# THE THREE WISE MEN

January 3, 2021 Solemnity of the Epiphany of the Lord



Epiphany (traditionally observed on January 6, but transferred in most dioceses in United States to the Sunday after January 1) we

celebrate the wellloved story of the three wise men (also known as the three kings) who came from the East to find Jesus after his birth.

St. Matthew doesn't lot give us а of

information about the magi. He doesn't even tell us how many there were, or refer to them as kings! These details only came with later reflection by the Church. For instance, refer to them as kings.

The gifts they bring tell us something about who this child Jesus will be. Gold is in

the prophet Isaiah prophesies that kings will follow the light of God and bring gifts of gold and frankincense (Isaiah 60:4 -6), while the Psalmist depicts kings of other nations bearing


gifts to the royal son and doing him homage (Psalm 72. It's easy to see how the early Christians saw the magi in these stories and began to

recognition of his nature; frankincense was used in offering sacrifices, and so speaks to Jesus' divinity and priesthood; and myrrh, perfume used in embalming,

> anticipates Jesus' suffering and death.

> The Magi represent the world of the gentiles and are the first non-Jews recognize Jesus as the messiah. St. Matthew wants u s t o

understand that Jesus fulfills not only the promises made to the Jewish people through the Law and the Prophets, but extends the love and mercy of God to all nations. Through baptism we are brought into a new nation — God's own kingdom — which does not





discriminate on the basis of ethnicity, nationality, or socioeconomic status.

The invitation to the Kingdom is extended to everyone. As the "seed and beginning" of the Kingdom (cf. Catechism of the Catholic Church, no. 541), the Church also opens her doors to all people who seek God and strive to do his will. In this way the magi help us see how we be must always ready welcome others into communities and our parishes.
