#### From Fr. Mike

The first and foremost thing we should know about the Advent Season is that it is NOT a penitential season like Lent. Although many churches use the same color for vestments, wreaths, and decorations, the two liturgical seasons are very distinct in nature and meaning. That is why Saint Michael Church this year has gone to the color blue for Advent to distinguish it from Lent (in case you haven't noticed.)

So then, what is Advent? Wikipedia states that Advent is "A season observed in many Christian Churches as a time of expectant waiting and preparation for both the celebration of the Nativity of Jesus at Christmas and the return of Jesus at the Second Coming." For us Christians of the Catholic faith, Advent is a joyful (joy filled) time of preparation for the coming of Christmas (the celebration of the Lord's birth into humanity as a child on December 25th). While many of us know or think we know how to prepare for Lent by giving up or doing things, we are still left with the question: how do we prepare ourselves spiritually for Advent?

Some have said it is a season of being "devout" or "pious." Of course, this only confuses the issue, because most of us are not quite sure what being "devout" or "pious" really means. Does it mean being sincere, virtuous or self-righteous? Does it mean folding our hands and praying all the time? I think a good definition of "devout" is being firm and steadfast, when one gives their whole heart and soul to something.

So now the next question we have is: What is joy? Often times, joy and happiness are confused by interchanging them as if they are synonyms and always happen simultaneously. A better understanding of joy is that it is more profound than mere happiness. While happiness often comes out of our circumstances in life (e.g. I am happy because there is still toilet paper on the selves, I am happy that gas has not gone over \$4, etc.) joy, on the other hand, is the ability to have a certain happiness which is separate or independent of our circumstances.

This joy is based upon the knowledge that God the Father loves me in spite of everything I do or do not do. One can actually be joyful while dying. We might not be happy about the pain and suffering of our lives, but we certainly can be joyful, because we know and believe that death does not have the final

say in our lives. At the end of the day, joy is a choice that we make knowing that the Father of all good things loves me and will protect me from all harm, even in spite of the circumstances of my life. Joy is the choice to abide in God's loving presence. So, Advent is the wholehearted and joyful preparation for Christmas. The goal of Advent is not to have a "Merry Christmas" but it is to worship Jesus well, commemorating His birth into the world. BUT, it is also preparing for His Second Coming. Therefore, we actually have two "comings" of Christ in our lives; His coming into the world (which already happened over 2,000 years ago) and His coming into the world once again at the end of time.

So what do we do in between these two comings? Often times, we are in the presence of the Lord, whether it be in our community, when we read the Holy Scriptures and most definitively, uniquely and substantially, when we celebrate the Holy Eucharist. But there is another presence, another coming that we must anticipate, we must prepare for and that is His Second Coming at the end of time. The question we are left with this week is: If Jesus came and appeared to you in your life this very moment, what would you do (after you got up off the floor)? Would there be any room for Him in your life?

One of the debates that I have during this time of year is (people who know me say that I debate everything) when does the Christmas tree get put up, when do decorations start going up, and when is it appropriate to start playing Christmas music. One side thinks there are too many parties, too much music and too much drinking and being "merry" during the Advent Season, that we lose the true meaning of Christmas. Like most things, I vote for moderation. I think that Christmas parties (NOT "holiday" parties) are okay. I think that a Christmas carol that I hear or even sing is also okay because it actually helps me get in the "Christmas spirit," it actually helps me prepare for Christmas. But in all things, I think moderation is key. It is okay and actually helpful that we say "no" once in a while to these Christmas things during the next four weeks so we can have a chance to joyfully prepare for the coming of Christ; on His birthday and in the end time. Maybe when and if we can say "no" once in a while to things, we will be able to make more space for the Lord in our lives. The irony is that the more we say "no" allows us to actually say "yes" to Jesus in our lives, this very moment, on

December 25th, when our lives here on earth come to an end and when He will return at the end of time. May God bless you during the next few weeks of Advent. I pray that your "no" time will lead you to a life of "yes's" and acceptance of the Lord Jesus in your lives and in the lives of your families and friends. Happy and joy-filled Advent to you all!

#### FIRST SUNDAY OF ADVENT

#### First Reading: Jeremiah 33:14-16

The Lord tells of fulfilling the promise he had made to Israel. He will send a replacement for David, someone who "shall do what is right and just in the land," believed by most to mean Jesus.

#### Second Reading: 1 Thessalonians 3:12—4:2

Paul encourages the Thessalonians to be ready for the coming of the Lord. He explains that although they are conducting themselves in a way that would please God, they should always strive to do even better.

#### Gospel: Luke 21:25-28, 34-36

Jesus warns his followers to be prepared for the end of the world. He reminds them not to be preoccupied with unimportant events, or they will be caught unaware rather than being on watch as they should.

#### Segunda Lectura: 1 Tesalonienses 3:12—4:2

Pablo anima a los Tesalonienses a alistarse para la venida del Señor. El explica que a pesar de que se están conduciendo de modo que agrada a Dios, siempre deben tratar de mejorar.

#### Evangelio: San Lucas 21:25-28, 34-36

Jesús advierte a sus seguidores que deben prepararse para el fin del mundo. Les recuerda que no deben preocuparse de cosas sin importancia, o serán sorprendidos en vez de estar listos como debieran.



#### Primer Domingo de Adviento 28 de Noviembre de 2021

"Se acerca ya el momento, dice el Señor, en que cumpliré la promesa que hice a la gente de Israel y a la de Judá. En esos días, haré nacer un nuevo brote de David que ejercerá la justicia y el derecho en el país. Entonces Judá estará a salvo, Jerusalén vivirá segura "
