A WORD FROM THE PASTOR:

Important Information about Mass Intentions

Some parishioners have been coming to the rectory to request Masses for their loved ones or for special requests only to discover that all of the Masses on the day they were seeking already had intentions. This is one reason that it is important to come to the rectory as early as possible to request Masses. In fact, although there are some Masses still available for 2016, we are already taking Mass requests for 2017. Therefore, this is a good time to discuss the topic of Mass Intentions and clarify some misconceptions about them.

The Holy Eucharist is the source and summit of our interior life, and, is indeed, the very life of the Catholic Church. Every time Mass is celebrated, the sacrifice of Our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ on Calvary is represented in an unbloody manner, affording the priest celebrant and all congregants who participate in the Mass an infinite amount of sanctifying grace. That grace can be applied to specific intentions, whether of the priest celebrant or the faithful.

Whenever a priest celebrates Mass, he has at least two intentions. The first intention is to celebrate the Mass according to what the Church does. The second is to apply the grace of that Mass towards a specific need, whether it be a person(s), living or dead, baptized or not, or a special need. In addition, every parish pastor is required, by Canon Law, to offer at least one Mass on Sunday for the needs and intentions of his parishioners (Can. 534 §1).

As to the first intention, many priests pray this traditional prayer, or one similar to it, while vesting: "My purpose is to celebrate Mass and to make present the body and blood of our Lord Jesus Christ according to the rite of the holy Roman Catholic Church to the praise of our all-powerful God and all his assembly in the glory of heaven, for my good and the good of all his pilgrim Church on earth, and for all who have asked me to pray for them in general and in particular, and for the good of the holy Roman Church. May the almighty and merciful Lord grant us joy and peace, amendment of life, room for true repentance, the grace and comfort of the Holy Spirit, and perseverance in good works".

As to the second intention, commonly called "the intention of the Mass" and most likely what everyone most wants to know about, that intention is usually announced first in the Church bulletin and then out loud at Mass. Often the Mass intention is requested by a parishioner for the repose of the soul of a loved one. When a parishioner requests that a Mass be offered for a specific intention, and the priest agrees to celebrate the Mass for that intention, then the priest has a most serious obligation to offer the Mass for that intention. It is a good and pious custom for the faithful here at St. Helena to make an offering, usually about ten dollars, to the priest who celebrates the Mass.

Historically, the purpose of offering a Mass stipend for a particular Mass intention has been twofold. On the one hand, the money that a priest received for saying his daily Mass for a specific intention was essentially his source of income, and today in some poorer mission countries it sometimes still is. Thus, the faithful are contributing to the good of the Church because they share in the Church's concern for the support of its ministers. At the same time, by giving a stipend, the person requesting that a Mass be celebrated makes a sacrificial offering of his own. The stipend DOES NOT BUY A MASS! Masses and graces are not for sale. Rather, the giving of a stipend is a gesture of solicitude to the priest for his upkeep.

In case you are wondering, no priest can get rich on Mass offerings since he is limited to celebrating one Mass on weekdays, and two on Sundays, although in special circumstances he could celebrate two Masses on weekdays (that's called bination) and three on Sundays (trination), but the priest, himself, can only keep one Mass stipend each day.

It often happens that the parish receives more requested intentions than Masses are available. In that case, the Congregation for the Clergy has stated that a pastor can 'bundle' a bunch of intentions once or twice a week and load those separate intentions onto one Mass as a single intention so long as the person requesting the Mass knows that their Mass Intention now includes more than what was originally requested and has agreed to it. In that case, no one loses out because there is an infinite amount of grace available at each and every Mass. (cf. Decree Mos jugiter obtinuit from the Congregation for the Clergy, 1991)

It is also important to note that a priest will frequently say Mass both for the INTENTION for which a stipend has been given and simultaneously for other REQUESTS or NEEDS as well. He may, for example, celebrate a regularly scheduled parish Mass for which some parishioner has provided an intention (and a stipend), but at the same time he may perhaps have in mind certain sick or deceased persons or a special need that had arisen, such as praying for vocations or some flood victims or people involved in recent acts of violence. In fact, he may remember as many requests or needs as he likes while offering a Mass, so long as he has accepted a stipend for no more than one intention. Sometimes a person asking that the priest remember a particular request or need during a Mass may make a DONATION TO THE CHURCH, but they cannot give a stipend to the priest. While on the surface this may seem illogical, keep in mind that the spiritual value of a single Mass IS INFINITE. The intention for which a stipend was offered is not somehow getting shortchanged if the celebrant remembers or mentions in that same Mass other needs or requests as well. Most of these other needs and requests are usually mentioned in the Prayer of the Faithful, while the Intention of the Mass is usually stated at the beginning of the Mass.

Here at St. Helena the stipended Mass Intention is printed in bold in the bulletin and is mentioned both at the beginning of the Mass and in the Prayer of the Faithful and sometimes during the Eucharistic Prayer, while a special Mass request is sometimes printed in regular type in the bulletin and is mentioned during the Prayer of the Faithful.

It is good that so many parishioners here at St. Helena's have been requesting that Masses be celebrated for particular needs and intentions, especially during the holiday seasons, and we seek to honor as many requests as we can. I hope that this clarifies things, and please know that all of you are remembered in our prayers and Masses. God Bless.

The Feast of the Holy Family A Celebration Courtesy of Canada

The Feast of the Holy Family celebrates both the human family unit and the Divine family unit: Jesus, his mother the Virgin Mary, and his foster father Joseph. The feast is not a solemnity and is usually celebrated on the Sunday after Christmas. If Christmas is a Sunday, then the feast is celebrated on December 30th.

We know very little about the life of the Holy Family through the canonical Gospels. They speak of the early

years of the Holy Family, including the birth of Jesus in Bethlehem, the flight into Egypt, and the finding of Jesus in the temple. Various non-canonical works, including the *Infancy Gospel of Thomas*, try to fill in the blanks. While the exact details of the day-to-day life of the Holy Family may be unknown, we can still learn a lot from the stories we do have.



Devotion to the Holy Family is a rather recent development, but one that naturally grows out of a love for Jesus and his family. In 1643, Louis and Barbe d'Ailleboust came to Canada in order to devote their lives to the welfare of the natives there. After her husband had passed away, Barbe, with the assistance of the Jesuit Father Chaumonot, founded the Confraternity of the Holy Family. The confraternity and devotion to the Holy Family spread all over Canada and had the effect of promoting good morals. Monsignor François de Laval invited her to Quebec and gave her the general management of the confraternity, which still exists today. In 1675, the now Bishop de Laval had a little book printed in Paris instructing the members of the confraternity as to virtuous practices. Bishop de Laval also established the feast of the Holy Family and had a mass and office drawn up. Devotion to the Holy Family grew in popularity in the 17th century, and several religious congregations were founded under this title. The Holy Family also became portrayed in popular art of the period.

Popes Benedict XV and Leo XIII promoted the feast as a way to counter the breakdown of the family unit. Finally, on October 26, 1921, the Congregation of Rites (under Pope Benedict XV) inserted the Feast of the Holy Family into the Latin Rite general calendar as a way to counteract the breakdown of the family.

The Feast of the Holy Family is not just about the Holy Family, but about our own families too. The main purpose of the Feast is to present the Holy Family as the model for all Christian families, and for domestic life in general. Our family life becomes sanctified when we live the life of the Church within our homes. This is called the "domestic church" or the "church in miniature." St. John Chrysostom urged all Christians to make each home a "family church," and in doing so, we sanctify the family unit. Just how does one live out the Church in the family? The best way is by making Christ the center of family and individual life. Ways to do this include: reading scripture regularly, praying daily, attending Mass at least on Sundays and Holy Days of Obligation, imitating the actions of the Holy Family, going to confession frequently, and so forth, all done together as a family unit.

In addition to cultivating positive actions, the Church understands that various actions and behaviors are contrary to God's Divine plan for the family. These include abortion, contraception, embryonic stem-cell research, divorce, spousal abuse and child abuse, among other things. Catholic Teaching is that a marriage must be open to children. Anything artificial that prevents this is contrary to divine law, although spacing births for a just reason is permitted (and may be accomplished through "natural family planning").

Also, poverty, lack of health care, rights violations, government intrusion in the life of communities and families, and other justice concerns must be addressed by faithful Christians because of the negative effect these conditions have on the family unit. St. Paul gives us some advice on family life in Colossians 3:12-21: "Put on then, as God's chosen ones, holy and beloved, compassion, kindness, lowliness, meekness, and patience, forbearing one another and, if one has a complaint against another, forgiving each other; as the Lord has forgiven you, so you also must forgive. And above all these put on love, which binds everything together in perfect harmony."

Thus, the Feast of the Holy Family is a good time to remember the family unit and pray for our human and spiritual families. We also may take time to reflect on the value and sanctity of the family unit, and to evaluate our own family life. What ways may it be improved? What would Jesus, Mary, and Joseph do? Finally, we can use this feast to ask ourselves what are we doing to promote the family within our own cultures, and communities.

The Feast of the Holy Innocents December 28

Herod "the Great," the Roman-appointed king of Judea, was an Idumean Jew who was unpopular with his people because of his connections with the Romans and his religious indifference. Hence, he was insecure and fearful of any threat to his throne. He was a master politician and a tyrant capable of extreme brutality. He killed his wife, three of his sons, his brother, and his sister's two husbands, to name only a few.

The massacre of the Holy Innocents is found only in Matthew's Gospel, and its historicity has not yet been independently verified. Matthew 2:1-18 tells this story: Herod was "greatly troubled" when astrologers from the east came asking the whereabouts of "the newborn king of the Jews," whose star they had seen. They were told that the Jewish Scriptures named Bethlehem as the place where the Messiah would be born. Herod cunningly told them to report back to him so that he could also "pay him homage." They found Jesus, offered him their gifts and, when warned by an angel, avoided Herod on their way home. Jesus and His family escaped to Egypt at the command of an Angel.

Herod became furious and "ordered the massacre of all the boys in Bethlehem and its vicinity two years old and under." The horror of the massacre and the devastation of the mothers and fathers led Matthew to quote Jeremiah: "A voice was heard in Ramah, sobbing and loud lamentation; Rachel weeping for her children..." (Matthew 2:18). Rachel was the wife of Jacob/Israel. She is pictured as weeping at the place where the Israelites were herded together by the conquering Assyrians for their march into captivity. Rachel was buried in the town of Ephrathah.

The first non-Christian reference to the massacre is recorded four centuries later by Macrobius (c. 395-423), who writes in his *Saturnalia*: "When he [emperor Augustus] heard that among the boys in Syria under two years old whom Herod, king of the Jews, had ordered killed, his own son was also killed, he said: it is better to be Herod's pig, than his son."

The exact number of infants killed is not stated, but based on Bethlehem's estimated population of about 1,000 people at the time, the number killed may have been around twenty, and although they were all Jewish, the Catholic Church still considers them to be martyrs for Christianity.

- PREMIUM HEALTH ASSISTANCE-If you or your children live or work in New York or New Jersey and are eligible for Medicaid or the Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP) and you're eligible for health coverage from your employer, your state may have a premium health program that can pay for coverage, using funds from their Medicaid or CHIP programs. If you or your dependents are NOT currently enrolled in Medicaid or CHIP, and you think you or any of your dependents might be eligible for either of these programs, dial 1-877-KIDS NOW or go to www.insurekidsnow.gov to find out how to apply. You must request coverage within 60 days of being determined eligible for premium assistance. The annual Open Enrollment will run from November 20-December 18, 2015.
- WE ARE HERE TO HELP-Do you need assistance from health and social service professionals? ARCH CARE is sponsored by the Archdiocese of New York. It answers

questions and assists with: housing for seniors and disabled persons, legal issues, support groups for caregivers, dementia care, transportation options, volunteer opportunities, etc. Call **855-951- CARE**. The line is open 7 ARCHCARE at days a week from 8 am until 8 pm, or go to www.archcare.org/community-resources. This service is offered by Catholic Charities.

BUEN DIA, HERMANOS:


HOY ha nacido el Salvador. Repetidamente en estas fiestas de

Navidad hemos escuchado la palabra "hov": "vo te he engendrado hoy", "hoy, desde el cielo, ha descendido la paz sobre nosotros", "has iluminado esta noche santa con el nacimiento de Cristo", "hoy nos ha nacido un Salvador", "hoy brillará una luz sobre nosotros", "hoy una gran luz ha llegado a la tierra", "hoy nos ha nacido el Salvador". Lo mismo pasará en la Epifanía: "hoy se nos ha manifestado", "hoy la estrella condujo a los magos". Este "hoy" quiere significar que lo que celebramos en Navidad no es un aniversario, sino un "sacramento", o sea, una actualización del hecho salvífico del nacimiento humano del Hijo de Dios. En esta fiesta Dios nos comunica la gracia de un "nuevo nacimiento" como hijos en la familia de Dios. En la Navidad se une en totalidad el "ayer" de Belén, el "mañana" de la última venida del Señor y el "hoy" de la celebración de este año, que es un acontecimiento siempre nuevo, no sólo recordado afectivamente. Este es un maravilloso intercambio porque no es solamente recordar hechos que sucedieron siglos atrás, en algún punto de la historia, o pensar en promesas que algún día llegarán. Es ser conscientes de la existencia de una historia de salvación en donde el Señor ha venido actuando en medio de su pueblo en absoluta fidelidad, a pesar de la infidelidad del pueblo objeto de su amor. Esa fidelidad, demostrada a través de la historia, nos permite 'creer' que, efectivamente, las promesas que aún falta por cumplirse se cumplirán y todo lo anterior es lo que da al creyente la capacidad de levantarse en medio de los retos y dificultades para celebrar día a día el misterio de la vida y caminar, con una esperanza basada en la roca, que es Jesucristo, hacia la Tierra Prometida.

Ya el profeta Isaías nos dice que "el pueblo que caminaba entre tinieblas vió una luz grande". Es que Dios nunca abandona a los suyos, pero ciertamente el discípulo está llamado a hacer su parte, o sea, a vivir de acuerdo a una propuesta que se nos hace para recorrer el camino de santidad que Dios tiene para el creyente. Y para vivir esa experiencia tenemos el período de tiempo que llamamos vida. Ya hemos recibido el regalo más grande del amor y de la misericordia del Padre, la encarnación de su hijo. El crevente espera con alegría y confianza el final de los tiempos, aguardando la aparición gloriosa del gran Dios y Salvador, Jesucristo. En ese tiempo intermedio, teniendo la garantía del triunfo final, debemos llevar una vida sobria, honrada, religiosa. Estamos invitados permanentemente a alinear nuestra voluntad a la Voluntad de Dios, para de esa manera apreciar los valores que son temporales y los que son eternos. Como nos recuerda San Pablo, "todo lo que se ve es temporal y lo que no se ve es eterno". Viviendo en el mundo estamos invitados a no apegarnos a las cosas del mundo, a no querer vivir según lo estándares del mundo, sino a vivir con la sabiduría del que descubre el verdadero tesoro, el tesoro del amor y de la eternidad que Cristo nos vino a anunciar. El tesoro es Jesucristo y quien descubre ese tesoro ya no lo quiere perder, lo que desea es crecer cada día más en él, porque sólo allí 'su corazón encuentra descanso', como nos enseña San Agustín.

¿Y cómo vivimos este misterio de Dios en lo concreto del día a día? Aguí es donde entra en juego el Jubileo de la Misericordia que el Papa Francisco ha propuesto a la Iglesia durante el presente año. Mirar y reflexionar sobre la historia de salvación es apreciar la misericordia de Dios en acción y el papa está convencido de que "el descubrimiento de la misericordia de Dios es la esencia del Evangelio". La misericordia experimentada y compartida es la respuesta, nos dice el papa, a una humanidad quebrada por el dolor, por la guerra, por la incredulidad y la falta de fe. La humanidad demanda sentido y propuestas que la hagan capaz de superar los momentos de crisis en que se ve envuelta. Y la respuesta que el evangelio nos ofrece es la misericordia. Pidamos a Dios que nos ilumine durante este tiempo de nacimiento, para que nuestros corazones ardan en deseo de descubrir, de reflexionar y de practicar el arte divino de la misericordia, que Dios hace vivo, cada día, en nuestras propias vidas.
