

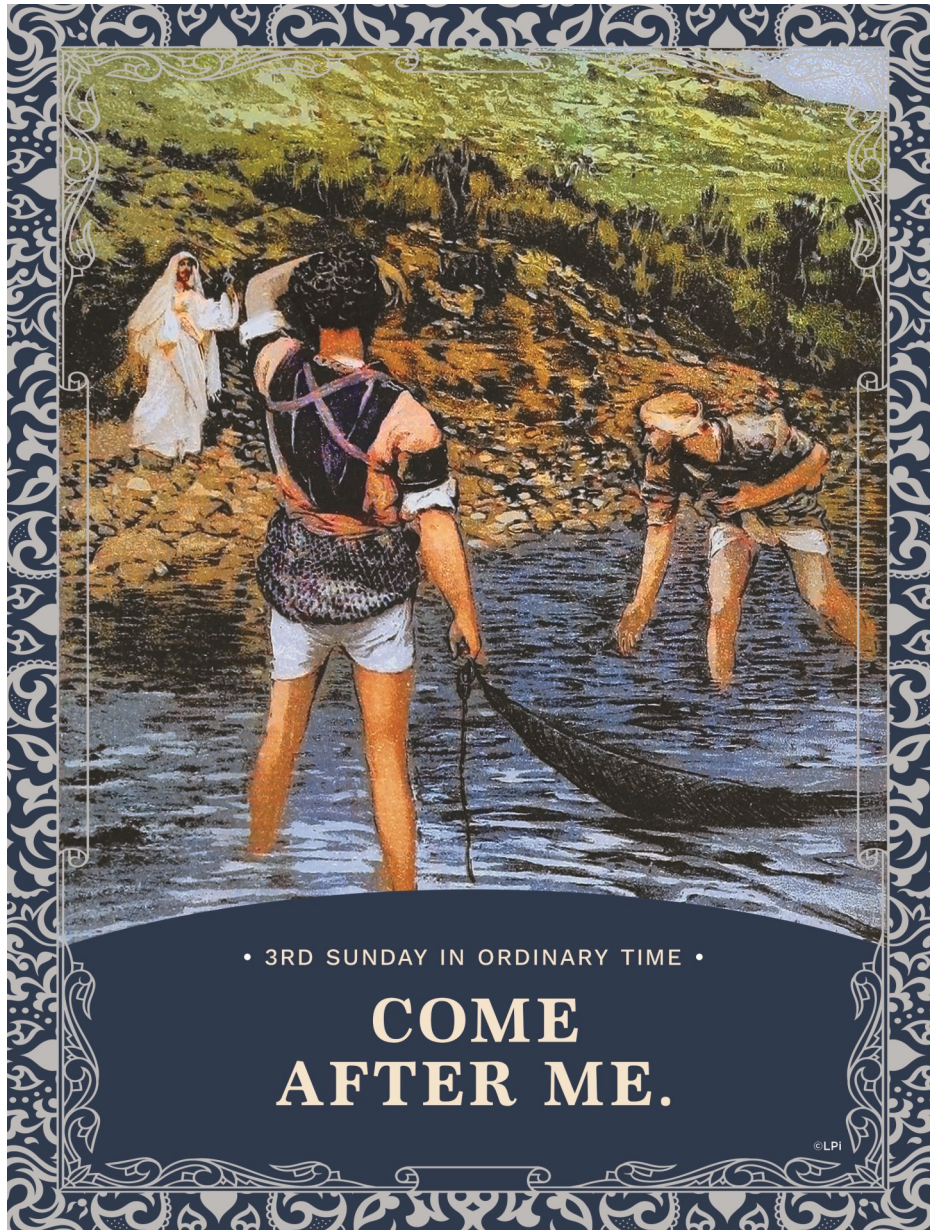

WHY IS ACHIEVING THE GOAL FOR THIS STRATEGIC INITIATIVE SO IMPORTANT?

- For St. Catherine's to create a significant future, our parish must have financial stability as shown by a balanced operating revenues and expenses report each year.
- For 2024–25, the Task Force designed an initiative, so our parish could demonstrate its willingness to raise offertory giving by \$100,000. The parishioners' generosity achieved this goal, thus demonstrating their commitment to maintaining balanced financial reports.
- For 2025–26, the newly re-named Treasury Development Committee again implemented the same initiative for a \$100,000 goal, so the parishioners could demonstrate their sustainability for having St. Catherine's support a budget which would fully service the parish's operational objectives.
- With a new future to create for St. Catherine's, we believe this amount would provide the foundation for building our future.

MOVIE NIGHT JANUARY 26

Please join us for dinner and the movie *The Third Miracle* on **Monday, January 26, from 6-8:30 p.m.** in the Parish Center. Bring your own drinks and a few dollars to contribute for pizza, and movie snacks for yourself or to share. We will end the evening with a short discussion. All are welcome. *The Third Miracle* takes place during arguments for the canonization of Helen O'Regan, a saintly Chicago woman with a local cult following. The film is set in 1979, when three miracles were required for the canonization of a saint. The postulator for sainthood, who is charged with finding proof of three miracles attributable to the saint, is Fr. Frank Shore (Ed Harris), a priest who is desperately seeking proof that God exists and whose last assignment ended when he discovered that a purported miracle had been faked. His opponent, the "Devil's advocate," is a German archbishop who believes Helen O'Regan is just a pious American housewife and does not merit sainthood. The film raises questions such as, What is a saint? and What is a miracle? Note: the film depicts the increasing attraction between Fr. Shore and the daughter of the purported saint.

The Knights of Columbus are hosting a men's morning reflection talk, Mass, and breakfast on **Saturday, January 31, from 8-10:30 a.m.** here at St. Catherine's. Fr. THIRD SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

This weekend we celebrate the Third Sunday in Ordinary Time, part of a sequence of Sundays that looks in two directions. On the one hand, these Sundays look back to Advent, Christmas, the Feast of the Holy Family, The Solemnity of Mary, Epiphany, and the Baptism of Our Lord—the feasts that celebrate the birth and early life of Jesus, and his relationship with Mary and Joseph. On the other hand, they look forward to Lent and the Easter season.

With few exceptions, from Advent to Lent, the first reading is usually from Isaiah, the prophet most often quoted by Jesus in the Gospels. During Advent, the first reading foretells the coming of Jesus by describing how the world will change because of him. There will be deliverance from oppression and war, the sick will be cured, nature will thrive, and there will be peace and rejoicing under him as a king descended from David (see the genealogy of Jesus in Matt. 1). One reading, Is. 7:10-14, specifically foretells the birth to a virgin of one called Emmanuel.

From the 2nd through 6th Sundays in Ordinary Time, the Gospels focus on John the Baptist's witness to Christ's identity as the Son of God and on the beginning of Jesus's ministry in Galilee. The 4th through 6th Sundays focus specifically on the teachings of the Sermon on the Mount.

During this period, in the first reading, the promises of future blessings that we heard in Advent and Christmas continue, now with the added condition that blessings will come to those who obey God and who do good works for others. The second reading is taken sequentially from 1 Cor. 1 and 2. In these passages, Paul stresses the need for unity of mind and purpose among Christ's followers, and he advances a radical teaching about the new hierarchy of values introduced by Jesus, in which God's wisdom has been vested in the simple, the weak, and the oppressed.

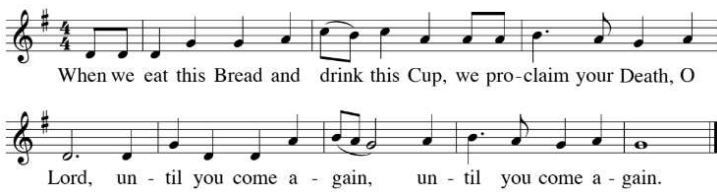

Sign of Peace

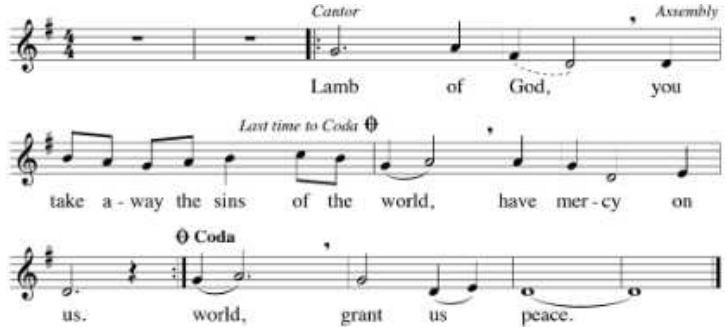

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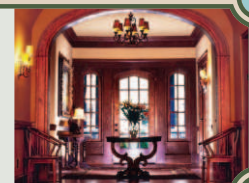


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
