Week of Christian Unity Prayer Service Tuesday, 25 January | following the 5:15PM Mass at the Chapel of the Sacred Hearts

“There is one Lord, one faith, one baptism...” so the 4th chapter of the letter to the Ephesians proclaims. Each year in January, the Church marks a week of Christian unity to note, sadly, that Christians remain divided into different religious groups, and more importantly to raise up the need and call to work for greater unity among all Christians. In many ways, over the past 50 years we have made progress in recognizing what is shared among Christians of different religions. At the same time, today, we seem to place less emphasis on “ecumenism” – the call for greater Christian unity. Even more painfully, we must admit among some Christians, there remains an antagonistic attitude toward those of other Christian religions. Note that this Sunday one of our intercessions at Mass prays for greater ecumenical progress. On Tuesday evening, January 25, the last day of the Week of Christian Unity, immediately after the 5:15PM Mass at the Chapel of Sacred Hearts we will hold a short prayer service.

Vigil Lamp

Vigil Lamps burn for 8 days and nights, symbolizing the presence of Christ and marking the boundaries of holy space in the Church. We accept memorials for deceased loved ones and special lamps in the sanctuary, at the altars of Our Lady, St. Joseph, St. Jude, and the Sacred Heart of Jesus at Our Saviour and in the sanctuary at Sacred Hearts. Splintered Pew Repair Update – Appreciation

Gratitude to the 5 parishioners who already said they will help and contribute to the repair costs. We still need some additional contributors. Can you help? We need to repair 8 splintered pews at the Church of Our Saviour. **Are you able to help?** The total cost is \$ 8, 800 or \$ 1100 per pew. We will place a small-inscribed plaque on the pew to recognize the donation.

Music Notes

At the Preparation of the Gifts, we sing English hymn writer Bernadette Farrell's *Your Words are Spirit and Life*, a poetic paraphrase of Psalm 19, appointed for today. The organ postlude is by lesser-known, French composer Gabriel Pierné (1863-1937) who conducted the first performance of Stravinsky's *Firebird* at the *Ballet Russes* in Paris.

Throughout these next few weeks of Ordinary Time, we sing the *Sanctus* from Lena McLin's *Eucharist of the Soul*. Originally written for an historically Black parish in Chicago, this setting of the mass has become a favorite among Black congregations. I'm excited to introduce it here at Our Saviour & Sacred Hearts, and I hope you'll enjoy singing it as much as I do.
