Thousands Seeking Protection in the United States from Violence and Persecution



Several parishioners have mentioned seeing interviews and other coverage of the work Catholic Charities is doing with the thousands of Venezuelan asylum seekers who have arrived in New York in the past two months. Of the approximately 6,000 who have arrived, Catholic Charities has received almost 2,000 at our offices. Most are fleeing violence and oppression in their own country and travelled over 3,000 miles on treacherous journeys through Colombia and Central America to seek protection in the United States. Most arrive with very little. If you might want to help you can follow this QR code to the "Amazon wish list" site and purchase items to help out a family with some basics. Concerts at Our Saviour

On Friday, 28 October at 6PM, please join us for our first Celebrity Organ Recital as part of a new initiative at our parish, **Concerts at Our Saviour**. Named one of '20 under 30' promising artists by *The Diapason*, organist **Janet Yieh** has performed throughout the United States and across the globe, including Alice Tully Hall, Carnegie Hall, The Kennedy Center, San Francisco's Grace Cathedral, and across Asia in Taipei, Hong Kong, Japan, and Malaysia.

Yieh will perform a thrilling program of works by women composers, a demographic woefully neglected in most classical music programming. In 2020, Yieh co-founded the platform 'Amplify Female Composers' with Carolyn Craig, and she contributes research to an international sacred music database called "A Great Host of Women Composers". She serves as Director of Music at Church of the Heavenly Rest on the UES where she oversees a vibrant music program for all ages, and plays the 138-rank Austin organ. For seven years, she served as Associate Organist at Trinity Church, Wall Street, where she founded the St. Paul's Chapel Choir and accompanied the Grammy-nominated Trinity Choir.

APPEAL FOR HAITI

Dear friends,

The month of October is also considered "Mission Month", and I humbly ask you to consider helping the missionary effort of Fr. Rick Frechette C. P. in Haiti. Fr. Rick is a Passionist missionary and physician who lives in Haiti since 1987 and is the founder of "The St Luke Foundation for Haiti". I worked by his side for 8 years.

I recognize that many people live with heaviness from pandemics, public shootings, global warming, wars, nuclear arms proliferation, hostile nationalism, fragile world economies, and other threats to existence. We struggle to imagine a hopeful future, and this also generates anxiety about what the future holds for our children and grandchildren. They deserve a better world than the one we are giving them.

I know that news of Haiti is rare - when you hear anything it is, unfortunately, about natural disasters or political and economic crises. As someone indebted toward the Haitian people for opening my heart and helping me recognize the Crucified Lord in our midst, I feel the need to make an appeal to you.

The situation in Haiti continues to unravel at a cruel and unrelenting pace with gangs widespread over the country. The country is in total free fall with the government totally absent. The atrocities are unbelievable, the tragedies are heartbreaking, and the destruction is massive. Literally, everything is falling apart.

The lack of fuel is forcing hospitals, banks, schools, and all kinds of businesses to limit their operations. The Catholic church was especially targeted in Gonaives. Its long list includes schools, churches, homes for the disabled, food for the poor, Caritas, and the Catholic radio station.

As if the country doesn't have enough plagues, the Haitian government made a public announcement regarding an outbreak of cholera. It is not surprising with no garbage pickups or clean water because of no fuel and the constant flooding and clogged canals in the slums.

All of this can be overwhelming, and the temptation to give up on such desperate situations is always at the door. The people have learned to count on us for every hardship for more than three decades, and we have always stepped up to the plate. How can we let them down now? Aren't we supposed to be beacons of Hope? Where is hope needed if not where there is despair?

Allow me to quote Fr. Rick Frechette's words in an email to his staff:

Never has it been more important to focus on the individual and vulnerable person in front of us, in need and anguish.

Never has it been more important to believe that by saving even one person, we save the world.

Never has it been more important to do even the smallest thing in the most correct way, with great care and dignity.

My dear sisters and brothers, please consider helping Fr. Rick and his staff to continue their mission of Hope through our prayers and generosity. A second collection will be taken up next weekend on **October 15th & 16th**.


