

Saint of the Day – Vincent Pallotti



Vincent Pallotti (21 April 1795 – 22 January 1850) was an Italian ecclesiastic and a saint. Born in Rome, he was the founder of the Society of the Catholic Apostolate later to be known as the "Pious Society of Missions" (the Pallottines). The original name was restored in 1947. He is buried in the church of San Salvatore in Onda. He is

considered the forerunner of Catholic Action. When Pallotti's body was exhumed in 1906 and 1950, examiners found his body to be incorrupt, a sign of holiness in the tradition of the Roman Catholic Church. His body is enshrined in the church of San Salvatore in Onda, in Rome, where it can be seen.

On June 19, 2022, the Feast of the Body and Blood of Christ, the United States Council of Catholic Bishops (USCCB) began a three-year (2021-2024) focus on the Real Presence of Christ in the Eucharist. Hundreds of diocesan parishes, including us, organized Eucharistic processions to celebrate the Real Presence of Christ in the Eucharist.

The 2021-2024 strategic plan for the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB) centers of the theme, "Created Anew by the Body and Blood of Christ, Source of our Healing and Hope." The main priority of this strategic plan is focused on a National Eucharistic Revival. The intention of this National Eucharistic Revival is to renew the Catholic Church in U.S. by enkindling a living relationship with Jesus' presence in the Holy Eucharist. To kick off this three-year movement of renewal, it encouraged hundreds of dioceses and parishes in U.S. to organize Eucharistic processions on the Feast of Body and Blood of Jesus on June 19th, 2022.

Although the belief in the Real Presence of Christ in the consecrated host is a central

teaching of the Catholic faith, it appears that today many U.S. Catholics have a different understanding of the Eucharist. Most of the U.S. Catholics view the consecrated host as a symbol of Jesus and not the Real Presence of Christ. A 2019 Pew Research Center study showed that approximately 31% of all self-identified U.S. Catholics said that they believed in the Real Presence of Jesus in the Eucharist. However, the other 69% of U.S. Catholics said that they do not believe that the bread and wine used at Mass as the Real Presence of Jesus. Instead, they viewed them as "symbols of the body and blood of Jesus Christ." Hence, a poll by the Pew Research Center in 2019 showed that only one third of U.S. Catholics believed in the Real Presence of Jesus in the Eucharist or their belief in "transubstantiation"

This way, a number of polls over the past decade have shown that many Catholics do not understand what the church teaches about the Eucharist. This understanding of the Eucharist among many Catholics has alarmed many U.S. bishops and they are trying to figure out what to do in order to give the right



understanding of Jesus in the Eucharist. The above survey and many other studies done on the faith of Catholics and their lack of belief in the Real Presence of Jesus in the Eucharist prompted the U.S. bishops to plan this three-year Eucharistic revival to help them to address what they see as a catechetical crisis. Bishop Andrew Cozzens, the Chairman of the Board of the National Eucharistic Congress, notes, "All Catholics are invited into a renewed encounter with Jesus in the Eucharist, especially those Catholics who do not fully understand the power of the Eucharist."

As our beloved Pope Emeritus, Benedict XVI teaches in *Sacramentum Caritatis* (The Sacrament of Charity), "The Eucharist is a mystery to be believed, celebrated and lived." We pray that there may be a reawakening to the presence of Christ in the Eucharist, as He dwells in it and truly and really present in all the Tabernacles throughout the year. Fr.
