Jubilee Year of Mercy

Thirty-first Sunday in Ordinary Time

Last Sunday's Gospel gave us a tax collector's beautiful prayer to take with us from this Jubilee Year of Mercy. Today, another tax collector's encounter with Jesus offers a comforting memory to cherish, but also a challenging mission to embrace. Zacchaeus' short stature (see Luke 19:3) matched how contemptible, socially and spiritually, Zacchaeus' religious acquaintances considered tax collectors to be. Jesus counters that judgment with mercy. Radical sin meets unmerited grace. God seeks and finds the lost; a sinner's home becomes salvation's house. The sinner "quickly" welcomes salvation "with joy" (19:6), while the righteous grumble judgmentally at God's mercy. Mercy challenges us, too. Like Zacchaeus, we have been sought and found by Jesus, called by name to welcome Jesus into our heart's home. Therefore, we must go forth from this Jubilee Year of Mercy as "missionaries of mercy," seeking our fellow sinners with Jesus, receiving them with joy (see 19:6) as cherished brothers and sisters, and joyfully offering our judgment-free hospitality as Jesus' own "Welcome home!" -Peter Scagnelli, Copyright © J. TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

The recent "October count" tracking the statistics of participation at Sunday Mass calls to mind the situations of churches where it is difficult or impossible for Catholics to worship freely. This is especially striking in English Catholic history, as freedom of worship was systematically dismantled at the time of the Reformation. It seems that most English people retained deeply Catholic sympathies throughout the period of religious upheaval. Catholics who refused to participate in the public worship of the Church of England were called "recusants," and beginning with the reign of Elizabeth I, they were subject to strict penalties. Recusant literally means "a person refusing to obey a command." Most of those laws were in force until the early 1800s, and Catholics were not entirely emancipated from the duty of Anglican worship until 1829.

Recusants paid heavy fines for not attending the state church. Holding on to Catholic faith was therefore a luxury of the very rich, who maintained private chapels, and sent their daughters and sons to English convents and monastery schools on the continent. Remarkably, the first among all British peers, the Dukes of Norfolk, the hereditary Earls Marshal of England, have never given up their Catholic faith. Many of these wealthy recusant families founded the colony of Maryland, and later many members of the old Catholic families continued on to the Kentucky frontier in search of greater religious freedom.—Rev. STEWARDSHIP REFLECTIONS

In the Gospel Reading from St. Luke we hear the story of the tax collector Zacchaeus and his desire to see and perhaps meet Jesus. The image of Zacchaeus up in that sycamore tree is one that many of us may recall from our childhood, and hearing it — because it is a vivid impression, and one that even as we get older may — may trigger a memory.



The name Zacchaeus means "pure one," but he certainly was not pure. We learn from his own confession how he has overcharged and cheated people in his tax collection duties. However, for all his faults and shortcomings Zacchaeus seeks purity, and he understands that Jesus is a way to achieve that. It is interesting to note that Zacchaeus climbs a tree to see Jesus better. That sounds like something a child might do, and that fulfills in a small way an instruction Jesus gives to each of us, "Amen, I say to you, unless you turn and become like children, you will not enter the kingdom of heaven." Jesus follows that remark my immediately reminding us that we must become humble like children.

That is a cue for us to recall importance of humility when it comes to being a good steward, but thanks to the lesson of Zacchaeus we learn even more about how to seek stewardship. Like the tax collector we need to make an effort to seek Jesus; like him we must be humble; we must welcome Jesus into our homes and into our hearts; and finally we need to receive him joyfully.

Because of the election on Tuesday, November 8, the morning mass on Wednesday, November 9th, will be celebrated at 12 noon.

I am sure people will be wanting to watch this one late into the night (as I will be) so it seems to me to be humane to have it later on Wednesday.



Bishop Joseph Pepe and Bishop Randolph Calvo, in our capacity as the Nevada Catholic Conference, issue this statement in opposition to the Initiative To Regulate And Tax Marijuana. The Initiative, which is Ballot Question 2, proposes legalizing the sale and the recreational use of marijuana in Nevada. As people of faith, we must speak out against the damaging effects the passage of Question 2 would have on the children and families of Nevada.

Legalizing the sale and the recreational use of marijuana in Nevada sends a message to children and young people that drug use is socially and morally acceptable. Further, legalizing the sale and recreational use of marijuana will lead to more abuse by teens, more emergency room visits, more traffic deaths, and more strain on already overburdened agencies.

A strong Nevada economy requires continued growth. A dependable workforce is essential to the growth which creates a strong economy. We believe that passage of Question 2 would have a negative effect on potential new businesses considering making Nevada their home, because of concerns recreational marijuana use would raise about the dependability of the work force.

Because of the detrimental effects it would have on children, families, the economy, and all of society, we strongly urge Nevadans to oppose the legalization of the sale and recreational use of marijuana, and to vote "No" on Ballot Question 2.



Christianity without altering their life." (The Kingdom of God is Within You, Leo Tolstoy, Chapter V). Perhaps these words, over 120 years after Tolstoy wrote them, still ring true, and perhaps this is a question we need to periodically ask ourselves: Does being Christian alter my life? Pope Benedict states, "'Worship itself, Eucharistic communion, includes the reality both of being loved and of loving others in turn. A Eucharist which does not pass over into the concrete practice of love is intrinsically fragmented.' This appeal to the moral value of spiritual worship should not be interpreted in a merely moralistic way. It is before all else the joy-filled discovery of love at work in the hearts of those who accept the Lord's gift. abandon themselves to him and thus find true freedom. The moral transformation implicit in the new worship instituted by Christ is a heartfelt yearning to respond to the Lord's love with one's whole being, while remaining ever conscious of one's own weakness. This is clearly reflected in the Gospel story of Zacchaeus. After welcoming Jesus to his home, the tax collector is completely changed: he decides to give half of his possessions to the poor and to repay fourfold those whom he had defrauded. The moral urgency born of welcoming Jesus into our lives is the fruit of gratitude for having experienced the Lord's unmerited closeness" (Sacramentum Caritatis, #82).

Does being Christian alter my life?

Remember please, that the priests of St. Rose of Lima parish are responsible for Renown South Meadows/Tahoe Pacific hospital on South Meadows and Double R parkway. We are not responsible for St. Mary's or Renown downtown. Those hospitals are serviced by Catholic priest chaplains and by the responsible parishes; St. Mary's (Cathedral) and Renown (Little Flower). Those parishes are staffed by 3 or 4 full-time priests.

Please let the hospital nurse's station staff know if you want the priest on-call to come with the Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick, in a timely and reasonable manner, if you or someone you know is in either one of those hospitals. It is not the responsibility of the St. Rose priests (one full-time and one half -time!) to go all the way into town for sacraments. We can and do visit our parishioners there if possible.

We provide excellent and sufficient pastoral care for our members who are ill and/or advanced in age at St. Rose! We have many homebound visitors, Extraordinary Ministers to the homebound, Sacrament of Anointing scheduled at the nursing homes, and after Masses on weekends if requested, and on a regular basis on First Fridays at Mass.

Sickness and death are not in the control of the priests, it is God's business. Think ahead, think accordingly and make arrangements if needed. We live by faith, not by fear and panic.

Find Your Catholic Voice Substitutionary Sacrifice

Still at the movies: Rocky (on death row) is incredulous. "You asking me to pull an act, turn yellow, so those kids will think I'm no

good.... Nothing doing. You want to help those kids, you got to think about some other way." Father Jerry is calling Rocky to make a substitutionary sacrifice. If you hold on to your dignity, he says, those kids will eventually die in shame. If you die in shame, their lives can be salvaged. Rocky refuses. But the next morning as Rocky walks to the execution chamber, he cries out for mercy in cowardly hysterics, and dies in apparent humiliation.

The gospel, however, is not just a moving fictional story about someone else. It is a true story - about us. We are those delinquent kids. And to save us Jesus gave up something infinitely greater than celebrity.

But just what did Jesus give up?

The gospel narratives make it clear that Jesus did not face death with the courage that was generally expected in a spiritual hero. The well-known Maccabean martyrs, who suffered under the Syrian rule of Antiochus Epiphanes, were notable examples of courage in the face of persecution. They were renowned for being defiant and having confidence in God even as their limbs were cut off. That stands in blunt contrast with Jesus, who is deeply disturbed by his approaching suffering and death. "...He began to be deeply distressed and troubled" saying, "My soul is overwhelmed with sorrow to the point of death" (Mark 14:33-34).
