, Jesus. He freely offers mercy and forgiveness but also asks something from us. We are asked to submit — a word that we don't use much in our daily lives. We hear and talk more about fulfilling ourselves, striving for success, being all we can be, and so on. Not that those things are necessarily wrong, but submission requires something different — a giving up of oneself. That's at the crux of our salvation, our response to God's amazing gift. God's gift is freely given to all, and never rescinded. In submitting, we die to the worship of ourselves and are broken open so that we can rise to new life in Jesus. So, I have to ask myself . . . do I really submit to God's will for my life? Do I respond to God's gift by giving up my own agendas? Do I hold up my part of the covenant? — Sherry Scanza

AMBO SCRIPTURE REFLECTION

During this fifth week of Lent, the symbolism on the table in front of the ambo is focused on *God's Love Giving Us Strength and Assurance*.

God's love for us is unconditional and infinite. This is seen time and time again in the Bible, where God's people fell into sin and turned their backs on God, yet God continued to stand by his people.

The steadfast love of God remains and endures, even when we do not. God knew that our lives would be full of challenges and uncertainty. He knew that we would fall short and make mistakes. In his love, we have assurance of strength as we approach the trials of this world. Life can be painful and unpredictable, but can be well lived because of God's grace, mercy, and love.

Evidence of God's love surrounds us every day, but it is in our moments of need and uncertainty that God reminds us to take notice, to listen, to see, and to feel that love.

The unfailing love of God is part of his covenant with us through Jesus. This means that it cannot be broken—you cannot be separated from his love (Rom 8:38-39). God's love has never diminished and never shall.

FR. JOHN'S HOMILY FOR THE FIFTH SUNDAY OF LENT

One of the simplest and most consoling hymns ever written is:

What a friend we have in Jesus, all our sins and griefs to bear, What a privilege to carry, everything to God in prayer!

O what peace we often forfeit; O what needless pain we bear, All because we do not carry, everything to God in prayer.

Joseph Scriven wrote this hymn in 1857. He was a Christian missionary working in Canada. When he heard that his mother was seriously ill in Ireland, he could not go there to be with her. Instead, he wrote a consoling letter, enclosing it with the words of this hymn, and mailed it to her. He offered to her in her illness the company and the comfort of Jesus. He knew that at times of illness and loneliness, there is none who can give us better company and comfort than Jesus. There can be no greater friend than Jesus.

The great Lenten Sundays reach their high point today. In our first reading today, prophet Ezekiel, writing while in captivity in Babylon, gives the people of Israel hope that God will bring them back from captivity to the promised land.

In today's Gospel, we heard about the incident of the death and the raising of Lazarus. Jesus, who was the friend of Mary, Martha, and Lazarus, often stayed in their house whenever he was on the way to Jerusalem and partook of their hospitality. By raising Lazarus from death, Jesus not only showed his true friendship, but also showed his power over life and death.

This brings us to the threshold of the Easter mystery and its message of new life. Jesus had restored the daughter of Jairus and the son of the widow of Nain, but the Lazarus account is different in its length, the details, and the elaboration of so many different positions: that of the skeptical apostles, who only half - understand what Jesus is doing and who he is; the Jews, who look curiously, half doubting and half believing; Martha, who is so full of inexpressible faith and hope; the more painful questions of Mary — "Lord if you had been here our brother would not have died." This is the cry of all the bereaved down the ages, the desperate sadness of our human condition confronted with limitation and mortality. Who will help us? Who will bring meaning to our loss, hope to our lives?

Jesus has already associated himself with the living water of cleansing and forgiveness; he has already proclaimed himself the light of the world who brings true illumination of heart and mind. Now, in the most extraordinary of all his "I AM" sayings, he declares himself the resurrection and the life and shows his faith in his Father by exercising his power over death. The radical and extraordinary nature of his statement is the equivalent of a doctor assuring his patient that he is the operation and the healing of his sickness. This challenge to comprehension carries us to the edge of our rational capacity. What does Jesus mean? In the limitation of his human nature, he feels the despair and grief of loss and mourning; in the deep inner assurance of his divinity, he knows he has power over death through oneness with his Father.

He not only promises us new life after death, but transformation of our present reality, our present fears. Jesus will give us new life in the Spirit, a life in touch with the mystical communion of the Trinity, a life which will change our perception of the world now, and even when death intervenes, will continue to the fulfillment of all things in Christ.

St. Paul sees into the spiritual mystery: "though your body may be dead, it is because of sin, but if Christ is in you then your spirit is life itself because you have been justified." Knowing this helps us to affirm with Martha: "Yes, Lord, I believe that you are the Christ, the son of God, the one who was to come into the world."


Today's readings call us to recommit ourselves, including the Elect, to the belief of the resurrection of bodies from the dead, just as Jesus taught those who were present at the resuscitation of Lazarus.

We are also invited to the Lord Jesus our true friend; in His hands are the questions of life and death. Take everything to Him in prayer.



Gospel: Jn 11:1-45

Now a man was ill, Lazarus from Bethany, the village of Mary and her sister Martha. Mary was the one who had anointed the Lord with perfumed oil and dried his feet with her hair; it was her brother Lazarus who was ill. So the sisters sent word to him saying, "Master, the one you love is ill." When Jesus heard this he said, "This illness is not to end in death, but is for the glory of God, that the Son of God may be glorified through it." Now Jesus loved Martha and her sister and Lazarus. So when he heard that he was ill, he remained for two days in the place where he was. Then after this he said to his disciples, "Let us go back to Judea." The disciples said to him, "Rabbi, the Jews were just trying to stone you, and you want to go back there?" Jesus answered, "Are there not twelve hours in a day? If one walks during the day, he does not stumble, because he sees the light of this world. But if one walks at night, he stumbles, because the light is not in him." He said this, and then told them, "Our friend Lazarus is asleep, but I am going to awaken him." So the disciples said to him, "Master, if he is asleep, he will be saved." But Jesus was talking about his death, while they thought that he meant ordinary sleep. So then Jesus said to them clearly, "Lazarus has died. And I am glad for you that I was not there, that you may believe. Let us go to him." So Thomas, called Didymus, said to his fellow disciples, "Let us also go to die with him." When Jesus arrived, he found that Lazarus had already been in the tomb for four days. Now Bethany was near Jerusalem, only about two miles away. And many of the Jews had come to Martha and Mary to comfort them about their brother. When Martha heard that Jesus was coming, she went to meet him;

but Mary sat at home. Martha said to Jesus, "Lord, if you had been here, my brother would not have died. But even now I know that whatever you ask of God, God will give you." Jesus said to her, "Your brother will rise." Martha said to him, "I know he will rise, in the resurrection on the last day." Jesus told her, "I am the resurrection and the life; whoever believes in me, even if he dies, will live, and everyone who lives and believes in me will never die. Do you believe this?" She said to him, "Yes, Lord. I have come to believe that you are the Christ, the Son of God, the one who is coming into the world." When she had said this, she went and called her sister Mary secretly, saying, "The teacher is here and is asking for you." As soon as she heard this, she rose quickly and went to him. For Jesus had not yet come into the village, but was still where Martha had met him. So when the Jews who were with her in the house comforting her saw Mary get up quickly and go out, they followed her, presuming that she was going to the tomb to weep there. When Mary came to where Jesus was and saw him, she fell at his feet and said to him, "Lord, if you had been here, my brother would not have died." When Jesus saw her weeping and the Jews who had come with her weeping, he became perturbed and deeply troubled, and said, "Where have you laid him?" They said to him, "Sir, come and see." And Jesus wept. So the Jews said, "See how he loved him." But some of them said, "Could not the one who opened the eyes of the blind man have done something so that this man would not have died?" So Jesus, perturbed again, came to the tomb. It was a cave, and a stone lay across it. Jesus said, "Take away the stone." Martha, the dead man's sister, said to him, "Lord, by now there will be a stench; he has been dead for four days." Jesus said to her, "Did I not tell you that if you believe you will see the glory of God?" So they took away the stone. And Jesus raised his eyes and said, "Father, I thank you for hearing me. I know that you always hear me; but because of the crowd here I have said this, that they may believe that you sent me." And when he had said this, He cried out in a loud voice, "Lazarus, come out!" The dead man came out, tied hand and foot with burial bands, and his face was wrapped in a cloth. So Jesus said to them, "Untie him and let him go." Now many of the Jews who had come to Mary and seen what he had done began to believe in him.




