## "WHOEVER WELCOMES THIS LITTLE CHILD IN MY NAME WELCOMES ME"

#### Dear Friends:

An argument started among the disciples as to which of them would be the greatest. Jesus, knowing their thoughts, took a little child and had him stand besde Him. Then He said to them "Whoever welcomes this little child in my name welcomes me; and whoever welcomes me welcomes the one who sent me. For it is the one who is least among you all who is the greatest." ~ Luke 96-48 ~

My first response to this gospel is to focus on the child and the nature of "becoming a child" in relation to God's Kingdom. I have spoken before how we should strive to become like children in that we should be more innocent, more trusting, more curious.

That is certainly true. The qualities of children are very admirable. Children are very trusting and very loving. Children have not been exposed to the harshness of the world so that they have not become cynical. Children are also very hopeful. These are all good things.

However, as I read the gospel over again, there is a second very valuable message in this gospel.

This message lies in the position of children in some societies and cultures. Throughout history sometimes children have not been valued. Sometimes they are to be silenced and hidden away. I think of the phrase "children should be seen and not heard."

Children are very vulnerable and very dependent. Some have treated them with abuse and neglect. Sometimes children are seen as "nobodies" in society.

Perhaps Jesus is reminding us that we need to reach out to those marginalized and neglected in society. We are to welcome those who are ignored and unvalued in our world: "whoever welcomes this little child in my name welcomes me."

It reminds me of the song: "Whatsoever you do for the least of my people, that you do unto me." It is so clear in the gospels that Jesus reached out to the "rejects" of society: lepers, foreigners, the demon-possessed, the sinners. Examples of that are everywhere in the life of Christ. It is our responsibility to do the same in this world.
