


Works of Mercy Tree Materials:

Directions:

1. Cover a coffee can with gift wrapping paper.

- 2. Fill the coffee can with plaster of paris. Set the branch down into the plaster of paris and hold the branch upright.
- 3. Have the students make little booklets from gift wrapping paper and write a promise to perform a work of mercy inside each booklet. (One or two aides will be needed to help the younger students write their works.)
- **4.** Write the Corporal and Spiritual Works of Mercy on the board.
