Your second step is to contact Tessie in the office, 851-1874, to schedule and get a baptism packet. **Be sure you provide all the necessary documents 10 days prior to the baptism class.** Baptism class is the 2nd Thursday of every month at 6 PM. **Reservations are needed for the class.** At least one godparent must be a practicing Catholic. All baptisms are celebrated on the 1st, 2nd, 3rd, & 4th Sunday of each month at 12 noon, after the 10:30 Mass.
- **Matrimony** • At least one party must be a registered, practicing member of St. Rose with at least 6 months active proven attendance at Mass. After this is accomplished, please call Jane Lucero to make an appointment to begin your 6 month marriage preparation process. *Please make no arrangements until after this appointment.* You may pick up a marriage packet in the parish office. *Engaged Encounter* weekend is required: www.renoee.org for dates, times and registration.
- **Anointing of the Sick** • It is best to call at the *beginning* of a serious illness or when surgery is first scheduled.
- **Funerals** • Upon the death of a loved one, please call the Parish Office to make arrangements, 851-1874.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

This month, parishes around the country will conduct the "October count," a measure of attendance at Sunday Mass. The measure has been taken for many centuries, and in some European dioceses it is possible to measure the level of engagement in worship by the population over the course of many centuries. Long ago, it was also the custom to track "Easter duty" by a statistical report. Penitents would receive a kind of chit at confession, which they would then turn in at their parish church when they received Holy Communion during Easter time.

Long ago, of course, Communion was fairly rare in the life of a Catholic Christian, perhaps only once a year. The chits would be tallied by parish priests and reported to the chancery, which in turn would hold on to the records and include the statistics in a report to the Vatican every five years. Nowadays, the October count has proved especially critical in the life of our Church as bishops use the figures to measure the vitality of church life, to sketch parish boundaries, and even to decide when to close, merge, or form new parishes.

STEWARDSHIP REFLECTION

Our Gospel Reading from St. Luke relates to how Jesus healed 10 lepers. However, only one realized the full sense of his healing and he returned to say "Thank you." To that gesture Jesus responds to him, "Stand up and go; your faith has saved you." This is another case

where something may have been lost in our translation. The last line in its original Greek might also be translated "Your faith has made you whole," or "Your faith has made you well." In any case, the point is the importance of gratitude to God. How often have we pointed out that stewardship is a response in gratitude to God's blessings? That ongoing and consistent feeling of thanks is so important.

Jesus healed 10, but only one was really completely healed. The other nine were healed physically, but only the one who felt the gratitude was healed both physically and spiritually. In that sense he was truly "made whole" and "saved."

That is the same salvation that we seek, and the key to it would seem to be that deep sense of thanksgiving as part of our lives and how we live them. Bishop John C. Wester of the Diocese of Salt Lake City opened a recent stewardship conference in his diocese by saying, "Stewardship is about gratitude — recognizing what there is to be thankful for. Gratitude is at the heart of our faith in the Eucharist."

The recent storms in Louisiana may not have a name, but the names of those suffering in the wake of the worst flooding since Hurricane Katrina are our sisters and brothers. As a people of God, let us come to their aid. I encourage Catholics across the United States to respond generously. Our prayer and material support is urgently needed to help rebuild lives.

As many as 60,000 homes have been damaged, with nearly 20,000 people being rescued from the flood waters. More than 106,000 individuals and families have sought federal disaster aid. Immediate and long-term recovery needs place a tremendous burden on public and private resources. This is a burden we can help carry as the body of Christ. Faced with the loss of their worldly possessions and, in some cases, economic livelihood, the flood waters left thousands of families feeling isolated and fearful. Let us draw near to them.

As president of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops, I have called for an emergency collection on or near September 18 to support the humanitarian efforts of Catholic Charities USA and to provide pastoral and rebuilding support to impacted Catholic dioceses. Join the Church in being a visible witness to the healing presence of Jesus alive in the world. Understandably, not every parish may be able to participate, but individuals can also donate directly to Catholic Charities USA. Whether your donation is large or small, let us also be sure those suffering feel the power of our prayer to sustain them in the difficult days ahead.

Jubilee Year of Mercy

Twenty-eighth Sunday in Ordinary Time
Jubilee of Marian Devotion

This weekend, the Jubilee honors Mary under the title Pope Francis suggests, "Mother of Mercy." Recall the Good Samaritan Gospel. Priest and Levite saw suffering but showed no mercy. Recall the rich man, who never saw Lazarus right before his eyes, and showed no mercy. Today, Jesus sees ten lepers from afar and shows extraordinary mercy. Mary's entire life, declares Francis, was modeled on Jesus, "Mercy-Made-Flesh." Indeed, standing at the cross, Mary saw Jesus' mercy take flesh when Jesus showed mercy to the executioners. So Pope Francis recommends we frequently pray the *Salve Regina*, Hail, Holy Queen, asking her to ever look upon us with mercy, so that we might be worthy to gaze upon the face of her merciful Son Jesus. May we do so not only in eternity, but here and now, opening our eyes to see Jesus in others, and our hearts to serve Jesus in others by loving deeds of unconditional mercy. —Peter Scagnelli, Copyright © J. 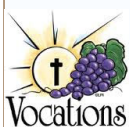

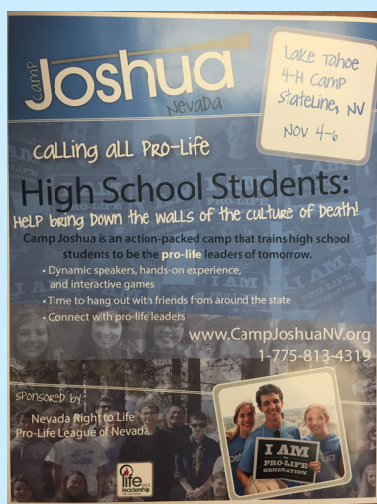
**KNIGHTS OF COLUMBUS

ISSUES OF PEACE & JUSTICE

Once again Jesus shows His "preferential option for the poor" in today's gospel. In exploring this fundamental CST principle, we look at more significant Church documents on the topic.

Pacem In Terris, Pope John XXIII (1963): "Considerations of justice and equity can at times demand that those in power pay more attention to the weaker members of society, since these are at a disadvantage when it comes to defending their own rights and asserting their legitimate interests" (#56).

Lumen Gentium, Vatican II, 1964: "For it is the duty of all bishops to promote and to safeguard the unity of faith and the discipline common to the whole Church, to instruct the faithful to love for the whole mystical body of Christ, especially for its poor and sorrowing members and for those who are suffering persecution for justice's sake" (#23).

Gaudium Et Spes, Vatican II, 1965: "The joys and the hopes, the griefs and the anxieties of the men of this age, especially those who are poor or in any way afflicted, these are the joys and hopes, the griefs and anxieties of the followers of Christ" (#1).

Populorum Progressio, Pope Paul VI (1967): "Everyone knows that the Fathers of the Church laid down the duty of the rich toward the poor in no uncertain terms" (#23).

Octogesima Adveniens Pope Paul VI (1971): "In teaching us charity, the Gospel instructs us in the preferential respect due to the poor and the special situation they have in society: the more fortunate should renounce some of their rights so as to place their goods more generously at the service of others" (#23).

Find Your Catholic Voice - Revenge or Forgive (RF)

We now turn onto the Right-Front Trail and consider two choices in addressing the damage done: Revenge and Forgiveness.

Take a purely economic example where someone damages your property:

there are essentially two possible outcomes. The first is to demand that *he* pay for the damages. The second is to refuse to let *him* pay anything. There could also be some combination of the two in which you both share the costs.

But notice that in every option the consequences –here the cost of the damage - must be borne by someone. Either you or he absorbs the consequences of his conduct; neither the need for repair nor the associated expense vaporizes. More troublesome, is that most of the wrongs done to us are not as tangible as this example and cannot be measured in dollars. Someone may have deprived you of some happiness, opportunity, certain aspects of your freedom, or harmed your reputation. No price tag can be put on such things, yet we still have an instinctive claim on justice that does not go away - even when the other person says, "I'm really sorry."

Here again there are two options. The first is to forcibly extract compensation. However, even when you take reparation through revenge the evil done still does not dissolve. On the contrary, evil spreads, and it spreads most tragically of all into you and your character.

The second option, an alternative to revenge, is more problematic and yet far more effective.

You can forgive.

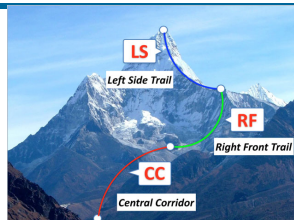
