Your second step is to contact Tessie in the office, 851-1874, to schedule and get a baptism packet. Be sure you provide all the necessary documents 10 days prior to the baptism class. Baptism class is the 2nd Thursday of every month at 6 PM. Reservations are needed for the class. At least one godparent must be a practicing Catholic. All baptisms are celebrated on the 1st, 2nd, 3rd, & 4th Sunday of each month at 12 noon, after the 10:30 Mass. No baptisms during Lent.
- Matrimony At least one party must be a registered, practicing member of St. Rose with at least 6 months active proven attendance at Mass. After this is accomplished, please call Jane Lucero to make an appointment to begin your 6 month marriage preparation process. Please make no arrangements until after this appointment. You may pick up a marriage packet in the parish office. Engaged Encounter weekend is required: www.renoee.org for dates, times and registration.
- Anointing of the Sick It is best to call at the *beginning* of a serious illness or when surgery is first scheduled.

Too often we fail to recognize the fact that the star of Bethlehem comes to rest in our everyday lives, where we can experience God's presence, manifested in ever new ways. TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

This year, in the United States the celebration of the Epiphany falls on January 8, but the traditional date for the Epiphany is January 6. The date we know as January 6 was established as the solstice in Egypt in 1996 BC, but the Egyptian calendar lost a full day every 128 years. Twenty centuries later the actual solstice had migrated to December 25. People still kept January 6 for the solstice celebration, but December 25, matching nicely with the Roman pagan feast of the Unconquered Sun, launched an extended solstice holiday. By the time of the early church, the whole period of twelve days was celebrated just about everywhere.

Christians began to celebrate Christ as the true light of the world in four themes: the Nativity, the manifestation to the Gentiles, the baptism of the Lord, and the wedding feast at Cana. That was entirely too much for one day to handle. A twelve-day season was ready to be adapted, so Christians borrowed from the pagan calendar for their own season of light. Thus early Christian celebrations of the Christmas season extended from one date for the solstice, December 25, to the older date, January 6. The darkest time in the Northern Hemisphere could now be filled with the Christian observance of the arrival of the Light of the World. —Rev. James Field, Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.



EPIPHANY

Solemn things of mystic meaning: Incense doth the God disclose; Gold a royal Child proclaimeth; Myrrh a future tomb foreshows.

STEWARDSHIP REFLECTION

Today the Church celebrates the Solemnity of the Epiphany. The word "epiphany" comes from the Greek *epiphainen*, a verb that means "to shine upon," "to manifest," or "to make known." What the Church celebrates today is the

manifestation of our Lord Jesus Christ to the whole world; after being made known to the shepherds of Bethlehem, He is revealed to the Magi who have come from the East to adore Him.

The Epiphany should be and is a great Feast for us. The joy we felt at the birth of Christ on Christmas must be renewed today (and every day for that matter). In a sense this is a second Christmas Day as it puts the Lord in a new light. This day manifests the divinity of Jesus. At Christmas it was a few shepherds who were invited by the Angels to go and witness and recognize the Lord. However, today, at the Epiphany, the voice of God calls the whole world, each and every one of us, to adore Jesus, and to hear Him. The Epiphany or the realization of the divinity and saving grace of the Lord should lead us as individuals to a personal epiphany. In a sense an epiphany is representative of conversion, conversion to the truth.

If we accept Christ as our Savior and if we truly strive to live our lives as His disciple, we begin to pursue lives of stewardship, lives of love and service. Today of all days should help us in that realization and in that goal.

NOTICE ABOUT CHANGES ON FIRST FRIDAYS

Dear Companions,

For almost ten years we have had First Friday Mass which included both the Anointing of the Sick and Exposition and Benediction. I am going to make some changes in that there are too many repeat anointings each month and too little participation in the Benediction service.

The Anointing of the Sick is a Sacrament, belonging to the advanced in age, the seriously ill, and those facing surgery. The sacrament is to be celebrated ONCE for the same illness or difficulty and should not be repeated according to our Catholic instruction about that sacrament. I will no longer be anointing people at every First Friday Mass. I will schedule it on a three-month basis for that mass beginning with the March First Friday mass. (I always have asked folks who have received that anointing to contact the front office so we can record it but it is rarely done).

Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament at the end of Mass means the Closing Prayer is the last act of the Mass before the Benediction. That means there is no final blessing or dismissal at the mass as usual. The Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament is the final conclusive action of the mass on that occasion. It seems that very few are willing to stay for Adoration time and for the Benediction service at ten o'clock. I always find it awkward to try to initiate singing, serve the Rite, have an Altar Server available, and then have no one willing to intone the music for the service.

Therefore, Exposition and Benediction at First Friday mass will be celebrated ONLY in June and in December on those First Fridays.





ISSUES OF PEACE & JUSTICE

World Day of Peace Message. Quoting Blessed Pope Paul VI who delivered the 1st such message, Jesus and Scripture, Saint John Paul II, Pope Benedict XVI, Saint Mother Teresa of Calcutta, Therese of Lisieux, and St. Francis of Assisi, Pope Francis not only wishes Peace "to every man, woman and child" in the world, but also calls on all to "make active nonviolence our way of life." He exhorts us still further to make active nonviolence our style of "politics for peace." If we look closely at history and closely at the example of Jesus in his dealings with violence, we can join in Pope Francis' rhetorical question, "Can violence achieve any goal of last value?"

We are followers of Christ, and the message of Christ "offers a radically positive approach" to the sometimes overwhelming violence of our world, violence that stems "from within, from the human heart." "Jesus marked out the path of nonviolence. He walked that path to the very end, to the cross, whereby he became our peace and put an end to hostility. Whoever accepts the Good News of Jesus is able to acknowledge the violence within and be healed by God's mercy, becoming in turn an instrument of reconciliation. In the words of Saint Francis of Assisi: 'As you announce peace with your mouth, make sure that you have greater peace in your hearts.' To be true followers of Jesus today also includes embracing his teaching about nonviolence."

"For Christians, nonviolence is not merely tactical behavior but a person's way of being, the attitude of one who is so convinced of God's love and power that he or she is not afraid to tackle evil with the weapons of love and truth alone. Love of one's enemy constitutes the nucleus of the 'Christian revolution.' The Gospel command to love your enemies 'is rightly considered the magna carta of Christian nonviolence. It does not consist in succumbing to evil, but in responding to evil with good, and thereby breaking the chain of injustice." (Fiftieth World Day of Peace Message, January 1, 2017, #1, #2, #3).

Find Your Catholic Voice Its About Timing.

The Christian view of resurrection is unprecedented in history, and sprang up full-blown immediately after the death of Jesus. There was no development of

thought here. It was not merely a subtle new twist that evolved out of any thinking prevalent at the time. And although early Christians disagreed about a good many things, nonetheless, they are remarkably unanimous in their view of how resurrection plays out and how it works.

The early Christians did not invent the empty tomb and the meetings or sightings of the risen Jesus. Jews did not believe in divine men or individual resurrections. Nobody was expecting this kind of thing; no kind of conversion experience would have invented it, no matter how many hours they pored over the scriptures. To suggest otherwise is to stop examining history and enter into a fantasy world.

Judaism had developed a specific theology about resurrection: that God's people would be raised bodily from the dead at the end of time. For example, you have Martha telling Jesus: "I know he will rise, in the resurrection on the last day." The time element is very important.

Today we generally use the word resurrection to mean a "life after death," which it never did in the ancient world. At the time "resurrection" was a very specific term for life after life after death. In other words, first you die, you are dead for some period of time - not bodily alive, and then you are subsequently "resurrected," which means you begin a new bodily life, a new life after whatever "life after death" may consist of.
