"PAYCHECK PROTECTION PROGRAM AND THE CATHOLIC CHURCH"

Dear Friends.

Recently there have been articles in various publications, including the Poughkeepsie Journal on July 11th, about the U.S. Government program called the Paycheck Protection Program and the Catholic Church. These articles focus on the Catholic Church in New York, our own Archdiocese of New York.

The article points out that the Church of New York received \$28 million dollars, for "its executive offices." It sounds to me like the money was used for major Archdiocesan operations, like Catholic Charities. But to say "executive offices" kind of sounds like furtniture and furnishings in the Cathedral, which is not the case.

The Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) was intended to help organizations and companies deal with the severe shutdown due to the Coronavirus. It was a major crisis, and the government wanted to keep people employed. The PPP was a loan progam to be strictly used for payroll and payroll expenses, health insurance and utilities which includes heating oil. In my opinion, it was a success. Many, many people kept their jobs.

The Archdiocese informed us about the program and we were encouraged to apply. Our parish did apply since we were worried that the shutdown would seriously reduce our collections. It was a difficult situation. We applied for the program and were granted the loan. It was a life saver. We were able to keep working and pay our many bills.

It is important to emphasize that the money was to be used only for payroll, health insurance, utilities and heating oil. The article in the Journal (which is no surprise) brings up the tragic sex abuse scandals in the Church. This seems to imply that the PPP program funds were somehow involved with the sex abuse payouts. This is untrue. The PPP funds are strictly limited.

The article also accuses the Church of using a "loophole" or "favor". Their contention being that the Church was too large to apply for the loans and should not have received any. But each entity, parishes and agencies, applied individually for the loans, and thereby met the qualifications to receive a loan. It has been so important to keep our loyal and excellent church employees paid in order to serve God and the Church. It's always important to get the full story.

SHARE YOUR FAITH - In this time of uncertainty, followers of Jesus know that worry is unnecessary. We know God wants us to experience His peace and share it with others. Try these tips to help others lean on God:

<u>Go deep into God's love</u> - It is ours today, tomorrow, and forever. "...Good indeed is the Lord, His mercy endures forever, His faithfulness lasts through every generation" (Psalm 100:5). Experiencing Sacraments, reading Scripture, and spending time in prayer are keys to growing in God's love and sharing it.

<u>Share your confidence in God's care</u> - Jesus promised that God will give us all we need. "Therefore I tell you, do not be anxious about your life, what you shall eat or what you shall drink, nor about your body, what you shall put on… your heavenly Father knows that you need them all" (Matthew 6:25, 32). Stress stems from the absence of certainty and control over our future. When we put ourselves in God"s care, we can feel peace.

<u>Demonstrate trust in God</u> - While we may not be completely free from worry, St. Paul wrote, "Have no anxiety at all, but in everything, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, make your requests known to God. Then the peace of God that surpasses all understanding will guard your hearts and minds in Christ Jesus" (Philippians 4:6-7).

<u>WHY DO CATHOLIC CHURCHES DISPLAY CRUCIFIXES</u>? Many Christian Churches display simple crosses or other peaceful symbols of their faith. Non-Caholics wonder why we choose instead the crucifix, which can be a disturbing image.

The crucifix is not just part of our Catholic identity. The Catholic Church requires that a crucifix be visible during the celebration of Mass to remind us of the sacrifice of Jesus on the altar of the Cross, which is made present for us each time we celebrate the Holy Eucharist. It is a powerful representation of the body and blood Jesus shed for us.

To Catholics, the crucifix is a symbol of the ultimate act of love. A cross recalls the Resurrection and Jesus' triumph over death. This is important to us, too. But to fully understand our own redemption, we need to be reminded of what Jesus had to endure, namely His Passion and death, before the Ressurection. We are also reminded that God gave His only Son for our salvation. The Crucifix is a full image of our redemption.
