



Our Lady of the Rosary



"The Rosary has been an integral part of my family's life, and one which remains a part of every day's set of experiences.

My mother lived and prayed the Rosary during World War II: she huddled with us hysterical children in the back of a horse-drawn wagon as we fled from the Russians in 1944; she held my brother in her arms for comfort because there was no medical help when he was badly hurt during an air raid as we passed through Budapest in Hungary: she cried as we went without shelter or adequate food as refugees in Austria. She prayed the Rosary as we crossed the ocean on our way from Germany to the USA in 1950, and repeated "thanks be to God" as we passed in front of the Statue of Liberty. She had done that every day since then.

Rosary beads have been present and in use during the birth of children, weddings of friends and family members, graduations, and many other momentous events. Somehow, they were


involved with every small and large event in every facet of life. Through it, we asked for gifts and we gave thanks for the treasures that we received. In all of them, we know that, like my earthly mother, Mary is always there at our side. It is no coincidence that we have been so blessed; it comes from the intimate union that we formed with Mary while praying the Rosary.

The Rosary is truly a Way of Life. When we pray the Rosary, we invite Mary into our house and into our lives. She always accepts the invitation, and she comes with beautiful housewarming gifts, and most importantly, wherever Mary is, her son will also be there. Transitional Deaconate Ordination Highlights

Each year, a group of American seminarians studying in Rome is ordained to the transitional diaconate in St. Peter's Basilica. This year, beneath the majestic mosaics of the Basilica, 16 men from the Pontifical North American College committed their lives to the service of the Church through their ordination to the transitional diaconate. With over 1,500 guests from across the United States in attendance, the Basilica was filled with family and friends who had come to witness their generous response — their profound "yes" — to God's call. Bishop Joseph G. Hanefeldt, of the Diocese of Grand Island, Nebraska, reminded the men of their calling to be sacramental signs of the Church and to the world — Christ who came "to serve and not to be served." Deacon Sunday: This Sunday, October 12!

The Vocation Ministry has designated the Second Sunday of October as Deacon Sunday, this year to be celebrated on Sunday, October 12th. The purpose of the event is twofold -- to affirm and appreciate men who have responded to the call to the diaconate, and to encourage other men to consider a diaconate vocation. [In our Diocese of Paterson, we are now down to fewer than 90 active deacons (due principally to retirements), and the average age of our active deacons is pushing 70 (only three are 55 or younger).]

"What must I do to inherit eternal life?" Pray for those men who serve us as deacons. By answering a call to the diaconate, a man seeks to follow Jesus' path by serving and enriching the lives of others.





Let us keep Deacon Joe and Deacon Eric in our prayers. They deserve our gratitude and affirmation for their selfless work, proclaiming the Word of God, performing baptisms, witnessing marriages, delivering homilies, and generously sharing their unique gifts in their ministry, both within and beyond the walls of our parish.


A Gift of 100 Holy Hours

"One Step Closer" on Benedictine Humility

On Tuesday, September 16, 2025, the monthly *One Step Closer* program returned after a summer hiatus, with parishioner Dan Balogh presenting on the topic of *Benedictine Humility: Without the Monastery*.

Saint Benedict (c. 480–547 AD) was an Italian monk, abbot, and the "father of Western monasticism," known for establishing a twelve-step rule for monastic life, which became the standard for countless monastic orders and spread throughout Europe. Even though St. Benedict lived over 1,500 years ago, and the focus of his

rule was those in religious life, his message remains relevant to the world today, as humility is the gateway to all virtues. Dan spoke about each of St. Benedict's twelve steps and provided suggestions on how we can live out each one in our own lives, outside the walls of a monastery.



"I have to commend this presentation on Humility. This virtue is important and challenging to discuss during a time when egoism is embraced and prevalent in our society. We learned that there are twelve steps in the Benedictine Humility, some of which were intended for application during the time period in which it was written, around 500 AD, for monks to practice obedience. To be silent then could correspond to listening more today. We discussed that the gifts we have are not for our own use; they are given to us by God and meant to be shared. Practicing humility lets us know we need to be the most humble of servants to the Lord and others so that we can give Him the proper praise." Helen Krisiewicz

"I felt Dan's presentation on humility was such a wake-up call for me. Growing up, the expectations of society, especially for women, were to be assertive and stand up for oneself. For a woman to "know her place" was considered an insult of the highest degree. Benedictine humility reminds us that to truly serve the Lord, we have to admit that we are nothing without God. Dan spoke about the path to Heaven. I think walking with humility is so difficult in a world that promotes just the opposite. But I hope to carry those 12 steps and the Litany of Humility with me and "know my place" with God. I am His humble servant." Rita McLeary

"I recently attended this year's first "One Step Closer" topic of humility given by Dan Balogh. Having prepared a lesson for confirmation students on the subject, I The purpose of *One Step Closer* is to provide opportunities for faith formation among adults, with different topics presented each month. **Our next**

thought I would be familiar with most of the material. That was not the case. Early in the program, Dan noted what a tragedy it would be if we lived our lives without becoming saints. The remainder of the presentation was a road map on how to do that. For instance, it is more important to obey God, so we don't disappoint Him, not because we fear consequences. Taken literally, the twelve steps of humility may seem extreme, but they are really a call for us to do better. As always, Dan was well prepared, very detailed, and entertaining." Paul De Luca


Help us to recognize the gift of human life as a sign of hope in our world.
