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# From Fr. Mike

For generations, the Catholic Church has been the hallmark of sign and symbol. No matter what church you entered, you always could easily find the Blessed Sacrament because it was illuminated by a candle (usually red) to draw your attention to the sacramental and substantial presence of the Lord in every Catholic church. Unlike, our Protestant brothers and sisters, where God certainly can be present in their worship and fellowship, the Catholic Church has the body, soul and divinity of Christ present under the appearance of bread reserved in the tabernacle. Because of this particular and unique presence of God in our churches, this is why we genuflect. That is why many people still bless themselves when passing a Catholic Church and even (for those mature men) who tip their hats when passing the church as well.

Several years ago, I remember going into a Catholic Church named after The Most Blessed Sacrament and when I walked in the church, much to my confusion and dismay, the tabernacle was nowhere to be found. I thought to myself, this is quite strange since I am in a Catholic church named after the Blessed Sacrament and He is among the missing. I asked a woman expensively dressed in a pants suit and jacket (who turned out to be a "religious" sister) where Jesus was? She informed me that during the winter months, in order to save on heating costs, they close the side folding doors for daily Mass. The only problem with this "financial" decision is that the tabernacle was on the wrong side of the folding door. For when the door was closed, the tabernacle was no longer visible. Now I finally understood why some critics of these modern churches termed them as "the churches of the great absence" rather than the "real presence."

Historically, the Church has been so inventive and creative in presenting the faith to (then) a mostly uneducated faithful by illustrating our faith through beautiful stained glass windows, artistic Stations of the Cross and a multiplicity of statues and icons (they were actually first in history) of saints and angels (yes imagine angels). These wonderful signs were not only for the adults of the parish, but as importantly, for the inquisitive, young minds of children as well. "Mommy, why is that man holding a set of keys in his hands?" "That is Saint Peter! He was the leader of the Apostles appointed by Jesus Himself who gave him the 'keys' to the kingdom of heaven and earth, that is why he is holding two keys!"

Because of these great signs and symbols, the ability to teach our youth and become educated ourselves was an important catechetical tool which nowadays seem to have gone by the wayside. After the Second Vatican Council, churches seemed to be re-designed by individuals whom I think also made the same architectural plans for Pizza Hut or theatres in the round. Rather than the focal point being the altar and Jesus' presence in the tabernacle, the focus was shifted to the faithful facing each other. Stained glass windows became sparse or extinct, statues were just thrown out (or stolen), real flowers were replaced with plastic or maybe (if we were lucky) silk and bee's wax candles were replaced with oil lamps. Little by little, these "small things" seemed to disappear which was almost a microcosm of the larger things beginning to disappear as well; like church attendance, going to confession, belief in the real presence and the drastic drop in vocations to the Priesthood and religious life.

That is why we are so fortunate here at Saint Michael Church. Not because it is our church, or I am the pastor, but more importantly, because it has retained (and even increased over the past few years) real "Catholic" traditions such as the addition of our new stained glass windows and the addition of statues and icons. However, what makes our church the most "Catholic" is that the center of our church is the altar of sacrifice and immediately behind the altar is the beautiful, tabernacle that houses the King of kings Himself in the Blessed Sacrament. Of course, illuminated by a real, wax candle that burns continuously to remind us of the Lord's substantial and sacramental presence in our church.

So maybe the next time you go and visit another church, look around and see how "Catholic" that church really is. Hopefully, you will be able to find the Blessed Sacrament if it is not relegated to a side chapel or another room not central to the sanctuary. You might also want to remember and actually get down on one knee before the "King of kings" in respect, honor and adoration of the Lord's true and real presence in the tabernacle and leave the nodding to baseball catchers and silent auctioneers.

All of this begs the question of; what makes us Catholic? It is truly not statues or stained glass windows, but what make us "true Catholics" is our belief and celebration of the Most Blessed Sacrament as we "do this in remembrance of Him" on the altar of Sacrifice each and every day. Going to Mass and receiving Holy Communion (worthily) is what not only separates us from the rest of the Christian "Protestant" churches, but more importantly, allows us to fulfill the command of the Lord Himself who said: "Unless you eat my flesh and drink my blood, you do not have life within you" (John 6:53).

# DECIMOTERCER DOMINGO EN TIEMPO ORDINARIO

### Primera Lectura: 1 Reyes 19:16b, 19-21

## Segunda Lectura: Gálatas 5:1, 13-18

Pablo nos recuerda que la gente fué librada de la Ley Antigua por medio de Cristo. Pero aclara que la libertad no significa caer en tentaciones. En vez, debemos guiarnos por el Espíritu. Aún más importante, debemos amar al prójimo como a nosotros mismos.

## Evangelio: San Lucas 9:51-62

Jesús se dirigió a Jerusalén, y pasó por un pueblo donde no fué bienvenido. Regañó a sus discípulos por querer vengarse. Un hombre quería seguir a Jesús después de que terminara su trabajo en su casa. Jesús dijo que un hombre que cominza un trabajo, pero que constantemente titubea, no es digno del reino de Dios.

# Décimo Tercer domingo en Tiempo Ordinario 26 de junio de 2022

"Procuren que esta libertad no sea un pretexto para satisfacer los deseos carnales, háganse más bien servidores los unos de los otros, por medio del amor. Porque toda la Ley está resumida plenamente en este precepto: Amarás a tu prójimo como a ti mismo ... Yo los exhorto a que se dejen conducir por el Espíritu de Dios, y así no serán arrastrados por los deseos de la carne."

San Pablo habló a los gálatas, y su mensaje merece que lo escuchemos hoy. Rodeados por tanto que nos aleja de Cristo, necesitamos al Espíritu para tener propia estima y respeto, amor por otros, para que podamos expresar nuestro amor a Dios. Quizá deberíamos tomarlos en el mismo orden. Use la palabra "yo" y "mío" con menor frecuencia. Evite la terrible atracción del internet y pornografía. Descubra las riquezas de nuestra fe en la oración, el aprender y las buenas obras. Tenga fe en los siguientes pasos. Soy amado inmensamente por Dios. No lo he ganado, El derrama su amor, vida y perdón sobre mí, en este mismo momento. Convencido de esta realidad, vivo mi cuidado y preocupación por otros, ya que ellos también son amados por Dios y están hechos a su imagen y semejanza. Soy verdaderamente libre para amar a mi Dios.
