Stop biting my nails, learn a new language, get up early, workout daily, are the resolution that returns year in, year out. Some may have positive effect and others may be forgotten after some time or as the days go by. Below are three resolutions that may be helpful for us to shape our New Year and something to do in the New Year.

- **1. Reduce my screen time:** My main focus this year is to spend less time glued to the screen that's rarely out of my left palm, and more time being present in the real-life things going on around me.
- **2. Positivity:** I'm aiming to adopt more of a 'glass-half-full mindset'. We're living at a go-go-go pace and sometimes, we forget what we have and how fortunate we are to have it. In 2024, I aim to be more mindful of this and be grateful for what I have, and also give back to the less fortunate.

We begin with the Word of God, which says, 'the God who makes all things new in Christ' (cf. Rev. 21:5) enables us to make this year truly a New Year for each one of us -- a time for renewal and re-creation in the love of God, a time for making this year a year of peace in our lives and homes, a time for making this new year truly a "year of our Lord," a year of loving service, with God's abundant blessings & sanctification.

We learn a lot about "NEW" in the New Testament. New Testament being NEW brings newness. There, we read about new birth, new teaching, new wine, new wineskins, new commandment, new covenant, new creation, new self, new heaven and new earth, new name, new Jerusalem, newness of life; and then what we just read: all things new. Newness is also seen in His creation:

There is the daily newness of night turning into day - a daily newness of darkness to light. There is the annual turning of winter into spring, spring to summer, summer to fall, fall to winter...endlessly repeating throughout time.

There's a clear cycle of newness and renewal in creation. And there's a cycle of newness and renewal in life. God is a God of renewal, restoration, redemption, refreshing. I think we inherently recognize that renewal and refreshing and restoration are an important part of our human experience.

There is a place for persevering through old things in our life and faith life, as well as our relationship with the Lord as individuals, and our relationships with each other.

In many cases, where things are tough and we want something new, God will give us something new.... He'll give us new strength, new determination, new attitudes, rather than new circumstances. As the Word of God tells us: "He will wipe every tear from their eyes.

There will be no more death or mourning or crying or pain, for the old order of things has passed away." (Rev. 21:4)

A new heart.... a new spirit is necessary to begin the New Year with newness. God does new things because we need newness. We need refreshing. We need this new heart and new spirit. God is a God of new things, and renewal is part of His working in us and in creation.

We begin the New Year with the solemnity of Mary, Mother of God. May Mother Mary accompany us with her Son Jesus in this New Year, in all that we do and plan to bring blessings, graces and sanctification to us personally and to our families and our Parish.
