



REFLECTIONS WITH FATHER UJU

Second Sunday in Ordinary Time

As the New Year begins, many are thinking of what resolutions to make; many too are wondering and trying to know what the Spirit is telling them. These happen because every life worth the cost, wants to have a vision and a mission, or as some people say, vocation. Regardless of the pandemic ad the restrictions of last year God has allowed us to be part of 2021; and we thank him for the progress made in stopping the scourge of the virus. Today the Scriptures tell us about the call of Samuel, as well as what can be called the response of the first disciples of Jesus. The second reading on the other hand tells us partly what is involved in a call. The young Samuel staying with Eli heard the call and went to his master who on the third time understood that it was God, who was calling the young man and so told him how to respond. What this tells us and what we see in the gospel is that in most of life's vocation there is need for discernment. Samuel needed the experienced Eli to discern what is happening to him. The first disciples of Jesus needed the discerning spirit of John the Baptist to help point them to Jesus. Many people in our faith community today do not bother to find the voice that can help them to discern. Most look for their peers and people who can affirm them and not people who can look them in the eyes and tell them the truth in their experiences. Simply put, every Christian needs some spiritual direction. We need somebody to bear our minds to about what we are experiencing—someone who can help tell us godlytruth and point the way for us. That was what Eli did for Samuel and what John the Baptist did for the first apostles. Who is doing that for you? This year I am sure the Spirit of God has told each of us something and about what to do, how best to act, how to serve Him better, and how to become better in our faith and practice. If you want to understand better, how to do it (them) or if, yet, you do not know, seek someone to help you discern. It part of the pastor's job unless you already have someone doing so for you. Therefore, it is still early for you to respond to God. Let us do so and we will be richly blessed as the days roll on. Beginning the ordinary time in the Church's liturgical calendar should not make us think that life now goes on from where we left it before Advent. Remember our journey is looking towards the end that can come any day. Don't let that light die in your hands.

A <mark>Prayer</mark> for Spiritual Communion

My Jesus, I believe that you are present in the Most Holy Sacrament. I love you above all things and I desire to receive you in my soul. Since I cannot at this moment receive you sacramentally, come at least spiritually into my heart. I embrace you as if you were already there and unite myself wholly to you. Never permit me to be separated from you. Amen.

Everyday Stewardship

We're about to dive headlong into week two of Ordinary Time, and we need to admit, after the hustle and bustle of the holidays, things are indeed looking more ... ordinary, at least in our spiritual lives.

The transcendent highs of the Christmas season are flatlining a bit and the vivid imagery of the Nativity scene has faded. The solemn anticipation of the Advent season is by now a distant memory.

Are you bored yet?

Here's a secret: I think that Ordinary Time can actually be quite extraordinary, if we're really living out our baptismal call.

In today's Gospel, Jesus point-blank asks Andrew, who is following him after hearing John the Baptist's testimony: "What are you looking for?" He's asking us the same question.

What are you looking for? Why are you following me? Is it for the Christmas cookies and the Advent carols? Is it for the King's Cake on the Epiphany? Is it for the feeling we get on Christmas when we just know God has done a wondrous thing?

None of those things are bad, but they are not what Andrew was looking for, and they were not what Christ promised him when he said, "Come, and you will see." Andrew was looking for the Messiah — the One who makes even Ordinary Time extraordinary. The One who can sanctify the longest and dullest of to-do lists, on the longest and dullest of days. The One whose peace can reign in our homes on January 25, not just December 25.

Remember what you are looking for. Come, and you will see.

Jesus changed Simon's name to Peter. Peter means rock. He knew that Peter would be strong enough to hold his church together.


