

A Note from Fr. Gerson



The Solemnity of Mary, the Holy Mother of God, celebrated each year on January 1st, invites us to begin a new year by focusing on one of the deepest mysteries of our faith, the mystery of the Incarnation. It is fitting that the Church begins the year not with resolutions or personal goals, but with contemplation of Mary, the woman through whom God entered human history. By honoring her as Theotokos, the God-bearer, we proclaim that the child she carried, bore, and cradled is truly Emmanuel-God with us.

In the Gospel for this feast, we hear: "The shepherds went in haste to Bethlehem and found Mary and Joseph, and the infant lying in the manger." This simple scene captures the heart of the Christian story. The shepherds: poor, humble, and socially overlooked are the first to witness the Savior. They go "in haste," responding with openness and wonder, and they find not a royal palace, but a young mother, a faithful husband, and a newborn child resting in a manger. God's choice to reveal Himself in humility reminds us that divine love often comes in simple, unexpected ways.

At the center of this scene is Mary, the Holy Mother of God. She is the first to hold the Incarnate Word and the first to gaze into the eyes of God-made-flesh. Her "yes" to God was courageous and complete, even though she did not fully understand the future. Mary demonstrates that faith is not about having all the answers, but about surrendering to God's will and trusting His plan. Reflecting on her example challenges us to welcome Christ into the hidden, ordinary corners of our lives and to allow God to work through us, even in uncertainty.

Like Mary, the shepherds show us how to respond to God's call: with eagerness, humility, and joy. We too are invited to move "in haste" toward Him and share the encounter with others. As a new year begins, many of us carry hopes, doubts, anxieties, and dreams. Mary, our spiritual mother, guides us through all these moments. She experienced both the joy of the Nativity and the prophecy of sorrow at the foot of the cross. Through everything, she remained steadfast in faith.

This solemnity also reminds us of Mary's ongoing intercession. Her maternal love leads us closer to her Son. If you want to pray during the Mass, ask our Mother of God for guidance. For deeper understanding, consider reading *The Holy Mass Explained to Catalina* by Jesus and Mary, a book that illuminates the beauty, meaning, and graces of the Mass.

As we step into a new year, may Mary inspire us to approach life with courage, trust, and openness. May we welcome Christ anew into our hearts, embrace His presence in our daily lives, and allow the simplicity of Bethlehem to remind us that God's greatest works often come through love, humility, and surrender.

Please keep Deacon Rich in your prayers, as he will be having surgery and his recovery will be an extended time, thus we will not have him assisting on the altar for several weeks.

Holy Mary, Mother of God, pray for us, that this year we may walk closely with your Son and allow His presence to transform our lives. Happy New Year.


(PRACTICING) CATHOLIC – BENEATH THE SURFACE

Mini-reflection: If any four-word sentence encapsulates what we can expect from the Christian life, it is this: God had other plans.

Other Plans: I don't know exactly what kind of life Mary and Joseph envisioned when they were first betrothed — back in those simple times when they were just like any other couple who had hopes, dreams and no angels telling them what to do.

Whatever their plans were, I think it's safe to say that the future God had in store for Mary and Joseph was not one either of them expected. I would imagine they both anticipated something a little quieter. A little more stable (no pun intended). A little less tumultuous. It exhausts me simply to read through the chaos of their movements in today's Gospel. Flee to Egypt, return to Israel (but not Judea! Herod's son is there! Divert to Galilee! Divert!). Settle in Nazareth (let me remind you, this is all happening with a baby in tow, and without the aid of a minivan). Take a deep breath, but don't get too comfortable — now it's almost time to lose your kid in Jerusalem. Then you'll have about 20 years off before he starts raising people from the dead, and that's when things start to get really crazy. The story of the Holy Family is the ultimate example of the phrase "God had other plans." If any four-word sentence encapsulates what we can expect from the Christian life, it is this. I thought I was meant for that job, but God had other plans. I thought I would live in this place, but God had other plans. I thought I was supposed to become this person, but God had other plans. We can do all the right things. We can make all the right choices. We can say, over and over again until our voice wears out, "Thy will be done." But all we can know for sure is that God has other plans. ©LPi



Thank you to Johnny David for his generous support of our school. He purchased "making Christmas cookies with Mrs. England" for Tripp and Genevieve.



St. Basil the Great | January 2

St. Basil the Great (329 – January 1, 379) shares his feast day with his lifelong friend St. Gregory of Nazianzen. These accomplished men fought against heresies that threatened the foundations of the early Church, shaping doctrines around Christ's divinity and the nature of the Holy Trinity.



St. Basil was born at Caesarea of Cappadocia, to a family already deeply rooted in Christianity, going back to the time of widespread persecution in the 1st and 2nd centuries. Following in the footsteps of his father, Basil studied in Caesarea as well as Constantinople and Athens, training in the law and rhetoric. He became a popular teacher. However, his sister persuaded him to give up academia for monastic life. Before inviting St. Gregory to start an order with him, St. Basil traveled through Egypt, Palestine and Syria visiting monasteries, learning everything he could and formulating his own ideas about monastic rule. His rule is still followed today, and he is known as the Father of Eastern Monasticism.

His time in the monastery was relatively short, it was only five years before he was called to play a greater role in the Church. Ordained as a priest, by around 370 he was made bishop of Caesaria. It was in this role that he fought against the heresy of Arianism which denied the divinity of Christ, even defying an emperor! He also fought against other early Trinitarian heresies. But these important doctrinal stands were not what defined Basil. He was passionate about caring for the poor and sick, pastoral care, and fighting against institutionalized prostitution. He would preach twice a day to large crowds, and opened a complex with a hospital, orphanage, and shelter for the poor. In addition to influential monastic rules, sermons, and doctrinal treatises, more than 300 of his letters still exist. St. Basil the Great, pray for us! © LPi

Sacramental Life

Sacrament of Confession

You are lovingly invited to encounter God's mercy and peace through the beautiful **Sacrament of Confession**.

No matter how long it has been, Jesus is waiting for you with open arms—ready to forgive, to heal, and to renew your heart. His love is never withheld from a heart that seeks Him in humility and trust.

This sacred sacrament is rooted in Scripture, where Christ entrusted His apostles with the ministry of reconciliation:

“Whose sins you forgive are forgiven them, and whose sins you retain are retained.” — John 20:23

The effects of this sacrament include:

- Complete forgiveness of sins and reconciliation with God
- Healing of the soul and restoration of grace
- Peace and spiritual consolation • Strength to resist future temptation • Reconciliation with the Church community

Five Simple Steps to a Good Confession:

1. **Examine Your Conscience** / Reflect honestly on your thoughts, words, actions, and omissions since your last confession.

2. **Be Sincerely Sorry for Your Sins (Contrition)** / Feel true sorrow for offending God's love and the desire to change your life.

3. **Confess Your Sins to the Priest** / Speak honestly and openly. The priest is there to help and guide, never to judge.

4. **Receive Absolution** / Through the words of the priest, Christ forgives your sins and restores your soul.

5. **Do Your Penance** / Fulfill the act of penance the priest gives you as a sign of your conversion and gratitude.

Catholic Belief Spotlight



Some recent surveys of Catholics revealed that only 20-30% of Catholics believe that Jesus is truly present in the Holy Eucharist. This is a sad result! So how did we get here? After Vatican II, education of Catholic adults seemed to slow down or even stop. The Church began a 40 50 year period of trying to understand what the Vatican II changes really meant.

In the early 1990's, Pope Saint John Paul II commissioned then Cardinal Joseph Ratzinger (later Pope Benedict XVI) to compile the Catechism of the Catholic Church, and based on the Catechism, the Church slowly improved faith education again. Many Catholic adults, age 70 and up, received an excellent education in their faith. Many Catholic adults age 30 69 received little, no, or inadequate adult education in their faith. Bishop Robert Barron, a popular evangelist/author, discusses this unfortunate situation in his many talks.

It is our responsibility to educate ourselves and our children in the faith. Parents, you are the first teachers of faith for your children. Teach them that Jesus is real and truly present in the Holy Eucharist!




