The Role of the Papacy and Our Obligation in Faith, continued

Authentic Extraordinary Magisterium

Who gets to decide whether a teaching or practice in the Church fits all three universalities in a manner that our certainty is absolute? I say "absolute" because in most cases our certainty is very clear, it does not take a genius or a dogmatic statement of the Church to define our certainty. We can have certainty that the day to day, ordinary teaching authority of the Church (the people have believed it, the bishops have taught it and the pope(s) have confirmed it, is the Teaching of Jesus Christ and therefore must be believed. However, throughout the history of the Church, there have been attacks against the clear and certain teaching of the Church by laity, priests, bishops, and I dare say even popes, that have caused uncertainty and confusion regarding this. Also, there are aspects of Church teachings that are not as clear or certain as belonging to the deposit of Faith and morals, and therefore at times need a boost of reassurance through an extraordinary teaching of the Church.

The clear **definitions of faith** and morals by bishops teaching, in union **with the Pope in an ecumenical council** or **the Pope teaching Ex-Cathedra**, are the extraordinary means by which Church teaching is made manifest. These teachings are called "de fide definita" or "of defined faith." While the ordinary teaching authority of the Church is infallible, the extraordinary teaching authority defines a teaching of the ordinary authority of the Church as definitively, certainly, infallible. What does that mean? While before the definition, the certainty of the teaching should not have been questioned or doubted, now, with an extraordinary teaching to confirm it, it must be held and believed with the assent of faith. To reject it would be a sin against faith. We call these doctrines/teachings dogma.

However, there are very strict parameters for the extraordinary teaching authority to be utilized. For an Ecumenical Council to exercise its extraordinary teaching authority, the bishops from throughout the whole Church must teach in union with the pope on the subject of faith and morals, it must be part of the deposit of faith or necessary to support a truth of the deposit of faith, it must be defined in such a way as it does not contradict already clear and certain Church teachings and that the faithful must hold this to be true with the assent of faith.

For a pope to exercise the extraordinary teaching authority of the Petrine office (it belongs to the office, not the person), he must do so in such a way that he is clearly teaching as successor of St. Peter and universal pastor of the whole church (Ex-Cathedra – or from the Chair: from the Chair is a symbol of authority and is a reference to the authority of St. Peter). Also, the conditions already stated for an ecumenical council also apply (except, of course, the necessity of the bishops to teach in union with him).

Ecumenical councils and popes are bound by what has already clearly been taught with certainty in the Church. They cannot substantially change a definition of faith or morals. They can develop it and clarify it, as long as it does not change in part or whole the definition. So far, thank God, there has never, to my knowledge, been an attempt of a pope or ecumenical council to substantially change a defined dogma of faith and/or morals. Some claim that Vatican II did; however, even if anything that was taught in Vatican II was to be demonstrated beyond a reasonable doubt to be a contradiction of a previously defined dogma, what I said before remains true because Vatican II did not define anything as definitive that therefore must be believed with an assent of faith. While it has a section called "The Dogmatic Constitution on the Church," it did not define any dogma. Only the Dogmas it repeated must be believed with an assent of faith. The rest must be given a religious submission of intellect and will. Religion is a virtue that belongs to the cardinal virtue of Justice. It is the virtue by which we give to God what is owed to God. Jesus gave authority to the Church to teach in His person. We owe it to Him to give the obedience of religion to the teaching authority of the Church, even when she is not teaching in an extra-ordinary way that makes certain her infallibility. While error is possible in ordinary magisterial teachings, it is rarely the case. Since we cannot be absolutely certain that error is present, we must give the church the benefit of the doubt. This means our intellect, while having doubts, must tip the scale towards the Church's magisterium, and our will must give obedience accordingly. While we can withhold any certainty of faith, we may not dissent from it. Some may think this is ridiculous. However, we do this all the time in ordinary affairs of life. When we buy a can of tuna that has not expired, is there a possibility that it is tainted with botulism? Yes! However, we open it and make a tuna fish sandwich anyway. Why? Because the likelihood that it is tainted with botulism is too rare. If it looks bad and does not smell right, don't eat it and don't give it someone else. However, this does not mean it was tainted and we cannot sue the company for damages. If magisterial teaching does not smell right, don't teach it to others but don't teach against it either. Make known your doubts and ask for clarification, but be respectful to the magisterial teaching authority of the church.
