DI EASE DRAV WITH HE EOD.

I would like to ask you to be as generous as you can in your gift to our Parish for Easter Sunday. We always need your help and support, as our commitments continue to call for a response. Just for example, a fuse box in St. Anthony's Church stopped functioning, and had to be replaced. It was a very complicated operation, and the bill was 2,600 dollars. It might sound like a small problem, but it was a big and very important job. That's just one example of the many bills we face on a daily basis. Again, please be as generous as you can this Easter. I thank you in advance.

I want to encourage you to attend as many of our Holy Week liturgies as you can. The night of reconciliation, on Monday, March 26th, we will have confessions at Amenia from 5 pm to 8 pm. Then we have the Holy Thursday Mass at 7:30 pm on Thursday, March 29th. We have the Good Friday liturgy at 3 pm on March 30th in Pine Plains. Then we have the Easter Vigil at 8 pm on March 31st in Amenia (there is no 4:30 pm Mass on Saturday).

The Easter Sunday Masses will be the usual times: 8 am in Pine Plains and 10:45 am in Amenia. I hope you can make as many celebrations as you can.

I recently came across some very disturbing information in regards to our disabled brothers and sisters. Many of you are aware of children born with Down's Syndrome, a birth disability that affects a child's mental and physical development. What is happening now is that parents are, through prenatal screening, able to detect the syndrome before birth. This pre-natal information then often results in the abortion of the fetus.

In the country of Iceland, the rate of aborting these Down's Syndrome fetuses has reached 100%. Three Down's Syndrome babies were born in Iceland in 2009. In Britain 90 percent of women who have learned that their child has Down's Syndrome will have them aborted. America's rate is 67% (1995-2011). This disturbing situation is even more upsetting since there are more opportunities for Down's Syndrome children now to enjoy a fulfilling life. Please join me in prayer this Easter for a world that is ready to care for all human beings who are less fortunate than us.

PALM SUNDAY - Palm Sunday is the final Sunday of Lent, The beginning of Holy Week, and commemorates the triumphant arrival of Christ in Jerusalem, days before He was crucified. In the Gospels, Jesus entered Jerusalem riding a young donkey, and to the lavish praise of the townspeople who threw palms or small branches, in front of him as a sign of homage. This was customary practice for people of great respect. Palm branches are a widely recognized symbol of peace and victory, hence their preferred use on Palm Sunday. The use of a donkey instead of a horse is highly symbolic, it represents the humble arrival of someone in peace, as opposed to arriving on a steed in war. A week later, Christ would rise from the dead on the first Easter.

A GOOD TIME - Approximately 75 people gathered in our gym last Sunday afternoon for St. Patrick's "Pot Luck" and "Bake Sale." We shared some great food, listened to wonderful Irish music provided by Jim Devine and enjoyed each other's company. I want to especially thank all the bakers, cooks and volunteers who made this day a success. We netted \$364.50 from the Bake Sale and \$167.00 from the 50/50. A special thanks to Matthew Leach and James Syversen for their presentation on the Life of St. Patrick. Good job boys!
