

Faith Formation Summer Programs

For Teens: High School Summer Intensive

The High School Summer Intensive is a two-week program for 9th-12th graders who want to dive deep into the study of their faith. Participating teens must be prepared to read, discuss, and reflect upon their faith with peers, under the guidance of their catechists. Teens who complete the Summer Intensive (with 100% attendance) receive credit for a full year of ongoing faith formation.

Schedule for the Summer Intensive:

Monday, July 17th through Thursday, July 20th - 1:00 to 4:00 pm

Saturday, July 22nd - 9:00 am to 5:00 pm

Monday, July 24th through Thursday, July 27th - 1:00 to 4:00 pm

Cost of the Program: \$150/teen

For Elementary School Kids: Faith, Fellowship and Fun Camp

The Faith, Fellowship and Fun Camp is a one-week camp-like experience for 1st through 6st graders. Campers will experience the joys of fellowship in faith with their peers through a range of activities, including stories, games, music, and arts and crafts. The focus is faith-filled fun (It's summer, after all!).

The Faith, Fellowship and Fun Camp does not fulfill requirements for ongoing faith formation.

There will be two one-week camp sessions:

Monday, June 5th through Friday, June 9th

Monday, June 12th through Friday, June 16th

Camp starts at 8:30 a.m. and ends at 4:00 p.m. Aftercare will be available until 5 p.m.

Families may register for only one session. If a family would like to participate in both sessions, they can go on the waiting list for their second-choice session. If there is space available after the registration period, families will be added in the order they signed up for the waiting list.

Cost of the Program: \$150/child per week Aftercare: \$50/child per week

Fourth Sunday in Lent – the fourth chapter in the History of Salvation

The first five books of the Bible (the Pentateuch) have traditionally been named as "the books of Moses", but they were not composed by Moses. Not even by a single person. Not even at the same age. They were composed by different people, and from different ages and different backgrounds. Scholars have found that the Pentateuch is a composite of four separate, complete, and coherent documents. Those documents are:

- · J the Yahwist. J gets its name because it uses and allows humans to use the name (Jahwe in German) before Israel exists. J appears to have been composed in Judah, perhaps during Solomon's day, around 950 B.C.E.
- · E the Elohist. The name is derived from E's use of Elohim (Hebrew for "God") rather than YHWH in the early period. E appears to have been written in the north, around 850 B.C.E.
- · P the Priestly source. P is especially concerned with stories and laws relevant for priests. Many scholars date P either during the exile, six centuries before Christ.
- · D is essentially the book of Deuteronomy. It is not mingled with J, E and P. It's a separate work. The other three "traditions" mingle in the other four books of the Torah, or the Pentateuch, which is how we Catholics call these first five books of the Bible. When those traditions overlap in some passages of Genesis, for example, we find two different narratives for the Creation. If you're curious, take your Bible and read the first chapters of Genesis to see if you can identify them.

There was a "deuteronomist tradition" which may be detected in other books that appear later in the Bible, like the one from which is taken the first reading for this fourth Sunday of Lent, the fourth "chapter" in the History of Salvation, the Book of Samuel.

The two books of Samuel were originally one book and actually form a continuation of the deuteronomic history of the people of Israel. It also marks a turning point in the history of God's people as Samuel is the last of the judges.

Under increasing pressure from the Philistines, Samuel struggles to keep Israel faithful to Yahweh. Defeats in battle and the failure of Samuel's sons to follow his example, convince the people that Israel needs a new kind of leadership; a king. Samuel thought this was wrong, but God told him "Grant the people's every request. It is not you they reject, they are rejecting me as their king."

Samuel then anointed Saul, who doesn't work out too well, then God tells him to anoint David. It is of David's selection that we hear today. David became the most memorable king of Israel and he received the promise that his throne would last forever, which was fulfilled in the person of Jesus Christ, the King of eternal glory. The fourth chapter in the History of Salvation, as we're reviewing this year, is the anointment of David as future king, and royal ancestor of Jesus Christ.

Meanwhile, the anger of the Pharisees and obstinacy for the rules and rigorous compliance with the Law, forgetting compassion and mercy, would grow little by little until overflowing.

And now, a brief commentary about this Sunday's Gospel

Jesus heals a man born blind. It is striking that on this occasion it is Jesus who is looking for the blind man and not the other way around. And it is curious because most of the time the sicks are who approach Jesus to be healed.

There is a detail worth commenting on: Jesus smeared the blind man's eyes with mud near the Temple, behind which there was a well, and yet, Jesus Christ sends him to wash in Siloam, a pool that was like a half mile away, in the lower part of Jerusalem. And the blind man does not ask why, but he simply does so. He risks making a fool of himself by traversing most of the city with muddy eyes, stumbling because maybe he never dared to go that far. But he did it, and his effort was the contribution he made on his part for the miracle to take place.

Instead of rejoicing because of his healing, some people will hound the healed man like hunting prey. Interrogations that sought to blame the blind man, his family and the one who had healed him on Saturday, a sacred day dedicated to God!

That "prophet" who healed the blind man, who approaches him for the second time and shows that He is the Son of God, skips any type of norm created by men. He prefers to save and give light to those who need it, without watching rules and norms. For Jesus, Mercy and Compassion overcome any barrier.

What did the blind man care if it was Saturday or not? For the blind man, Jesus was the light, who restored color to life and his face to the people around him. That was all he needed to know. He was touched by a light in which he discovered the compassionate face of God and his divine tenderness.

In the narrative, that man's faith grows as he meets Jesus; from calling him "that man", going through "prophet" to confessing him as "Son of God". Meanwhile, the anger of the Pharisees and obstinacy for the rules and rigorous compliance with the Law, forgetting compassion and mercy, would grow little by little until overflowing.

We too can be healed on Saturday, or Sunday, or whenever; Jesus can also approach us and tell us to go wash ourselves of everything that prevents us from seeing the Light. We only have to go to the pool and wash off our mud to see the world as it was created. Remember Genesis: "... and God saw that it was good..."


