

All these wonderful things are how God shows his love and care for us.

This is why we must **respect**, or care for, all of God's creation. How would you feel if someone damaged a gift you made for them? Would you be hurt? Just so, we must take care of the gifts God made for us. We must take care of our planet and one another.

When we take care of everything God has made, we show him how important his gifts are to us. We thank God when we respect his creation, and we show our love for God himself.







Sharing the Gifts Inside You

When we think about talents, we might only think about singing, drawing, or playing sports. But God gives us other talents. Some people are great at welcoming new people. Some people always know what to say to help someone who feels sad. Maybe your parents are good cooks. Maybe a friend speaks another language well.

When God made you, he gave you **unique** gifts. These are not gifts like toys or things you make to give away. These are **abilities** that you always carry inside you. You can use these gifts throughout your life to help others who might not have the same gifts. And they will be do the same thing—use their gifts so they can share them with you.

God gives us these abilities so we can serve him and others, including others in our **Church**. He wants us to use our talents to serve him and others and to make the Church stronger. When we use our gifts, we help people know and love God, who gave us these gifts. Because each of us has unique gifts, each of us is important to the Church, just as the body needs all its unique parts to work the way it's supposed to.

What gifts are inside you? As you grow older, you will understand and develop your gifts more and more. You will learn how to use your gifts to serve and love God, and to help people know and love him too!

Caring for God's Creatures

What is the strangest animal you can think of? What is your favorite pet? What creature do you find annoying—or even scary? From the pesky mosquito to the peaceful goldfish to the long-necked giraffe, God created every animal that lives on the Earth, in the sea, and in the sky.

We must respect all **creatures** because God created them. He gave every kind of animal to us to help us, but every animal belongs to him. All his different creatures remind us that he is amazingly creative!

How do God's creatures help us? Some animals provide us with food: meat, milk, even honey. Some animals help us do hard things. Other animals protect us from harm, and some animals are especially good at sharing love. Sometimes we can't see how an animal can help us. But God asks us to take care of them even when we don't understand them.

Respect for God's creation means we must treat his creatures with respect and kindness. We should never hurt, tease, or scare an animal on purpose. We can capture spiders and take them outside. Every day we must give our pets and farm animals food, water, and warm places to sleep.

God gives every creature the gift of life. We respect this gift by taking care of his creations.

Thank You, God!

Many families talk about their day as they eat dinner. You might talk about what you learned at school, or what a classmate did on the playground. Your parents might mention a project at work. Your brother or sister might share some nice words ("Good job!") from a teacher.

Talking to God is like talking with family—but it is so much more. **Prayer** is the special way we talk to God. He made us and knows everything about us, and he doesn't need us to say a word. But he still wants us to share our thoughts and feelings with him so we can feel close to him.

When we talk as a family, we say words out loud. But when we talk to God, we can say words out loud, or we can talk to him in the quiet of our minds. We don't need to be in a special place, either. We can pray anywhere, in any way.

We offer different kinds of prayers to God. We can ask God to help us, or ask him to help someone else. We can thank God for everything he gives us and does for us. We can just rejoice in God! We can express our joy in just how amazing he is!

We pray in all these ways during Mass—out loud, in our minds, and even while singing. Mass is the greatest prayer of thanksgiving we offer to God, especially for the gift of Jesus. The next time you go to Mass, share your **gratitude**: "Thank you, God!"



One God-Three Persons

Have you ever seen a shamrock, or a three-leafed clover? Saint Patrick of Ireland used the shamrock to help people understand God. One shamrock is made up of three leaves. Just so, God is one God—but he is made up of three Persons. A triangle is another way we can understand God. A triangle has three sides, and God is made up of three Persons.

We call these three Persons the **Trinity**. The three Persons are the Father, the Son (Jesus), and the Holy Spirit. These three Persons are all equal, just like the leaves of a shamrock—or the sides of a triangle—are all equal.

In today's Scripture reading, we learn that God the Father sent us a **savior**: Jesus, his Son, the second Person of the Trinity. The Father sent us his Son because he loves us and wants us to live with him in **Heaven**. Jesus helps us grow closer to God.

You might find the Trinity confusing. That's okay! So do grown-ups. The Trinity is a **mystery** of faith. That means we can never fully understand or explain it. You will understand the nature of God better and better as you grow older. Believing in something we don't understand means we must have faith.

The Sacrament of Baptism

How many Bible stories can you think of where Jesus showed us how to love like God loves? When he **multiplied** the loaves and the fishes, he showed God's love by feeding the hungry. When he helped the blind man to see again, he showed God's love to someone who was suffering. When he ate dinner with the tax collector, he showed God's love to someone everyone disliked. By helping, healing, and loving, Jesus showed us God's love in many ways during his life on Earth.

And as our teacher, Jesus told us exactly how to show God's love. One way he did this was by giving us the **Great Commandment**: to love God and to love others. All of Jesus' words and actions help us learn to follow him. He showed us how to love God with our whole heart, **soul**, mind, and strength. And he showed us that we must love others as we love ourselves.

What we say and what we do shows our love for God and others. To love more like God each day, we must think about whether our words and actions follow these two commandments. We should think before we act or say something. We can also think about our words and actions afterward, to learn from them



Lay Down Your Worries

Jesus reminded us that God takes care of every need. Crows don't plant or store food—God takes care of them. So why do we worry about our needs?

What is **worry**? Worry means being nervous or afraid. When you worry, you might think you can't handle a problem by yourself—or you don't know how something scary will work out. But do you ever fix something by worrying? Can you make a thunderstorm or an illness go away by worrying about it? Can you make a test easier at school just by worrying about it?

Talking to another person can help us worry less. Just so, we can always talk to God in prayer, because he is always with us and knows what is best for us. He knows we cannot do everything on our own. He gives us friends, family, teachers, and many other people to help us every day. Praying every day helps us remember that God is always with us. In prayer, we can call upon him to help us, and we can **trust** that he will hear our prayer.

Trusting God helps us feel calm, because we know he is taking care of us. In fact, God helps us handle our problems better than we could ever imagine. What problem can you turn over to God today?

Pray as Jesus Taught Us

We can call or text a friend when we need to talk. But do you remember how we reach out to God? We talk to him in our hearts and minds, through a special kind of **communication** called prayer.

In today's reading, Jesus teaches us how to pray by giving us a special prayer. Did you recognize the prayer in the Bible reading? It is the Our Father, or Lord's Prayer! Jesus first taught this prayer two thousand years ago. He started by teaching people to call God "Our Father," because God loves us as his own children.

The Lord's Prayer has two parts. In the first part, we honor God because of who he is. We bless his holy name. We ask for his Kingdom to come on Earth to offer everyone God's goodness, peace, and love. We finish this first part by praying that God's will for our lives be done. We know that God has a plan for us on Earth and in Heaven.

In the second part, we ask God to help us in our lives. When we ask God for our "daily bread," we are really asking God to meet all our needs. Then we ask God to forgive us, and we promise to forgive others. We ask God to help us avoid **temptation**, because it comes between us and God's plan. Finally, we ask God to keep us safe from evil.

God loves it when we talk to him. Learn the Lord's Prayer by heart, so you can easily pray it wherever you are every day!

Last Supper, First Mass

What meals do you eat each day? Why? We need to eat so we can grow and gain strength. We go to Mass at least once a week for the same reason: to grow and gain strength from the meal we call the **Eucharist**.

At the Last Supper, Jesus gathered his followers to celebrate a special meal. His words and actions changed bread and wine into his Body and Blood, which he gave his disciples. This was a **miracle**: something amazing that only God can do. In giving his Body and Blood, Jesus gave his disciples his very Self.

We continue to celebrate this meal at Mass. Jesus gives himself to us in the Eucharist, just like he did at

the Last Supper. The priest says and does the same things that Jesus said and did at the Last Supper. Ordinary bread and wine become the Body and Blood of Jesus. This miracle is a mystery that happens through the words of the priest and the power of the Holy Spirit.

The Body and Blood of Christ are a real gift, one that will change us to become more loving, like Jesus. In the Mass, we gather to celebrate Jesus' gift of himself. Together we worship Jesus, unite with him, receive his gifts, and support one another. At Mass, we pray, sing, and listen as best we can. How can you show love and respect for Jesus the next time you go to Mass?

Bear Good Fruit

If you have ever helped your family plant a garden, you know you must prepare the soil. You have to dig to loosen the soil so the seeds can grow roots. You add **fertilizer** to help the plants grow big and healthy. You **prune** unhealthy branches so that the healthy branches can grow. You know that big, healthy plants bear a lot of good fruit.

Jesus tells us that the Word of God is like a seed. It needs good soil and proper care to grow and bear fruit. We learn about the Word of God from the **Bible** and from the teachings of the Church. The Bible is the written Word of God. The Church helps us understand the Word of God and how we must live it out. At the end of Mass, the priest or deacon sends us forth to carry God's love to others.

How can we become good soil for God's Word? We must listen carefully to God's Word and live it in our lives with love. When we open our hearts in this way, the Good News of God's love will fill our hearts to overflowing.

Like a big, healthy plant, we cannot help but bear good fruit and share it with others when God's love overflows in us. We show this good fruit in our actions: being kind and patient, helping our family and our community, and doing everything with love. How can you show the good fruit of God's Word in your family today?



Sing and Pray Your Thanks

Can you remember something we sing or say at Mass? Right away you might think of the Sign of the Cross and the Lord's Prayer. What other examples can you think of?

We give God praise and thanksgiving in many ways. But the Mass is especially important because we gather with others to give thanks and praise. We receive the *Eucharist*—a word that means "thanksgiving." The Mass is one big celebration of thanksgiving, when we give thanks for all God's gifts—especially the gift of Jesus.

Here are a few other prayers and responses you might **recognize** from the Mass:

 "And with your spirit"—We say this response when the priest says, "The Lord be with you." We are saying we know that the Holy Spirit is at work in the priest.

- "Thanks be to God"—We thank God for the gifts he has given us in his Word and in the Eucharist.
- "Amen"—This very old Hebrew word means
 "I agree" or "I believe." We say it many times
 during Mass to agree with all that God does
 and teaches us.
- "Lamb of God"—In this prayer, we ask Jesus, the Lamb of God, to have mercy on us and to forgive our sins. We say this as we prepare for Holy Communion.

When we go to Mass, we are called to **participate** in the actions and prayers. Singing, responding, and praying are not just for grown-ups—you can do them too!



time on Earth ends. Jesus' death on the cross was an amazing sacrifice of love.

Jesus' true love for us shows us the way to love others. He wants us to be willing to give up things out of love for other people. His gift of his life reminds us how much God loves us. In response, we must find ways to show our love for God more each day.

Every time you see a cross on a wall or on a necklace, remember how Jesus gave his life for us—the greatest gift of love.







Celebrate Jesus' Resurrection

Long before Jesus was born, God sent his people, the Israelites, a set of rules called the Ten Commandments. They were an important part of a **covenant**, or set of promises, made between God and his people. The Third Commandment tells us we must keep the Lord's Day holy.

But what is the Lord's Day? For Christians, Sunday is the Lord's Day, because Jesus rose from the dead on a Sunday. He defeated death and freed us from our sins. His **Resurrection** means that now he is with us always and everywhere. He is no longer confined to a body. By his Resurrection, Jesus also gave us the gift of eternal life. That means death is not the ending of our life, either! For us, death is now a change. Jesus' Resurrection fills us with **hope** that after we die, we will live forever with God in Heaven if we have lived good lives and followed Jesus.

We celebrate Jesus' Resurrection every time we go to Mass. We celebrate through the Scripture readings we hear, the prayers and responses we say together, and the Holy Communion we receive. And we celebrate the Resurrection, because in the Eucharist we receive the resurrected Lord on the very same day he rose from the dead—Sunday.

So it is fitting that we sing **Alleluia**—which means "**Praise** the Lord!"—at Mass. We sing this word of joy before the Gospel, and we can say it whenever we want to honor God.

You can greet people with a smile. You can help someone with a tough homework problem. You can help your parents make dinner or take out the trash.

True love isn't about giving to get something back either. We are called to give of ourselves because that is what God wants us to do. The more we receive Jesus into our hearts, and the more we become like him, the more we can give this kind of **selfless** love.



Put on God's Armor

If you have ever played or watched sports, you know athletes wear **protective** clothing, or armor. Football players wear helmets and shoulder pads. Soccer players wear shin guards. Basketball players wear mouth guards. Protective clothing allows athletes to play without worrying about getting hurt.

Life is not always easy. Sometimes we have to do hard things. So we must always be ready to put on God's armor. When we know we are protected, we are not afraid of what is ahead.

We can build our spiritual armor by praying to God. Prayer means talking and listening to God. You can talk to God in your own words, just like you talk to your parents and friends. You can ask him to help

you or to help someone you know. And you can do this every day, all day. The Bible tells us that Jesus himself prayed many times, asking God the Father to help him or those around him.

You can also learn prayers that Jesus and his Church have given to us. These prayers are words of love that help us talk to God, even when we can't find our own words. God might not always give us exactly what we ask for, but he always gives us what he knows to be best for us.

The more we pray for ourselves and others, the more we put on spiritual armor. Being under God's armor is the best protection we can have!



Living in Joy Forever

On Halloween, you probably dress up in a costume and visit neighbors to trick or treat. But did you know that the day after Halloween is an important feast day in the Church? This feast, on November 1, is called All Saints' Day. In fact, some children celebrate this day by dressing up as important saints on November 1.

Saints are holy people who followed Jesus during their lives on Earth. Because of his Resurrection, they can now live in joy forever with God in Heaven. On All Saints' Day, we honor and celebrate everyone in Heaven—not just the saints who have special days on the Church's calendar.

God calls everyone to be a saint. He wants all of us to live in love and be holy as members of the **Communion of Saints**. Communion means "union with." This union includes all the saints in Heaven, plus everyone living as part of the Church on Earth right now. That includes you!

As members of the Communion of Saints, we all share love and prayers with everyone else in the Body of Christ—in Heaven, on Earth, and in **Purgatory**. Many holy people live on Earth today. Some even live in our families, parishes, and communities. All of us in the Church look forward to the day when we will all unite with God and one another in Heaven.







Changing Our Hearts in Advent

How do you **prepare** for something exciting? If you play sports, you practice a lot before games. If you have a music or dance recital, you rehearse your pieces over and over. To prepare for a vacation, you might think hard about what toys and clothes to pack.

In today's reading, John the Baptist told people to prepare for the coming of someone special. He called people to turn away from sin, believe in God, and trust that God would forgive them. Then he baptized people in the Jordan River. His baptisms cleansed people who wanted to turn their hearts toward God.

John explained that his baptisms only prepared people to receive Jesus. John said Jesus would offer a more powerful Baptism in the Holy Spirit. The Baptism that Jesus gave us brings us into God's family and makes us members of the Church.

We learn about John the Baptist in **Advent** because we are preparing to receive Jesus at Christmas—just as John prepared people to receive Jesus. We can get ready for Jesus by praying, telling God we are sorry for our sins, and doing kind things for others. Like the people John baptized, we can change our hearts, turning away from selfish thoughts toward love and kindness.

In Advent, the color purple stands for turning away from sin, and the color pink (or rose) stands for joy. If your family has an Advent wreath, spend time thinking about the colored candles today.

That means they don't really have bodies—and they don't really have wings. We show angels with wings to show that they can move quickly from one place to another. All the angels live with God in Heaven. They see God and sing his praises at all times. Some angels are messengers of God and appear to human beings with important news.

Like the shepherds, we have every reason to rejoice at Jesus' birth. His birth is Good News for us too, because he is our savior. He will keep us safe from sin and lead us toward Heaven.

He is joy for the world! Alleluia!



Preparing for Jesus' Resurrection

Two sisters, Anna and Hannah, were playing in the sandbox together. Hannah suddenly poured sand on Anna's head. The sand got into Anna's hair, her eyes, and even her mouth. Hannah giggled, but Anna started crying.

How would you feel if you were Anna? How would you feel if you were Hannah? What could Hannah do to make things better? How could Anna respond?

Lent is a season when we prepare to celebrate Jesus' Resurrection at Easter. We think of ways to follow Jesus more closely. One way is by saying we're sorry and asking forgiveness when we have been unkind—just as Hannah should **apologize** to Anna and make **amends**. Another way is by doing good things for others.

During Lent, we decorate our churches with purple, because purple stands for sorrow. We **reflect** on our sorrow for our own sins and for Jesus' suffering and death. This is why we also do not sing the joyful "Alleluia" during Lent.

To prepare for Jesus' Resurrection, we spend Lent finding extra ways to be kind to one another. Some people also give up something they enjoy but don't really need—like candy or television. Instead people can use that time or money to help those who truly are in need. What kind act can you try to do more this Lent? And what can you give up in order to focus on what's really important—our Savior, Jesus?







Christ Is Risen, Alleluia!

Jesus' Resurrection means we will also rise to new life. In fact, if you have been baptized, you already have new life from God, given to you in the waters of Baptism. This new life does not end after we die—we will have new life forever with God. Jesus promised us this new life. We know that Jesus keeps his promises.

Jesus rose from the dead on a Sunday. So every Sunday has become holy to Christians—it is the Lord's Day. So we celebrate the Resurrection every Sunday, but especially on Easter Sunday. Our Masses become especially joyful, as we sing, "Christ is risen!" We join family to eat delicious food—and candy—after the Lenten season of fasting. And we go on celebrating Easter for seven weeks—fifty days in all. Easter is the high point of our year in the Church.

Come, Holy Spirit

What comes to mind when you think of fire? Do you think about its warmth and light—or its power to destroy? What about wind? Do you think about gusts of air blowing leaves from the trees—or perhaps tornadoes and hurricanes?

In the Bible, fire and wind point to the presence of the Holy Spirit. Wind can be very powerful, so it reminds us of the power of the Holy Spirit. Fire is a sign of the love of the Holy Spirit. Even though fire can be dangerous, it also warms us and gives us light.

wind and fire. The Spirit gave the disciples new life and new power to go out and preach in his name. It even made them able to speak many different languages, so that all who heard them could receive the Good News. This is why Pentecost is often called the "birthday of the Church"!

Two sacraments fill us with the power of the Holy Spirit: the Sacrament of Baptism and the Sacrament of Confirmation. One day you will receive the Sacrament of Confirmation, but we are first filled with the Holy Spirit in the Sacrament of Baptism. Because of this, we can tell others about Jesus. Dive In! (20 minutes)

Ask your child these questions:

- What did Jesus tell us to do when we pray? (ask, seek, and knock)
- What did Jesus say will happen when we pray this way? (He said we will receive what we want, find what we are looking for, and have the door opened.)
- How is God like a good parent? (He gives us things that are good for us, not things that are bad for us.)



God Always Answers

What does it mean to be *ordinary*? You might think ordinary means boring or plain. But in the Church calendar, **Ordinary Time** is special!

Ordinary Time really refers to two times, which together make up more than half of the Church year. The first Ordinary Time is the season between Christmas and Lent. The second Ordinary Time is the season between Pentecost and the end of the Church year, when Advent begins again.

During Ordinary Time, the priest's vestments and the altar cloths are green. Green is a color that reminds us of life and growth. During Ordinary Time, we hear Scripture readings about Jesus' everyday life. We grow in understanding of his life by hearing about the miracles he performed and the stories he told to teach us about God.

One of the things Jesus taught us is that we can turn to God any time in prayer. Part of understanding God better is knowing that we can talk to him. We can ask him for whatever we need, whenever we need it. God always answers our prayers! Like a good parent, he might not give us the answer we want, especially if he knows it isn't good for us. But he always gives us the answer we need.

Think about the last thing you prayed to God for. Was it truly a need, or was it a want? What answer did he give you, and how did you know? Was it the answer you wanted, or was it the answer you really needed?

- What did Mary say to the angel? (She said that she was the Lord's servant. She agreed to have everything happen as the angel said.)

Invite your child to complete the activity on page 2 of the Mary activity booklet.

Invite your child to share one thing he or she learned from today's lesson.

Say "Yes" to God!

In our families, we are often asked to do many things. When is it easy to say "yes" to your parents? When is it hard? What makes it easy or hard to say "yes" to your parents?

As we journey toward holiness, God asks us to trust him. He asks us to say "yes" when he calls us to do good works and make good choices. He asks us to say "yes" even when we don't understand his plan.

Today's Bible reading tells us about the most important "yes" of all: Mary's "yes" to God! Mary was engaged to marry Joseph. God sent an angel to tell Mary that she would become the mother of his Son. Saying "yes" to having a baby, the Son of God,

was a big **responsibility** for Mary to accept. But by agreeing to God's plan, she made the birth of Jesus possible.

We honor Mary in the months of May and October, and on several days throughout the year, because of her special role as Jesus' mother. We read today's Scripture story on many of those days to help us recall the trust and faith that Mary had for God's plan.

Saying "yes" to God is not always easy. But God is always with us. If we trust him, just as Mary did, he will help us do what he asks of us.
