### 1st Reading – Deuteronomy 6:2-6


Moses spoke to the people, saying: "Fear the LORD, your God, and keep, throughout the days of your lives, all his statutes and commandments which I enjoin on you, and thus have long life. Hear then, Israel, and be careful to observe them, that you may grow and prosper the more, in keeping with the promise of the LORD, the God of your fathers, to give you a land flowing with milk and honey. "Hear, O Israel! The LORD is our God, the LORD alone! Therefore, you shall love the LORD, your God, with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your strength. Take to heart these words which I enjoin on you today."

### 2nd Reading – Hebrews 7:23-28

Brothers and sisters: The levitical priests were many because they were prevented by death from remaining in office, but Jesus, because he remains forever, has a priesthood that does not pass away. Therefore, he is always able to save those who approach God through him, since he lives forever to make intercession for them. It was fitting that we should have such a high priest: holy, innocent, undefiled, separated from sinners, higher than the heavens. He has no need, as did the high priests, to offer sacrifice day after day, first for his own sins and then for those of the people; he did that once for all when he offered himself. For the law appoints men subject to weakness to be high priests, but the word of the oath, which was taken after the law, appoints a son, who has been made perfect forever.



### Gospel – Mark 12:28B-34

One of the scribes came to Jesus and asked him, "Which is the first of all the commandments?" Jesus replied, "The first is this: Hear, O Israel! The Lord our God is Lord alone! You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your mind, and with all your strength. The second is this: You shall love your neighbor as yourself. There is no other commandment greater than these." The scribe said to him, "Well said, teacher. You are right in saying, 'He is One and there is no other than he.' And 'to love him with all your heart, with all your understanding, with all your strength, and to love your neighbor as yourself' is worth more than all burnt offerings and sacrifices." And when Jesus saw that he answered with understanding, he said to him, "You are not far from the kingdom of God." And no one dared to ask him any more questions.

## My Dear Parish Family,

For many of us, there is a thought that after we finish our time in school, then that's the end of our learning. This couldn't be further from the truth. To live is to learn. We are constantly learning new things and strengthening the knowledge we already possess. This is a very important part of life and aging. What we may not realize is that it is also a very important part of our spiritual lives.

Many of us, even the most devout among us, stop learning about our faith by the time we're teenagers. We receive our sacramental preparation and then stop digging into all the depths that our faith and our faith tradition have to offer. It's important for our spiritual lives and our relationship with God to take time to learn more about different aspects of our faith. We should allow ourselves time to read scripture, read books about the faith, watch videos, take classes, join discussion groups and prayer groups. All of these are healthy avenues of learning and faith formation.

We want to offer an opportunity to do this during Advent here at St. Anthony's. We will be offering a 6-Week Bible Study Series on Prayer. The instinct to pray, to reach out to something greater than ourselves, is almost built-in to our human DNA. All cultures, at all times throughout human history, have offered prayer in some form or fashion. Prayer is our means of personal communication with God - but also a way in which He speaks to us. Maybe prayer has been difficult for us in the past. Maybe we never learned "how" to pray. Maybe the idea of real prayer intimidates us. In our Bible Study together we will learn about the Scriptural roots of prayer, how our Catholic tradition approaches prayer, and how we can grow a culture of prayer in our own lives.

This 6-Week study is free and open to all. It will take place on Tuesday nights from 7-8PM in the Parish Hall and will begin on Tuesday November 16<sup>th</sup> and end on Tuesday December 21<sup>st</sup>. Think about making this study part of this year's Advent Journey.




### ALL SAINTS DAY
