ADMINISTRATION OF THE SACRAMENTS

- Baptism We welcome all families with young children. For your first step, you must become a registered, practicing, contributing member of St. Rose of Lima. Your second step is to contact Tessie in the office, 851-1874, to schedule and get a baptism packet. Be sure you provide all the necessary documents 10 days prior to the baptism class. Baptism class is the 2nd Thursday of every month at 6 PM. Reservations are needed for the class. At least one godparent must be a practicing Catholic. All baptisms are celebrated on the 1st, 2nd, 3rd, & 4th Sunday of each month at 12 noon, after the 10:30 Mass. No baptisms during Lent.
- Matrimony At least one party must be a registered, practicing member of St. Rose with at least 6 months active proven attendance at Mass. After this is accomplished, please call Jane Lucero to make an appointment to begin your 6 month marriage preparation process. Please make no arrangements until after this appointment. You may pick up a marriage packet in the parish office. Engaged Encounter weekend is required: www.renoee.org for dates, times and registration.
- Anointing of the Sick It is best to call at the *beginning* of a serious illness or when surgery is first scheduled.
- Funerals Upon the death of a loved one, please call the Parish Office to make arrangements, 851-1874.

THE GIFT OF GOD'S WORD

On this day of gifts and gift-giving, it seems appropriate that we take a moment to reflect on the great gift of God's Word. Because it is creative, God's Word always points to its author, always calls us to respond. Because it is powerful, God's Word can link the sublime with the ridiculous, the transcendent with the immanent, the divine with the human. Because it is graceful, God's Word establishes a relationship of deep intimacy between us and God.

At the heart of God's Word lies a tantalizing tension between the mysterious and the mundane. In our liturgical celebration, this unresolved tension both reveals the meaning of life for us and calls us to respond, to act upon that meaning.

Once accepted and opened, the gift of God's Word is a gift that keeps on giving and keeps on calling us to give in return. It dares us to be like the gift-giver and to become gifts for others, not only at Christmas, but at every moment of life.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

An old joke asks, "What time is Midnight Mass?" The answer is not really obvious, since Christmas is unique in having several distinct celebrations. The readings and prayers vary greatly from hour to hour. The Vigil Mass hinges on the family heritage of Jesus and his origins. The concept of "midnight" predates clock time, and really has to do with a celebration in the hours of darkness. Years ago, it was not possible to receive Communion without fasting for a full day, so the late hour of this Mass made it possible for the people to receive. The first Mass after sunrise, the Mass at Dawn, was once known as "The Shepherds' Mass," and later Masses set aside stories of Jesus' birth to focus on the key to the day's celebration: John the Evangelist's majestic theology of Christ's identity as the Word made flesh, dwelling among us. One feast, four separate Masses. Only monasteries manage the whole round. Parishioners typically take just one entry point into the mystery. Yet there is much to savor and celebrate in the coming of Christ into the world. Christmas is not a day, but a season. It is Christmas! Our Gospel reading on this festive holy day is the opening words of the Gospel of John. St. John says, "The true light, which

enlightens everyone, was coming into the world. He was in the world, and the world came to be through him." That is why we celebrate today. Pope Francis opened his sermon on Christmas day last year by saying this: "Christmas is joy, religious joy, an inner joy of light and peace."

At Mass on Christmas Eve we hear, "I proclaim to you good news of great joy; today a Savior is born for us, Christ the Lord." It is this joy we need to feel, this joy we need to carry to others. Many have expressed the joy of today. Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI said this about Christmas: "Joy is the true gift of Christmas. We can communicate this joy simply: with a smile, a kind gesture, a little help, forgiveness. And the joy we give will certainly come back to us... TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

By now, the first Christmas carols are heard in the home, but usually not yet in church. What is a "carol" anyway? Originally, a carol was any kind of communal song sung at a festival such as a harvest. By the thirteenth century or so, carols were associated with household celebrations. "Carol" comes from the Old French carula, meaning a circular dance. Carols weren't for church, since the language of liturgy was Latin and the carols were in the common language. Their characteristic sound comes from medieval chord patterns, and they often have strong refrains for everyone to sing. Even in the churches of the Reformation, carols didn't make it into church services until the 1870s or so, since there was a preference for psalms. Anglicans resisted popular carols; most of our beloved carols came via the Methodists, an offshoot of the Church of England. The Catholic Church generally didn't admit carols to liturgy either, but we didn't make laws against them.

We are told that the beloved carol "Silent Night" comes from Catholic Austria and a harried parish music director. Joseph Mohr, the priest of St. Nicholas in Oberndorf, had written the words in 1816, but offered them to his music director, Franz Gruber, when the church's organ broke. Mohr asked him to write a melody that could be played on guitar as a prelude to Mass. Gruber finished the tune just hours before midnight Mass in 1818. The people were shocked to hear a guitar in church, but were charmed by the sweet lullaby. The church was swept away by a flood in the 1990s and the village later relocated, but the townspeople have set up the "Silent Night Memorial Chapel" at the site. Today the carol is in print in some three hundred languages. How wonderful that the pipe organ broke on that night!





ISSUES OF PEACE & JUSTICE

The gospel today speaks of Emmanuel, God among us, and St. Paul reminds us that we have received the grace of apostleship to the Christ who is God among

What does this mean in today's world? "Thanks to increased opportunities for many kinds of social contact among nations, a human family is gradually recognizing that it comprises a single world community and is making itself so... What is the meaning and value of this feverish activity? How should all these things be used? To the achievement of what goal are the strivings of individuals and societies heading? ... [Mankind has a mandate] to govern the world with justice and holiness... The greater man's power becomes, the farther his individual and community responsibility extends... The norm of human activity is this: that in accord with the divine plan and will, it harmonize with the genuine good of the human race, and that it allow mankind as individuals and as members of society to pursue their total vocation and fulfill it... Sacred Scripture teaches the human family what the experience of the ages confirms: that while human progress is a great advantage to man, it brings with it a strong temptation. For when the order of values is jumbled and bad is mixed with the good, individuals and groups pay heed solely to their own interests, and not to those of others. Thus it happens that the world ceases to be a place of true brotherhood. In our own day, the magnified power of humanity threatens to destroy the race itself... All human activity, constantly imperiled by man's pride and deranged self-love, must be purified and perfected by the power of Christ's cross and resurrection. For redeemed by Christ and made a new creature in the Holy Spirit, man is able to love the things themselves created by God, and ought to do so... For God's Word, through Whom all things were made, was Himself made flesh and dwelt on the earth of men. Thus He entered the world's history as a perfect man, taking that history up into Himself and summarizing it. He Himself revealed to us that 'God is love' and at the same time taught us that the new command of love was the basic law of human perfection and hence of to worlds transformation. (Gaudium et spes, #33, #34, #35, #36, #37, #38).

Find Your Catholic Voice Skeptical Now, Skeptical Then.

The theory that the disciples stole the body and claimed Jesus had risen assumes that the disciples expected their fellow Jews to be open to the belief that an individual could be raised

from the dead. Yet the people of that time considered a bodily resurrection to be impossible just as the people of our own time. It is hard to imagine, without fully grasping the cultural environment of the time, just how bizarre and unbelievable the Resurrection would have seemed to the people of the time. To us it is an almost too familiar story. To them it was unheard of and far more unimaginable. Jesus' miracles of bringing people back to life were attention raising events. Events that others could conceivably explain away. However, Christ's death on the cross was unassailable evidence of his being categorically dead.

It is absurd to think that only relatively recently did people

discover - through the benefit of science - that dead people don't rise. And that people "back then" were unenlightened and gullible; that they were naturally inclined to believe in all sorts of absurd miracles. That is simply false.

A charming quote by C. S. Lewis relates to this. In discussing the virginal conception of Jesus Lewis states that the reason Joseph was worried about Mary's pregnancy was not because he was ignorant and didn't know where babies come from, but because he did.

It's the same with the resurrection of Jesus. People in the ancient world were incredulous when faced with the Christian claim, because they knew empirically that when people die they stay dead. In Christ, Ken.
