### **Parish Priest Message**

Dear Brothers and Sisters in the Risen Christ,

Peace and joy to you in the Risen Lord!
Referring to Covid—19, Many people are questioning, when will all this end?
When will we go back to *normal*?

The answer might be that we won't and we really can't. This tough time and historical moment which we go



through at present will change us in ways we can't control or even predict. How we act now, can and will shape and even determine who "we" will be when this current pandemic crisis begins to pass.

This is the time to learn about our ways, attitudes, and relationships. To make new all that is wrong, evil, and unjustifiable. This newness would prompt a resurrection in our hearts, minds, and life, reminding us that we will not go back to "normal". In a Post-COVID world, we must come together to choose decisions and actions that make things "new."

**Easter** was never meant to go back to normal; but was, and still is, intended **to make all things new**. It means the proclamation of release over suffering, hope over despair, and life over death.

We celebrated Holy Week in a truly unusual way. We heard **Crucified Christ on the cross on Good Friday** with outstretched hands saying to a world of coronavirus suffering, "I am with you in your suffering."

On Easter we saw in the Risen Jesus, life conquered death. This Paschal faith nourishes our hope. It is the hope of a better time, in which we can be better, finally freed from evil and from this pandemic. It is a hope, which does not disappoint, rather instills in us newness for a new life in Christ.

The celebration of the Resurrection in this **Easter season** might say to us in this COVID-19 moment, "I can, and we can make these things that have been revealed — new". Two women rushed early that morning to the tomb and came back from the graveyard with the happy news that everything can be different now. The two Apostles ran wide-eyed into the empty tomb and ran out with joy and courage in their hearts. Two disciples walking in utter despair bumped into a stranger and as they realized it was Risen Christ, hope instilled again. The Easter Movement is with the message that all things are and can be made new.

During past few days as I spoke to several people about their Holy Week and Easter experiences, they were quite positive about the opportunity to participate in the live streamed Masses. Due to easy access to the internet, most people, including religious communities, relied on the Masses live-streamed on YouTube or television.

If we reflect this experience, it places us in a position to rely on the promise of Jesus - "Where two or three are gathered in my name, there am I with them" (Mt 18:20). Every family or small community that came together to celebrate Paschal mystery or for family prayer called out to Him in faith, had the privileged experience of the Lord's presence in their midst. It was a unique way of experiencing the Paschal Mystery of Christ. This proved that the presence of the Lord is not confined within the premises of a church building. All through these days, we experienced that He makes Himself present to the faithful who seek Him anywhere.

Thus, as we continue to experience the coronavirus pandemic, we must rely ever more on our faith to guide us. We reflect on God's word and prayer to help us navigate in these uncertain times. We need much hope and guidance these days.

Our response to the coronavirus pandemic reveals who we truly are. I mean our response demonstrates who we are, what we believe and what kind of society we are becoming. As it is said, bad or dreadful times reveal our true values, priorities, and character as individuals and as a society. It can also deepen our faith as we may reflect on this line about Easter:

First, it is through the eyes of our faith that we can see reality as it is: God's faithfulness to his people. We may not be faithful, but He is always faithful to protect and guard us.

Second, it is our faith in the Risen Jesus that illuminates our path in these times of darkness and uncertainty. We know in our Catholic belief; faith is made possible in and through the Resurrection of Christ at Easter. Resurrection of Christ is a pinnacle moment, whereby uncertainty turns into certainty. "He is risen indeed." Because he is "the resurrection and the life." Jesus further said: "whoever believes in me, even if he dies, will live, and everyone who lives and believes in me will never die. Do you believe this?" The question for us is: Do we really put our faith and trust in Jesus when facing the anxiety, stress, uncertainty, and

even fearful possibility of death in our lives? Do we really believe in the Resurrection? Or has our fearful human instinct taken hold of us?

In one of the homilies of Pope Francis at Santa Marta, he speaks about the fear in all of us during this pandemic: "The fear of the elderly who are alone in nursing homes, or hospitals, or in their own homes, and don't know what will happen. The fear of those who do not have regular jobs... Each one knows what their own fears are. We pray to the Lord that He might help us to trust, and to tolerate and conquer these fears."

Thirdly, it is with the eyes of faith in the Risen Jesus, that we are moved to action like Jesus when he sees the pain and suffering of others. Terrible times reveal our true values, priorities, and character as individuals and as a society. Our Catholic faith helps us to act to ensure the protection of human life and dignity of all and not to discriminate against anyone.

I encourage you to pray as a family using the liturgical readings, prayers, and hymns. We come together as a believing family to encounter the Lord present to us, His people wherever we are. As we are in the month of May dedicated to Mother Mary, let us have recourse to her through our family rosary and Mother Mary, we are sure, intercedes for us her children to Jesus, who will make all things new and raise us up.

I was deeply touched by this message I received, which we can ponder: "When fishermen cannot go to sea, they repair their nets. Are you repairing yourself in this lockdown?"
